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Agency: Higher Education Coordinating Commission House Bill 3308 requires the Higher Education Coordination Commission (HECC) to convene and staff a workgroup to analyze and develop recommendations to address disparities in higher education within traditionally marginalized, underserved or underrepresented communities. HECC is directed to submit a report detailing the analysis and recommendations to the interim legislative committees on higher education by June 30, 2016. The bill includes a one-time General Fund appropriation of \$48,092 and one limited duration Operations and Policy Analyst 4 position (0.25 FTE) to support the workgroup. (Senate Vote: Ayes, 21; nays, 6--Boquist, Hansell, Olsen, Thatcher, Thomsen, Whitsett; excused, 3--Devlin, Girod, President Courtney.)

<u>HB 3414 B-Eng.</u>	<u>HTED</u>	Concur	6/29/2015	Helm
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Creates offense of failure to keep vehicle in right lane on roads with posted speed greater than 55 miles per hour. Specifies offense does not occur when traffic is moving slower than normal flow of traffic. Designates offense as Class D traffic violation punishable by maximum fine of \$1,000. Exempts drivers of vehicles governed by ORS 811.325. Outlines conditions under which driving in the far left lane is allowable. **Senate Amendment Creates offense of failure to keep vehicle in right lane on roads with posted speed greater than 55 miles per hour. Changes penalty for failing to yield left lane from Class B to Class D traffic violation.** (Senate Vote: Ayes, 23; nays, 6--Devlin, Gelser, Hansell, Monnes Anderson, Olsen, Thatcher; excused, 1--Johnson.)

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Adds threatening to cause physical injury to animal to induce other person to engage in certain conduct as conduct constituting crime of coercion. Requires courts to impose minimum term of incarceration for initiating false report under certain circumstances. (Senate Vote: Ayes, 30.)

**Agency:** **Oregon Liquor Control Commission** House Bill 2803 modifies the beverage container redemption program and expands the requirements to be administered and enforced by OLCC. The bill modifies requirements for beverage container dealers, imposes reporting requirements, grants OLCC the authority to inspect space occupied by dealers, and requires that OLCC ensure compliance of dealers located within a convenience zone served by a redemption center. If OLCC determines a dealer is in violation, the Commission must provide the dealer with written notice of the violation. The dealer must cure the violation within 60 days to avoid a civil penalty. If violations are not cured within 60 days, OLCC is required to impose a civil penalty of at least \$200 per day. All penalties recovered from such violations shall be paid to the State Treasury and credited to the General Fund.

Defines large commercial event as a gathering that has an organizer, is held for purpose of shared or common activity or experience, has more than 50 individuals participating or more than 15 motor vehicles present, and continues or is scheduled to continue for more than four consecutive hours. Requires organizers of large commercial events on state forestlands to obtain permit from Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF). Stipulates permit does not entitle organizer to make any physical changes to state forestland. Creates requirements for large commercial event permit application and authorizes ODF to charge fee for reviewing and processing application. Authorizes ODF to consult with Oregon Health Authority and Department of Environmental Quality prior to adopting rules establishing health and safety standards for events. Authorizes ODF to suspend or revoke permit under certain circumstances. Establishes event organizer commits Class A misdemeanor if they violate permit requirement, or recklessly allow violation of permit terms and conditions. (Committee Vote: Aye, 5; Nay, 1 --Olsen)

Requires Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to adopt rules regarding time frames within which a pregnant medical assistance recipient, reimbursed under fee-for-service, needs general or specialty dental care. Specifies services and criteria to be covered and that the fee-for-service time frames are to be the same as pregnant recipients in coordinated care organizations and dental care organizations. Directs OHA to report to the Legislative Assembly no later than February 1, 2017. Repeals the reporting requirement February 1, 2019. Establishes January 1, 2016 as the operative date. **House Amendment Adds "an initial dental screening" as criteria for pregnant medical assistance recipient to receive or be referred for specialty dental care. Modifies OHA's time frame fee-for-service reimbursement requirement to be the same as, or shorter than, the time frames for coordinated care and dental care organizations. Changes OHA's reporting requirement from December 1, 2016 to February 1, 2017; and changes the repeal of the reporting requirement from January 2, 2017 to February 1, 2019.** (Committee Vote: Aye, 6)

