<u>HB 2282 B-Eng.</u>	<u>HTED</u>	Concur	7/2/2015	McKeown
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Allows Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) to receive electronically transmitted documents necessary to do any of following: issue or transfer vehicle title; register or transfer registration of vehicle; issue registration plate or comply with odometer disclosure requirements. Specifies that, with exceptions, acknowledgement by notary public is not required for such transactions. Authorizes ODOT to adopt rules necessary to carry out provisions of measure. Specifies that automobile dealers may perform, and charge purchaser of vehicle for performing, any of following actions: verifying and clearing titles; perfecting, releasing or satisfying liens or other security interests; complying with federal security requirements or rendering any other service for purpose of complying with state and federal laws. Specifies that purchaser may negotiate amount of document processing fee, not to exceed \$150, if dealer uses integrator or \$115 if dealer does not use integrator. Requires dealer to prepare and submit all documents to complete transaction if fee is collected. **Senate Amendment Clarifies authority of vehicle dealer to elect to prepare, submit, or prepare and submit documents and to collect a document processing fee for following purposes: verify and clear title; perfect, release or satisfy lien or other security interest; comply with federal security requirements or render any other services for purpose of complying with state and federal laws related to sale of vehicle. Specifies that purchaser may negotiate amount of document processing fee, not to exceed \$150, if dealer uses integrator or \$115 if dealer does not use integrator. Requires dealer to prepare and submit all documents to complete transaction if fee is collected. Conforms definition of "integrator" to ORS 802.600 and deletes references in ORS 802.600 to Chapter 583, Oregon Laws 1997.** (Senate Vote: Ayes, 29; excused, 1--Olsen.)

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Agency: Employment Department House Bill 2728 establishes the Oregon Talent Council (OTC) and specifies its membership and responsibilities. The bill directs OTC to advise and act as a resource for state agencies and educational institutions on issues of talent development, in order to promote growth and competitiveness in Oregon's traded sector and high growth industries. The council is charged with working with the Oregon Employment Department to provide industry-based information and data on talent needs and gaps. It is also responsible for developing criteria and measurements for making performance-based, limited duration investments of public and private funds provided for this use. The OTC is required to develop a Talent Development Plan and update the plan each biennium. The council is directed to coordinate its work with the Employment Department, State Workforce Investment Board, local workforce boards, the STEM

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Investment Council, the Oregon Business Development Commission, and the Higher Education Coordinating Commission. (Senate Vote: Ayes, 26; nays, 3--Boquist, Ferrioli, Thomsen; excused, 1--Olsen.)

HB 3099 C-Eng. HCPGE **Concur** **7/2/2015** **Fagan**

Provides that State Chief Information Officer (CIO) is the primary advisor to the Governor on information technology (IT) and telecommunications. Provides that State CIO duties are specified by the Governor. Transfers authority for IT and telecommunications policy, including planning, rulemaking, standard setting, and oversight from Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to State CIO. Retains DAS authority and responsibility for statewide IT and telecommunications operations and services but requires those operations and services to be provided in a manner consistent with the rules, policies and standards adopted by the State CIO. Retains DAS authority for IT procurement. Provides authority for State CIO to review IT solicitation documents and all IT procurements over \$1 million, and to direct state agencies to include State CIO as contracting party on behalf of state. Provides authority for State CIO to approve, modify or stop IT projects and approve, suspend or cancel IT contracts over \$1 million. **Senate Amendment Resolves conflicts.** (Senate Vote: Ayes, 29; excused, 1--Olsen.)

HB 3100 B-Eng. HHC **Concur** **1/1/0001** **Greenlick**

Restructures the framework for conducting public health activities and duties in the state and for how public health services are provided to Oregonians. Provides mechanisms by which local health departments may implement provisions of the bill separately and at varying times. Modifies terminology and funding distributions. Becomes operative January 1, 2016. Declares an emergency, effective on passage. **Senate Amendment Resolves conflicts.** (Senate Vote:)

Third Reading Of Senate Bills:

SB 315 C-Eng. HRULES **dpa PE** **7/3/2015** **Clem**

Permits telephonic background check for firearm transfers lasting no longer than seven days if transferee is personally known to transferor. Requires completion of form as specified and receipt of Oregon State Police approval prior to completion of transaction. Provides civil immunity for transferor who receives notification that transferee is qualified to complete transfer of firearm and retains required completed form documenting transfer. Makes minor change to definition of "transfer" between private parties for hunting, trapping or target shooting. Declares emergency, effective on passage. **House Amendment Removes provision creating Class A misdemeanor if firearm is used in commission of crime or possessed by person prohibited from doing so as result of transfer. Provides civil immunity for transferor who receives notification that transferee is qualified to complete transfer of firearm and retains required completed form documenting transfer.** (Committee Vote: Aye, 5; Nay, 4 --McLane, Gilliam, Kennemer, Wilson)

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Third Reading Of Senate Bills:

