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| <u>HB 2028-A</u> | HC | dpa PE | 04/23/15 | Buehler |

Directs the State Board of Pharmacy to adopt rules that permit pharmacists to engage in the practice of clinical pharmacy. Defines “clinical pharmacy agreement” and “practice of clinical pharmacy.” Permits health insurers to provide payment or reimbursement for services provided by the pharmacist through the practice of clinical pharmacy or pursuant to the statewide drug therapy management protocol. Limits participation from “practitioner” to physician. Adds Oregon Health Authority and coordinated care organizations to reimburse pharmacist or pharmacy under specified situations. States that for this statute, a pharmacist is classified as a primary care provider. Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

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| <u>HB 2193-A</u> | EE | dpa PE | 04/23/15 | Holvey |

Defines “energy storage system” as technology capable of retaining energy, storing energy for period of time and delivering energy after storage. Defines “electric company” as company with sales of electricity to retail customers in amount that equals three percent or more of all retail electricity sales. If authorized by Public Utility Commission (PUC), directs electric company to procure one or more qualifying energy storage system with capacity to store at least five megawatt hours of electricity on or before January 1, 2020. Restricts total capacity of storage system procured by one company to less than one percent of company’s 2014 peak load; authorizes PUC to waive limit under specified circumstances. Allows energy company to recover in rates all cost prudently incurred in procuring one or more energy storage systems. Not later than January 1, 2017, directs PUC to adopt guidelines for submittal of proposals by energy companies. Not later than January 1, 2018, directs energy companies to submit to PUC one or more proposals for developing project that includes one or more energy storage systems. Establishes proposal requirements and PUC evaluation criteria. Prohibits PUC from using or allowing use of information and analyses submitted with proposal to be used for other purpose and, to protect information, directs PUC to determine procedures under which person may view information and analyses and adopt protective order that includes reasonable restrictions requested by utility. Directs PUC to report to interim legislative committees related to energy by September 15, 2016 and September 15, 2018. Declares emergency, effective upon passage. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

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HB 2195-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Piluso**
Requires counties with population of 650,000 or more to use proceeds of delinquent tax lien foreclosures for low-income housing, rental assistance and affordable housing development. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 2313-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Olson**
Creates new offense for those under the age of 21 years who purchase, attempt to purchase, or acquire marijuana items. Provides exemptions. Declares emergency, effective upon passage. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 2356-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Post**
Modifies Invasion of Privacy statute to include two degrees of offenses. Increases penalties for recidivists and those who make recordings of others. (Committee vote: 8-0-1)

HB 2365-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Williamson**
Updates and provides additional clarification to adoption laws. Updates written certification and declaration requirements. Changes some requirements of Adoption Summary and Segregated Information Statement, including adding exceptions. Clarifies that presiding judges have access to court adoption records. Outlines what information must be disclosed or redacted. Updates records requirements and adds clarification addressing re-adoption. Addresses process and fees when multiple children adopted. Clarifies when Indian Child Welfare Act procedures initiated. Contains non-substantive scrivener's changes. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 2366-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Williamson**
Updates and provides additional clarification to adoption laws. Requires circuit court to collect filing fee of \$255 in adoption cases under ORS chapter 109 in certain instances. Removes \$1 fee for issuance of certificates of adoption. Includes in \$255 filing fee the cost of issuing one or more certificates of adoption under ORS 109.410. Provides fee exceptions when Department of Human Services consented to adoption. Contains non-substantive scrivener's changes. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

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HB 2369-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Nosse**
 Requires Department of Human Services to establish, by administrative rule, the responsibilities of a case manager who receives notice of a life-sustaining procedure for an individual, for withholding or withdrawing those life-sustaining procedures. Requires that notification to the person designated as the health care representative of any knowledge, documentation or other information be included in the administrative rule. (Committee vote: Yeas: 5 - Clem, Greenlick, Keny-Guyer, Lively, Nosse; Nays: 4 - Buehler, Hayden, Kennemer, Weidner)

HB 2413-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Gallegos**
 Prohibits Department of Human Services from granting license to residential care facility, as defined, unless facility provides market study on need for services in the area. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 7 - Buehler, Evans, Gallegos, Keny-Guyer, Piluso, Stark, Taylor; Nays: 2 - Hayden, Parrish)

