Specifies rights of employees of education service district that reorganizes.

Adds school districts to public agencies that may finance treatment works.

Adds Oregon prekindergarten program providers to pilot project that assists certain programs in adopting and implementing health literacy program.

Authorizes school districts and education service districts to enter into funds diversion agreement with Department of Education for purpose of making debt service payments on qualified revenue bonds. Sunsets June 30, 2029.

Provides that Director of Department of Consumer and Business Services may investigate licensee compliance with provisions of license and enforce licensee duties and prohibitions.
