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Third Reading Of Senate Bills:*(Carried Over from Thursday, July 02, 2015)*

<u>SB 416</u>	<u>JWM</u>	dp	7/1/2015	Taylor
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Requires smoke shops to pay fee adopted by Oregon Health Authority (OHA) by rule. Requires fees for application for certification, renewal every five years, transfer of certification or application for relocation. Specifies fees must be reasonably calculated. Creates effective date of January 1, 2016. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee Vote: Aye, 14; Nay, 9 --McLane, Huffman, Whisnant, Whitsett, Girod, Hansell, Thomsen, Whitsett, Winters; Exc., 2 --Rayfield, Johnson)

Has minimal fiscal impact**No Revenue Impact**Third Reading Of Senate Bills:

<u>SB 217 B-Eng.</u>	<u>JWM</u>	dp	7/2/2015	Taylor
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Modifies the authority relating to various grants in the following three policy areas: 1) Connecting to the World of Work; 2) Oregon Reads/Early Reading Initiative; and 3) Guidance & Support for Post-Secondary Aspirations. The bill changes the role of the Oregon Education Investment Board relating to strategic investments to one of identifying and recommending as opposed to designing and implementing. Originally multiple agencies were charged with administering individual strategic investments. Under this version of the all of the strategic investment monies go to the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for distribution various governmental and private entities. The bill also aligns the statutory language with the programs likely being funded in the ODE's budget. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

<u>SB 418 B-Eng.</u>	<u>JWM</u>	dp	7/2/2015	Johnson
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Agencies: Higher Education Coordinating Commission; Emergency Board Senate Bill 418 charges the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in consultation with the Department of Education and the Oregon Education Investment Board, with recommending ways to encourage students to become ready for college, take courses for college credit, and transition from high school to post-secondary education. In developing its recommendations, HECC is directed to consider how high schools and post-secondary institutions can share transition costs, creating funding preferences for high schools meeting specified criteria regarding course offerings and student demographics, increasing counseling and advising capacity, supporting cross-sector collaboration and alignment, and preparation for success in transition programs. HECC is directed to report to the Legislature by February 1, 2016 on its recommendations. (Committee Vote: Aye,

SB 841 B-Eng. **JWM** **dp** **7/2/2015** **Greenlick**

Agency: Oregon Health Authority Senate Bill 841 requires a health plan to reimburse the cost of prescription drugs dispensed in accordance with the plan's synchronization policy; and prorate the copayment or adjust the copayment using a method approved by the Department of Consumer and Business Services for drugs dispensed in a less than 30-day supply for the purpose of synchronizing a patient's prescription drug refills. It also requires a health plan to reimburse, fully, the dispensing fee for partially filled or refilled prescription drugs. It exempts prescriptions when unit-of-use packaging cannot be synchronized, drugs are controlled substances, or drugs have a high risk of diversion. It specifies coverage may be limited by formulary restrictions applied to a prescription drug by a health plan. It exempts from the bill's provisions any prepaid group practice health plan with at least 200,000 enrollees in Oregon. It requires the Oregon Health Authority to implement a synchronization policy for the dispensing of prescription drugs to recipients of medical assistance who are not enrolled in a coordinated care organization. The synchronization policy applies to health plans issued or renewed on or after January 1, 2017. (Committee Vote: Aye, 23; Exc., 1 --Thomsen)

SB 912 B-Eng. **JWM** **dp** **7/2/2015** **McKeown**

Agency: Department of State Lands Senate Bill 912 allows DSL to sell, lease or trade historically filled lands owned by the state. Historically filled land was created by infill prior to May 28, 1963 and rises above the typical high water mark. It doesn't include wharves, bridges and similar structures. The bill doesn't apply to historically filled lands fronting the Pacific Ocean, the lower Willamette River, or those the State Land Board has asserted title to before January 1, 2016. The bill defers the ability of the State Land Board to assert title to historically filled lands until 2026. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

SB 969 **JWM** **dp** **7/2/2015** **Williamson**

Establishes Task Force on Reentry, Employment and Housing. Requires report to Legislative Assembly no later than December 15, 2015. Sunsets Task Force on December 31, 2016. Declares emergency, effective on passage. (Committee Vote: Aye, 20; Nay, 4 --Whitsett, Girod, Thomsen, Whitsett)