Declares emergency, effective on passage. **House Amendment Sets a January 2, 2016 sunset date for the advisory committee. Specifies that the committee will meet no more than six times before the submission of the report to an interim committee of the legislature (no later than December 15, 2015). Focuses the work of the committee to evaluating the current process for making findings of abuse or neglect in residential care, and developing recommendations for ensuring the safety of children, youth or youth offenders in residential care.** (Committee Vote: Aye, 23; Exc., 1 --McLane)

Directs DCBS to convene an advisory group to advise the department in developing these recommendations. Requires DCBS to report its recommendations to the Legislature by September 15, 2016. Sunsets on January 2, 2018. Takes effect on passage. **House Amendment Replaces the bill.** (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

Fixed photo radar systems will be operated by the City of Portland at its own cost and the city must post signs announcing “Traffic Laws Photo Enforced.” Signs must meet the following criteria: (Committee Vote: Aye, 15; Nay, 9 --McLane, Huffman, Smith, Whisnant, Whitsett, Girod, Hansell, Thomsen, Whitsett)

Agencies: Oregon Health Authority; Higher Education Coordinating Commission House Bill 2642 establishes the nine-member Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the Health Licensing Office (HLO) in OHA. The bill authorizes HLO to certify the practice of advanced non-ablative esthetics. Certification must be renewed biennially. The bill contains an emergency clause and is effective on passage. HLO is authorized to take action before the July 1, 2016 operative date. The bill allows HLO to begin certifying individuals as of July 1, 2016, and includes a grandfathering period of 18 months. The bill specifies that certificate holders are required to disclose the existence of professional liability insurance as part of their client records, and stipulates that a certificate holder must enter into an agreement with a health care professional who has schedule III, IV, or V prescriptive authority, as well as with a licensed physician or a licensed nurse practitioner. Agency: Racing Commission House Bill 2719 increases the share of moneys retained by the Oregon Racing Commission from payments it receives for gross receipts of pari-mutuel wagering recorded by the totalizer system from 66 2/3 percent to 75 percent; the remaining 25 percent (as opposed to the current 33 1/3 percent) is to be deposited into the General Fund. Agency: Department of Transportation House Bill 2730 eliminates the current limit on the number of special registration license plates and requires ODOT to create a program for new special registration plates, approved administratively for production and distribution. The bill also creates two new special vehicle registration (license) plates: a Portland Trail Blazers plate and a Breast Cancer Awareness plate. The revenue from the Trail Blazers plate will be dedicated to the Trail Blazers Foundation and the revenue from the Breast Cancer Awareness plate will be dedicated to the Oregon Health Authority for the Oregon Breast and Cervical Cancer Program. Agency: Oregon Health Authority House Bill 2828 extends the sunset date of provisions requiring OHA to contract with a third party to conduct a study to examine options for financing health care delivery in Oregon. OHA is expected to report on the progress of the study during the 2016 legislative session and to submit the final report by November 1, 2016. The bill appropriates \$300,000 General Fund to OHA's Health Policy Programs for the 2015-17 biennium to carry out the provisions of this bill. Agency: Department of Veterans' Affairs House Bill 2838 creates a Task Force on incarcerated veterans to be staffed by the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA). The task force will consist of eight members: two Senators appointed by the President of the Senate; two Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House; a representative from the ODVA who has expertise in services and benefits for incarcerated veterans (appointed by the Director of ODVA); a representative from the Oregon Department of Corrections, experienced working with incarcerated veterans (appointed by the Director of the Department of Corrections); and two individuals who have been incarcerated veterans or have experience with incarcerated veterans (appointed by the Governor). The Task Force is directed to study and make recommendations on: outreach to veterans about benefits and other programs that provide resources to incarcerated veterans; assistance for incarcerated veterans to apply for and appeal the denial of federal and state benefits to which they may be entitled due to military service; informational materials that may be created for incarcerated veterans; the process for developing a comprehensive and coordinated statewide network of information and referral sources for incarcerated veterans; and how the ODVA may serve as a liaison for incarcerated veterans and incarcerated veterans issues with the DOC, reentry councils, the United States Department of Veterans Affairs and others. The task force is required to report to an appropriate interim legislative committee by September 15, 2016. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