HB 2463-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Gomberg**
 Defines terms. Authorizes Department of State Lands (DSL) to seize and remove derelict or abandoned structure on, under, or over state-owned submerged land or submersible lands under specified circumstances. Establishes Submerged Lands Enhancement Fund. Clarifies that marine debris may be removed and disposed of with moneys from Submerged Lands Enhancement Fund. Directs DSL to adopt rules, including procedures for notice and opportunity for hearing prior to seizure. Requires DSL to adopt rules that include procedures related to manner by which request to department for use of money in Submerged Lands Enhancement Fund may be made and evaluated by department. Places liability of costs of removal, salvage, storage, and disposal of a seized structure with owner. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Clem, Gilliam, Gomberg, Helm, Post, Witt; Nays: 1 - McLane)

HB 2469-A **BL** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Barton**
 Establishes requirements for certain insurers to conduct own risk and solvency assessment (ORSA) and to file report of assessment with Department of Consumer and Business Services. Specifies conditions for sharing reports and related information. Requires reports and related information to be held confidential by Department and others in possession of the information. Adds provisions to address risk management and financial oversight of insurers. Becomes operative January 1, 2016. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Barton, Doherty, Evans, Fagan, Holvey, Nosse; Nays: 5 - Barreto, Esquivel, Heard, Kennemer, Weidner)

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HB 2565 **BL** **dp** **04/24/15** **Williamson**
 Makes Oregon State Bar subject to public employee collective bargaining law. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Barton, Doherty, Evans, Fagan, Holvey, Nosse; Nays: 5 - Barreto, Esquivel, Heard, Kennemer, Weidner)

HB 2599-A **CPGE** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Buckley**
 Requires public utilities to report to Public Utility Commission by November 1, 2015, on processes to mitigate service terminations for certain residential customers during heating season or periods of extreme heat or cold. Requires governing body of each electrical cooperative, municipal utility and people's utility district to submit same report to Oregon Department of Energy by November 1, 2015. Declares emergency, effective upon passage. (Committee vote: 7-0-0)

HB 2611-A **HEDIW** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Gallegos**
 Extends by four years period during which universities with institutional governing boards must participate in mandated shared services under same terms, conditions, funding, model and policy frameworks as existed in 2013. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 7 - Gallegos, Johnson, McKeown, Read, Reardon, Whisnant, Williamson; Nays: 2 - Hayden, Nearman)

HB 2696-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Nathanson**
 Defines delegated entity as a dental care organization, mental health organization or similar organizational provider. Directs Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to conduct annual external quality review of each coordinated care organization (CCO), to notify all CCOs of the information about a delegated entity. If OHA has contracted with a contract review organization, directs OHA to provide all the CCOs with the information from the delegated entity. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

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HB 2723-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Clem**

Authorizes city or county to designate any urbanized area of city or county as urban agriculture incentive zone. Authorizes city or county to enter into agreement with owner of unimproved land within agriculture incentive zone if owner agrees to restrict use to small-scale urban agricultural production for five consecutive years. Allows unimproved land to undergo special assessment as farmland. Permits special assessment of area of unimproved land to be smaller than tax lot, of which area is a part, and limits assessment to area actually used for small-scale urban agricultural production. Requires interested owners to file application with county assessor on or before April 1 preceding first property tax year to have unimproved land granted special assessment. Requires application be made on forms prepared by Department of Revenue that include certain information. Disqualifies special assessment if county assessor discovers that gross income requirements were not met or if unimproved land is no longer used for urban agricultural production effective January 1 of year discovery is made. Levies additional tax against land found in violation of five-year contract equal to difference between taxes assessed against land and taxes that otherwise would have been assessed against land for each property tax year in contract. Authorizes Department of Revenue to adopt rules necessary for administration of urban agriculture incentive zone special assessment. Requires local government to consider extent to which lands designated by a city or county as urban agriculture incentive zone will affect future development for purpose of inventory and determination of housing capacity as part of periodic review of comprehensive plan or regional plan that concerns the urban growth boundary. Clarifies that designation of urban agriculture incentive zone has no effect on buildable land inventories or urban growth boundary of city or county that designates zone. Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment of 78th Legislative Assembly. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Clem, Gilliam, Gomberg, Helm, Post, Witt; Nays: 1 – McLane)

HB 2832-A **HEDIW** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Nathanson**