SB 55 B-Eng. **JWM** **dp** **7/3/2015** **Taylor**

Agency: Department of Administrative Services Senate Bill 55 authorizes state agencies that request persons to voluntarily supply Social Security numbers on documents relating to any monetary obligation or transaction, to include a notice on the documents that Social Security numbers may be used for state agency debt collection activities, in accordance with rules to be adopted by DAS. This bill provides \$660,474 Others Funds expenditure limitation to DAS and establishes two permanent full-time Operations and Policy 4 positions (2.00 FTE) and one limited duration Operations and Policy Analyst 3 position (1.00 FTE) to provide training and technical assistance to state agencies on managing accounts receivables and collecting liquidated and delinquent accounts. SB 81 B-Eng. **JWM** **dp** **7/3/2015** **Johnson**

Agency: Higher Education Coordinating Commission Senate Bill 81 establishes the Oregon Promise tuition waiver program, to be administered by the Office of Student Access and Completion of the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC). A student is eligible for a grant for courses taken at an Oregon community college if the student meets criteria specified by the bill regarding enrollment in a degree or certificate program, prior educational attainment, Oregon residency, minimum grade point average, continued academic progress, and acceptance of all available federal and state aid. The grant amount will be calculated for each term after subtracting \$50 to be paid by the student and the value of any federal and aid grants the student receives. The grant must be at least \$1,000 or the actual cost of tuition, and no more than the statewide average community college tuition or student's cost of tuition. The grant will be prorated for any student attending part-time. HECC may determine whether student fees should be factored into the actual or average cost of tuition. The commission is authorized to adopt rules for implementation of the program, including application procedures, eligibility and priority determination, policies to improve academic success and completion, eligibility and grant amounts for dual enrollment, and program evaluation. SB 129 B-Eng. **JWM** **dp** **7/3/2015** **Buckley**

Directs Department of Revenue to distribute funds previously transferred to the Shared Services Fund. Modifies distribution of income tax revenue estimated from wages associated with Strategic Investment Program projects. Extends allocation of identified income tax revenue from 2019 to 2029. Modifies implementation of sunset by making agreements for eligible projects reached prior to the sunset date eligible for payments for the life of the agreement. (Committee Vote: Aye, 22; Nay, 2 --Burdick, Girod)

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SB 222 B-Eng. JWM dp 7/3/2015 Williamson

Agency: Office of the Governor The Subcommittee approved a \$175,707 General Fund appropriation to the Office of the Governor and the establishment of one limited duration Principal Executive Manager F position (0.75 FTE) and associated Services and Supplies to staff the Task Force on Legal Representation in Childhood Dependency. This includes the cost for reimbursement for non-legislative task force members. This is a one-time appropriation that is to be phased-out of the agency 2017-19 biennial budget. The bill has an emergency clause and is effective on passage. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

SB 660 B-Eng. JWM dp 7/3/2015 Hayden

Agency: Oregon Health Authority Senate Bill 660 directs OHA to expand the screening and provision of dental sealants to appropriate student populations who attend an elementary school or a middle school in which at least 40.0 percent of all students are eligible to receive assistance under the USDA National School Lunch Program. (Committee Vote: Aye, 24)

SB 774 B-Eng. JWM dp 7/3/2015 Keny-Guyer

Agency: Department of Human Services Senate Bill 774 directs the Home Care Commission (HCC) to adopt a statewide plan to address increasing participation in the home care registry, increasing the number of home care workers, continuing creation of a career ladder to help home care workers become more skilled and gain certifications, conducting orientation sessions for home care workers, and developing an outreach and marketing strategy. The bill encourages implementation of a single online application for all home care workers to apply to the registry and assignment of a universal provider number to each home care worker. The bill requires DHS to report, beginning in 2015, to an interim legislative committee by December 1st each year on the status of implementing an online application and assigning unique provider numbers to home care workers. An existing HCC subcommittee is charged with investigating the feasibility and benefits of certifying home care workers, ways to remove barriers to entry in the workforce, strategies for creating a career ladder, and ways to increase the number of home care workers on the registry. The bill requires the HCC to report the findings of this investigation to an interim legislative committee by November 16, 2015. SB 844 A-Eng. JWM dp 7/3/2015 Lininger

Establishes the 15-member Task Force on Researching the Medical and Public Health Properties of Cannabis and specifies the duties of the Task Force. Requires the Task Force to develop recommendations and report to the Legislature by December 15, 2015, and then again by February 1, 2016. (Committee Vote: Aye, 18; Nay, 6 --McLane, Smith, Whitsett, Johnson, Thomsen, Whitsett)

SB 898 relates to the "fifth year high school" programs where students who have met the requirements for graduation but who stay enrolled in high school while attending a post-secondary institution; and the school district receives funds through the State School Fund and the school formula. This bill suspends adding any further districts to those that already have existing programs and receive State School Fund resources for the 2015-16 school year. School districts could still receive funds for students that have not been in 9-12 for more than four years, or has been in grades 9-12 for more than a total of four years because he/she has not satisfied the diploma requirements, is satisfying the requirements for a modified or extended diploma or has satisfied the requirements for a modified diploma or extended diploma, but not satisfied the requirements for a high school diploma. After the 2015-16 school year the practice returns to the current law without further legislative action. It is anticipated that there will be a review of these types of programs and the Legislature would have the opportunity to address it during the 2016 legislative session.