Agency: Higher Education Coordinating Commission House Bill 2871 establishes the Open Educational Resources (OER) Grant Program within the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) to encourage the use of low or no-cost open educational resources as an alternative to increasingly high priced textbooks and other materials in post-secondary education. Open educational resources are defined as teaching, learning, and research materials that are either in the public domain or are otherwise free for use. By June 30, 2017, HECC, in coordination with public universities and community colleges, is directed to identify open educational resources that can be adopted as the primary instructional material for at least 15 courses meeting specific criteria outlined by the bill. The universities and colleges are also directed to prominently designate courses whose course materials exclusively consist of open or free textbooks or other low-cost or no-cost course materials. HECC is directed to report to interim legislative committees on higher education on the status of these efforts by December 1, 2015. (Committee Vote: Aye, 22; Nay, 2 -- Huffman, Whitsett)

HB 3380 directs the Early Learning Division of the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) to administer a program that expands preschool options available in the state. This "mixed delivery" preschool program is to be coordinated by the early learning hubs in their region; who are to apply for funding for the program and contract with preschool providers. The preschool programs eligible for financing through the program must meet a set of criteria including the following: Must be a new program or be expanding their program; provides at least the annual number of instructional hours as a full-day Kindergarten program does; considers the scheduling needs of families; serves children age 3 to age 5 (kindergarten eligible); serves families whose incomes are less than 200% of the federal poverty level; provides services from infant to early elementary grades; works with community programs and others to make sure families have knowledge of community supports available to families; meets certain quality measures including having lead teachers who have at least a bachelor's degree or have a plan to get the degree as well as having the lead teacher paid at least at the minimum amount set by the Early Learning Council; and provides additional supports for children and their families. Agency: Oregon Health Authority House Bill 3396 creates a health care provider incentive program to assist qualified health care providers committed to serving medical assistance recipients in rural or medically underserved areas in Oregon. It requires OHA to prescribe by rule the terms and conditions of the program. The bill establishes the Health Care Provider Incentive Fund to consolidate Oregon's health care provider incentive programs. Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to OHA to administer the Health Care Provider Incentive program. Priority for the distribution of funds must be based on guidance from the Health Care Workforce Committee. The bill permits OHA to contract with a third party to administer all or parts of the program. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

Agency: Department of Agriculture House Bill 3549 requires the Oregon Department of Agriculture to establish qualifications for obtaining and maintaining an aerial pesticide applicator certificate, increases certain civil penalties, requires the Pesticide Analytical Response Center to develop standards for response to pesticide related complaints, and requires a biennial report to the Legislative Assembly. Additionally, the bill requires ODA to operate a telephone line to receive and coordinate responses to pesticide related complaints by the public and report to the Legislative Assembly biennially. Beginning January 1, 2016, a 60-foot unsprayed strip along inhabited dwellings or schools for aerial herbicide applicators is established and is to be included as part of the Forest Practices Act. Agency: Department of State Police Senate Bill 128 defines "comparable" for the purpose of establishing base pay for OSP telecommunicators as the base pay for telecommunicators employed by the five Oregon public safety answering points with the most employees. Expires terms of office for members of Oregon Education Investment Board (OEIB) upon effective date of Act and dissolves OEIB board. Extends sunset of OEIB agency and Chief Education Officer (CEO) to June 30, 2019. Changes agency name to "Chief Education Office." Specifies that office is established for purpose of coordinating with education stakeholders to establish unified public education system. Specifies office duties and entities with whom collaboration should take place. Allows office to adopt rules necessary for administration of laws that office is charged with administering. Specifies CEO duties and positions with whom collaboration should take place. Establishes CEO has direction and control over specific positions for matters related to design and organization of multi-agency planning. Requires records and property in possession of CEO be transferred to specified positions as of June 30, 2019. Removes requirements related to achievement compacts. Declares emergency, effective on passage. **House Amendment Resolves conflicts.** (Committee Vote: Aye, 7; Nay, 2 --Gilliam, Wilson)