Requires governing board or entity of public or private postsecondary institution to evaluate contract with third party financial firm based on recommendations from United States Department of Education (DOE) and Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB). Specifies contract may not include revenue sharing, per-use transaction fee on debit card, fee for initial disbursement via paper check or electronic funds transfer and account inactivity fee. Requires contract to be made public and posted on web site of postsecondary institution. Creates private right of action for students. Requires public university or community college contracting with third party financial firm to undertake reasonable efforts to establish collaboration agreements with other institutions. (Committee vote: Yeas: 5 - Gallegos, McKeown, Read, Reardon, Williamson; Nays: 4 - Hayden, Johnson, Nearman, Whisnant)

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HB 2941-A **EE** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Johnson**
 Updates language in ORS 757.603. Requires electric company to provide portfolio of rate options to residential electricity consumer that includes option for electricity associated with specific renewable energy resource, including solar photovoltaic, if Public Utility Commission (PUC) finds through public comment or market research conducted by electric company that demand is sufficient. Directs PUC to evaluate programs to incentivize development and use of solar photovoltaic energy systems and submit report to Legislature that recommends most effective, efficient and equitable approach to incentive programs and, for each program, recommendation on whether program should be discontinued, modified, extended or remain unchanged. Lists factors PUC must consider in developing recommendations. Requires report be submitted to interim legislative committee related to energy on or before September 15, 2016. Declares emergency, effective upon passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 8 - Bentz, Boone, Heard, Helm, Holvey, Johnson, Reardon, Vega Pederson; Nays: 1 – Weidner)

HB 2948-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Keny-Guyer**
 Specifies additional conditions under which protected health information may be disclosed by a healthcare provider that does not subject the provider to civil liability. Clarifies additional conditions under which a healthcare provider may disclose protected health information for an individual being treated for mental illness, without obtaining an authorization from the individual or a personal representative. Declares an emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 2980-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Barker**
 Authorizes defendant to request district attorney to approve extension of stay of criminal proceedings in district attorney diversion. Requires court to grant extension upon district attorney approval. Allows defendant to request extension after district attorney request for termination. (Committee vote: 7-0-2)

HB 3011-A **TED** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Bentz**
 Allows dispensaries for Class 1 flammable liquids located in counties with population less than 40,000 residents to permit self-dispensing of such liquids when no owner, operator or employee of the dispensary is present. Specifies that dispensaries may continue to operate as self-service dispensaries if population of county increases above 40,000 residents. (Committee vote: 6-0-1)

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HB 3025-A **BL** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Nosse**
 Establishes unlawful employment practice for employer in the following cases: use of a job application form that inquires about applicant's conviction history; inquiring about or considering an applicant's conviction history prior to an interview; or inquiring about or considering an applicant's conviction history prior to making a conditional offer of employment when no interview is conducted. Creates right of civil action for violation. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Barton, Doherty, Evans, Fagan, Holvey, Nosse; Nays: 5 - Barreto, Esquivel, Heard, Kennemer, Weidner)

HB 3058-A **BL** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Komp**
 Permits retired Tier One and Tier Two member of Public Employees Retirement System to work for school district or education service district as a teacher of career and technical education for unlimited hours without loss of retirement benefits. Defines teacher of career and technical education. Sunsets June 30, 2018. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 9 - Barton, Doherty, Esquivel, Evans, Fagan, Heard, Holvey, Kennemer, Nosse; Nays: 2 - Barreto, Weidner)

HB 3093-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Post**
 Provides persons licensed to carry concealed handgun in another state the same protections afforded to persons with Oregon concealed handgun permit provided issuing state license requirements are no less stringent than Oregon requirements. Directs Department of Justice to compile list of eligible states and make list available to law enforcement and public. Specifies that permit holder's home state must recognize Oregon concealed carry permit for law to apply. (Committee vote: 7-0-2)

HB 3143-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Whitsett**
 Directs Department of Consumer and Business Services (DCBS) to develop model sign for victims of human trafficking. Requires sign be available on departmental website. Directs DCBS and Department of Human Services create sticker consistent with sign. Directs Oregon Liquor Control Commission to include materials in outlet license renewal packets. Becomes operative 60 days after passage. Sunsets January 2, 2018. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 3187-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Komp**
 Sets and clarifies term limits for members of Oregon Commission for the Blind. Increases term of service to four years. Defines full term of service. (Committee vote: Yeas: 7 - Evans, Gallegos, Hayden, Keny-Guyer, Piluso, Stark, Taylor; Nays: 2 - Buehler, Parrish)

