

Points Consolidation Incentive Fund shall be available for the purpose of consolidating emergency communications operations and improving efficiency as directed by the Seventy-second Legislative Assembly.

(2) Moneys remaining in the Emergency Communications Account after the payments required under sections 3 and 4 [of this 2001 Act], **chapter 740, Oregon Laws 2001, and sections 5, 6 and 8 of this 2002 third special session Act** shall be transferred to the Primary Public Safety Answering Points Consolidation Incentive Fund established under subsection (1) of this section.

SECTION 8. (1) Sections 5 and 6 of this 2002 third special session Act and the amendments to section 5, chapter 740, Oregon Laws 2001, by section 7 of this 2002 third special session Act are intended to cause a total amount of \$9 million to be credited to the General Fund of the State of Oregon in the biennium beginning July 1, 2001, from tax revenues collected under section 10, chapter 533, Oregon Laws 1981.

(2) If moneys credited to the Emergency Communications Account from collections in the biennium beginning July 1, 2001, are not sufficient to provide for the credit described in section 6 of this 2002 third special session Act, additional moneys from the Enhanced 9-1-1 Subaccount or the Enhanced 9-1-1 Equipment Replacement Subaccount, or both, may be credited to the General Fund of the State of Oregon to make up the difference.

(3) If moneys credited to and retained in the Enhanced 9-1-1 Subaccount are not sufficient to provide for the credit described in section 5 of this 2002 third special session Act, additional moneys from the Emergency Communications Account or the Enhanced 9-1-1 Equipment Replacement Subaccount, or both, may be credited to the General Fund of the State of Oregon to make up the difference.

SECTION 9. Sections 5 and 6 of this 2002 third special session Act and the amendments to section 5, chapter 740, Oregon Laws 2001, by section 7 of this 2002 third special session Act apply to the biennium beginning July 1, 2001.

NOTE: Section 10 was deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

SECTION 11. ORS 292.313 is amended to read: 292.313. The incumbents of each of the following offices shall be paid an annual salary on a monthly basis, as follows:

(1) Governor, \$93,600 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$99,200 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The Governor shall also be paid \$1,000 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

(2) Secretary of State, \$72,000 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$76,300 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The Secretary of State shall also be paid \$250 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

(3) State Treasurer, \$72,000 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$76,300 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The State Treasurer shall also be paid \$250 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

(4) Attorney General, \$77,200 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$81,800 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The Attorney General shall also be paid \$250 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

(5) Superintendent of Public Instruction, \$72,000 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$76,300 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The superintendent shall also be paid \$250 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

(6) Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries, \$72,000 for the year beginning July 1, 2001, and ending June 30, 2002, [and \$76,300 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003,] and for each year thereafter. The commissioner shall also be paid \$250 per month regularly for expenses necessarily incurred but not otherwise provided for.

SECTION 12. Notwithstanding ORS 171.072 (1) and (2):

(1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the annual salary of each member of the Legislative Assembly shall be \$15,396 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003.

(2) The annual salary of the President of the Senate and the annual salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be \$30,792 for the year beginning July 1, 2002, and ending June 30, 2003.

SECTION 13. Section 2, chapter 505, Oregon Laws 2001, is amended to read:

Sec 2. Section 1 [of this 2001 Act], **chapter 505, Oregon Laws 2001**, does not limit, affect or apply to expenditures from the:

- (1) Workers' Benefit Fund.
- (2) Self-Insured Employer Adjustment Reserve.
- (3) Self-Insured Employer Group Adjustment Reserve.

(4) Federal Registry Fund for payment to the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council of annual registry fees collected from state certified and licensed appraisers; Oregon Medical Insurance

Pool Account for payment of claims and third party administration contracts.

(5) Consumer and Business Services Fund for payment of contracted collection costs, including contracted processing costs for the Combined Tax Reporting Program, contracted building codes permit issuance costs, and workers' compensation paying agent reimbursements as outlined in ORS 656.307.

(6) Special payments to the Oregon Health [Sciences] and Science University for research on occupational illness and disease.

(7) Funeral and Cemetery Consumer Protection Trust Fund.

SECTION 14. The following positions, represented by the numbers assigned by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, are abolished:

SECTION 15. Section 23, chapter 942, Oregon Laws 2001, is amended to read:

Sec. 23. (1) Pursuant to ORS 286.560 to 286.580 and 348.716, lottery bonds may be issued to fund projects for the construction of:

(a) A building for the study of the regional agricultural, health and life sciences at Eastern Oregon University; and

(b) A library building at Southern Oregon University.

(2) The use of lottery bond proceeds is authorized based on the following findings:

(a) The universities of the Oregon University System promote the improved education of Oregon's students, especially in the subjects of agricultural, health and life sciences;

(b) The promotion of educated employees for business and industry, especially for those in the agricultural, health and life sciences, expands markets, which in turn creates jobs and stimulates economic development of the state's business and industry; and

(c)(A) A building for the study of the regional agricultural, health and life sciences at Eastern Oregon University will attract faculty and students to the university and create jobs and substantial economic activity for the La Grande area.

(B) A library building at Southern Oregon University will attract faculty and students to the uni-

versity and create jobs and substantial economic activity for the Ashland area.

(3) The aggregate principal amount of lottery bonds issued pursuant to this section may not exceed the sum of [~~\$14~~] **\$19** million and an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs. Lottery bonds issued pursuant to this section shall be issued only at the request of the Chancellor of the Oregon University System.

(4)(a) Of the net proceeds of lottery bonds issued pursuant to this section, \$9 million shall be deposited in the Eastern Oregon University Regional Agricultural, Health and Life Sciences Building Account established in [~~section 14, chapter 845, Oregon Laws 2001~~] **ORS 351.516**.

(b) Of the net proceeds of lottery bonds issued pursuant to this section, [~~\$5~~] **\$10** million shall be deposited in the Southern Oregon University Library Account established in [~~section 13, chapter 845, Oregon Laws 2001~~] **ORS 351.524**.

(5) The proceeds of lottery bonds issued pursuant to this section may be used only for the purposes set forth in subsection (1) of this section and for bond-related costs.

SECTION 16. This 2002 third special session Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2002 third special session Act takes effect on its passage.