Requires out-of-state schools obtain approval from Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) for educational credit or degree offered within Oregon unless party to interstate agreement. Authorizes HECC to charge \$7,000 biennial fee for review and oversight of out-of-state schools not party to interstate agreement and \$1,000 for each new program application. Authorizes HECC to charge out-of-state schools \$1,000 fee if offering practicums in Oregon, unless placements are part of an online program offered by a school. Defines "practicum" to include internships and other placements. Allows HECC to waive fee for one-time placements or residents returning for practicums or internships. Authorizes HECC to charge fee up to \$1,000 for new program applications of career schools. Applies to applications, approval requests and fees

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imposed on or after September 1, 2015. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee Vote: Aye, 20; Nay, 3 --McLane, Whitsett, Whitsett; Exc., 1 --Smith)

Requires Department of Human Services (DHS) and Oregon Health Authority (OHA) suspend medical assistance provided persons expected to remain in Department of Corrections (DOC) custody more than a year. Requires reinstatement of medical assistance for persons in DOC custody during periods of external hospitalization. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee Vote: Aye, 7; Exc., 2 --Barnhart, Smith Warner)

The measure defines place-based integrated water resources for purposes of the Act and provides the statutory authority for the Water Resources Department to issue grants to facilitate preparation of place-based integrated water resources strategies consistent with state laws, water resource policy and WRD requirements. The measure authorizes the department to enter into contracts or agreements, provide technical assistance and information for development of strategies and requires those strategies be developed in collaboration with balanced representation of interests; balance current and future in and out of stream needs; include development of actions consistent with existing laws and policies; facilitate implementation of local solutions; be developed in open process; and be developed in consultation with Department. The bill also authorizes the Water Resources Commission to adopt rules. Sunsets Act July 1, 2019. (Committee Vote: Aye, 17; Nay, 6 --McLane, Whitsett, Girod, Johnson, Thomsen, Whitsett; Exc., 1 --Smith)

Requires continuing care retirement communities to establish a procedure for residents to request gender of individual assigned to assist with activities of daily living. Requires facility honor request except in case of significant difficulty or cost. Requires written explanation and documentation of rationale for denial. Requires DHS establish complaint procedure for failures to comply. Requires DHS investigate each complaint and provide written report to resident and facility within seven days of completion. Adds residents of continuing care retirement communities to the client portfolio of the Long Term Care Ombudsman. (Committee Vote: Aye, 23; Exc., 1 --Winters)

Defines "palliative care" as patient- and family-centered medical care that optimizes quality of life by anticipating, preventing and treating suffering caused by serious illness; addressing physical, social and spiritual needs; and facilitating autonomy, access, information and choices. Establishes nine-member Palliative Care and Quality of Life Interdisciplinary Advisory Council (Council) in

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Oregon Health Authority (OHA). Requires Council to advise on establishment, maintenance, operation and evaluation of palliative care initiatives. Specifies Council as individuals with collective expertise in interdisciplinary palliative care, expertise in nursing, social work and pharmacy, clergy or individuals with spiritual expertise, with at least two board-certified physicians or nurses having expertise in palliative care. Requires OHA to post information on website. Permits website information to include continuing education for health care providers, palliative care delivery in home and facilities, best practices for cultural competency, consumer education and referral information for culturally competent care. Requires health facilities to establish system for identifying patients or residents that could benefit from palliative care, provide information and facilitate access to palliative care. Agency: Oregon Health Authority Senate Bill 698 creates the position of State School Nursing Consultant in the Oregon Health Authority to coordinate and collaborate with the Oregon Department of Education's school nurse specialist in providing leadership and integration in the delivery of nursing services in schools. The bill also establishes the 14-member Task Force on School Nursing charged with examining and recommending sustainable funding sources for school health services. The task force is required to submit a report to an interim Legislative committee by September 15, 2016. The task force sunsets on December 31, 2016. The bill requires the Governor to consider diversity in relation to race, ethnicity, languages, and disability status in appointing members to the task force. Directs Department of Revenue to retain un-receipted income tax revenue from capital gains income. Defines method of calculating excess capital gains revenue as the deference between the average revenue over the most recent two tax years compared to average revenue in the three previous years. If the most recent revenue exceeds the previous period, the excess is deposited in the Education Stability Fund. Deposit occurs prior to June 30 of odd numbered years. No deposits can be made prior to June of 2019. **House Amendment Sets base period for calculation at three years instead of two. Clarifies that estimate is based on tax liability, not collections. States that no deposit is be made under the bill prior to June of 2019.**