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HB 3188-A **AGNR** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **McKeown, Heard**

Allows for creation of one or more predator control district within county where minimum of 50 percent of landowners owning 10 or more acres of agricultural, forestland or mixed farm and forest use lands petition county commissioners. Includes bears, bobcats, and red foxes in definition of predator. Establishes petition filing and hearing requirements. Requires assessment on lands in predator control district not to exceed \$1 per acre or per thousand dollars of assessed value of specified properties. Limits assessment only to 10 acre properties outside of incorporated cities, zoned for farm use, forest use, or mixed farm and forest use. Grants county authority to change boundaries of district to include additional properties. Exempts lands owned by public body from assessment unless public body otherwise agrees. Requires appointment of five member advisory board representing farm, forest and livestock producers to advise county commissioners on district business and report on district predator control efforts. Directs that law would be repealed January 2, 2022. (Committee vote: 8-0-1)

HB 3214-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Clem**

Requires Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC) to adopt or amend rules regarding statewide planning goal criteria allowing local government to rezone land developed or committed to residential use without requiring local government to take new exception to statewide planning goals related to agricultural and forest lands. Requires LCDC to adopt rules that allow rezoning that authorizes change, continuation or expansion of industrial use in operation for previous five years. Specifies restrictions on what rules adopted or amended must provide. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 7-0-0)

HB 3217-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Bentz**

Directs Department of State Lands (DSL) to establish by rule pilot program for voluntary stream restoration and beaver recovery through construction of artificial beaver dams located in Malheur Lake drainage basin. Defines terms. Requires pilot program to include requirement for monitoring and criteria for evaluating program and requirements for participants to provide information on number and specific locations of artificial beaver dams to be constructed and materials to be used. Exempts construction of artificial beaver dams on qualifying streams from being considered artificial obstructions and exempts them from fish passage requirements. Where practicable, requires DSL to adopt rules that include options for designing and constructing beaver dams in manner for fish passage in a qualifying stream if streams were restored as result of voluntary restoration project or dams that could be modified to provide fish passage if streams were restored and native migratory fish return as result of voluntary restoration project. Requires participating landowners to work collaboratively with State Department of Fish and Wildlife to provide appropriate fish passage for any native migratory fish that return to area in restoration project. Requires DSL to provide preliminary report to Legislative Assembly no later than January 1, 2017 and to report to Legislative Assembly on identified environmental and economic impacts resulting from pilot program no later than January 1, 2025. Sunsets January 2, 2027. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: Yeas: 5 - Clem, Gilliam, McLane, Post, Witt; Nays: 2 - Gomberg, Helm)

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HB 3222-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Gilliam**
 Requires Land Conservation and Development Commission to issue order requiring local government, state agency or special district to take action necessary to bring its comprehensive plan, land use regulations, limited land use decisions or other land use decisions into compliance if local government's standards, conditions and procedures discourage needed housing through unreasonable cost or delay. (Committee vote: 7-0-0)

HB 3243-A **BL** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Weidner**
 Expands definition of "indigent person" to include those whose relative, or other person with legal right to direct disposition of remains, refuses to pay for the disposition, and those for whom no other person wishes to direct and pay for the disposition. Transfer duties of maintaining list of institutions that may accept or process bodies for education or research purposes from Oregon Health and Science University to Oregon Mortuary and Cemetery Board. Provides duties funeral establishment must to perform when taking custody of unclaimed body. Extends from five days to ten days the time a funeral establishment must wait before transferring body to education or research institution. Transfers responsibility for collecting death certificate filing fee from Oregon Health Authority to Mortuary and Cemetery Board. Directs that at least \$6 of \$20 filing fee be used for reimbursing licensees for disposition of body of indigent deceased person. Directs Board to adopt rules regarding funds for indigent disposition and to consider historical data related to reimbursements. (Committee vote: 11-0-0)

HB 3244-A **BL** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Esquivel**
 Provides that borrower or borrower's agent may rely on lender's payoff statement for purpose of establishing amount borrower must pay to satisfy obligation under real estate loan agreement unless borrower delivers an amended payoff statement. Provides that lender may recover amount borrower owes that did not appear on payoff statement or amended payoff statement only as unsecured debt or by foreclosing other property securing the obligation. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 11-0-0)

HB 3248-A **CPGE** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Holvey**
 Requires public agency terminating contract with qualified nonprofit agency for individuals with disabilities (QRF) to require in new contract for same work that contractor must offer employment to employees of terminated QRF at terms as or more favorable than terms under former contract. Allows contracting agency to require QRFs to comply with applicable local ordinances governing labor standards and to disqualify from public contracts QRFs repeatedly violating local labor standard ordinances. (Committee vote: Yeas: 4 - Fagan, Holvey, McLain, Rayfield; Nays: 2 - Nearman, Stark; Exc: 1 - Buehler)

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HB 3282-A **RCLUW** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Buehler**
 Authorizes the Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC), upon request by city, to permit city to undergo periodic review for limited purpose of completing changes to proposed amendments to comprehensive plan and land use regulations required on remand after review by LCDC. Authorizes city to adopt, and Director of Department of Land Conservation and Development to approve, work program that includes only changes required on remand if periodic review is initiated. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 7-0-0)

HB 3292-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Sprenger**
 Directs Oregon Health Authority adopt rules identifying activities landlords may contractually delegate to renters of tourist facilities. Relieves landlord of liability for failure of tenant to meet terms of contract. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 3301-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Lively**
 Allows naturopathic physician to apply for credentialing by an insurer as a primary care provider and to meet specific insurer requirements. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Greenlick, Kennemer, Keny-Guyer, Lively, Nosse, Weidner; Nays: 2 - Buehler, Hayden; Exc: 1 - Clem)

HB 3315-A **CPGE** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Rayfield**
 Requires Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) for two fiscal years beginning July 1, 2015, to track and prepare statements reporting hours spent by ODFW personnel, and applicable hourly rate, performing recompensable assistance for other state executive department agencies. For fiscal years beginning July 1, 2017, requires ODFW to track and prepare statements and to invoice other agencies for services estimated to be provided in next biennium. Requires ODFW to reflect over- and under-payments in future estimates. Requires ODFW to report to Legislative Assembly on types of permit review work for which invoicing will be allowed, and list of statutes and rules applicable to permit review work carried out by ODFW. Declares emergency, effective upon passage. (Committee vote: 6-0-1)

HB 3318-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Taylor**
 Creates "Oregon State Lottery Responsible Gambling Code of Practices Act," as specified. Directs Oregon State Lottery Commission comply with gaming code. Requires report to legislature by October 1st of each even-numbered year. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 3343-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Vega Pederson**
 Requires insurers that cover prescription contraceptives to reimburse health care provider or dispensing entity for 3-month supply of contraceptives and for a 12-month period after the initial 3-month period. (Committee vote: Yeas: 6 - Buehler, Clem, Greenlick, Keny-Guyer, Lively, Nosse; Nays: 3 - Hayden, Kennemer, Weidner)

Creates offense if person knowingly presents revoked or invalid certificate. Establishes rebuttable presumption in cases of negligent hiring if employer had notice of certificate. (Committee vote: Yeas: 8 - Barker, Greenlick, Krieger, Lininger, Olson, Post, Sprenger, Williamson; Nays: 1 – Barton)

HB 3452-A **JUD** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **McLane**
 Prohibits contracts allowing use of property or facilities by education providers, or by nonprofit organizations providing services to youths, from requiring individual participant to indemnify property owner for damages not caused by individual participant. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee vote: 7-0-2)

HB 3478-A **EE** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Piluso**
 Phases in prohibition on manufacture and sale of personal care products and over-the-counter drugs that contain synthetic plastic microbeads. As of January 1, 2018, prohibits manufacture for sale of personal care product, other than over-the-counter drug, that contains synthetic plastic microbeads. As of January 1, 2019, prohibits manufacture or accepting for sale, of personal care product that contains synthetic plastic microbeads; prohibits manufacture for sale, may accept for sale, over-the-counter drug that contains synthetic plastic microbeads. As of January 1, 2020, prohibits manufacture of or accepting for sale personal care products or over-the-counter drugs that contain synthetic plastic microbeads. Specifies violation is unlawful trade practice. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 3494-A **HS** **dpa PE** **04/24/15** **Barton**
 Prohibits devocalization and/or declawing of cats or dogs, except under prescribed circumstances. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)

HB 3530-A **HC** **dpa PE** **04/23/15** **Hoyle**
 Prohibits specified terms imposed on vision care provider by vision care insurance or vision care discount card. (Committee vote: 9-0-0)
