Rayfield was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Eighty-Second Legislative Assembly by acclamation.

Rayfield was escorted to the dais by Breese-Iverson and Fahey where the Oath of Office for Speaker was administered by the Honorable Meagan A. Flynn, Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

Speaker in Chair.

The Honorable Dan Rayfield, Speaker of the House, delivered the following address:

"Thank you again for your trust in me to serve as your Speaker. And thank you, Rep. Nosse, for those kind words.

"We have incredible opportunities before us over the next six months. Oregonians need us to come together to fix the biggest issues in their communities: housing, homelessness, behavioral health, public safety, education, and much more. We'll be working to make sure that government delivers for the people and that we give Oregonians what they need to thrive.

"One of the biggest fears I have in doing this work is that the longer we serve in these seats, the greater risk we have of being removed from these real issues impacting the most vulnerable people in our communities. It can be easier to lose sight of what it means to not have a home or work 15 hours a day to pay your bills. We can become sheltered if we aren't careful.

"It's one of the reasons I see a great opportunity in the amount of turnover we have in this body.

"Have you lost some incredible representatives from both caucuses? Yes.

"Is it going to be an adjustment that we have 21 new representatives in the House? Yes. That's more than one-third of this chamber.

"But that also means we have so many of you who are entering this building with a fresh perspective on the real issues facing your communities and how to fix them. That is how our democracy is supposed to work. And we have an incredible opportunity before us to strengthen the foundation of our democracy.

"Ultimately, I do this work because I believe Oregonians see the positive potential in people, even when they can't see those traits in themselves. There is a genuine compassion in our state, a sense that you are not defined by your failures, but instead how you move forward.

"Let that spirit and compassion guide us over these next six months. Let's recognize that when we disagree, we still truly have more in common that can bring us together. I respect that all of you are here for the right reasons – to make life better in your communities.

"It's been almost three years since we've had a fully in-person legislative session. Today brings excitement for the coming months ahead and the opportunity to work together again on behalf of all Oregonians.

"Most of our House members are going to be in our Capitol hearing rooms for the first time. And space is going to be more limited than ever as essential construction work continues to improve the long-term safety and accessibility of the people's house.

"I ask for your patience and flexibility as this important work continues and want to stress the importance of using this time together to find common ground.

"One of the traditions at the start of each long session is that the Speaker provides a gift to every House member. In the spirit of patience, flexibility and respect, the gift you have each received is a hard hat.

"This is not just a thank you for your patience as the Capitol undergoes construction. Rather, it's a reminder that, just like the hard working crews that are upgrading this building for generations to come, we are here to work together to build something better for Oregonians both today and into the future.

"And I'll close by saying that we can also never forget the people

who truly make this place work: the staff. This is a small community, and we don't really run this place. It's the hard-working people in our facilities department, information services, legislative policy and research, legislative counsel, the state police, security, the clerk's office, who really put us in position to get anything done.

"If we are able to serve Oregonians in these roles, it's because of them. We must always remember this and treat all who work in this space with the respect they deserve.

"All of us are putting on our hard hats and getting to work together for the good of this great state."

Speaker declared nominations were in order for the office of Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives.

Valderrama nominated Mr. Timothy G. Sekerak for the office of Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives.

Wallan seconded the nomination.

Speaker declared nominations closed.

The roll was called by Elmer.

### **RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES**

#### **82nd Legislative Assembly**

**1.01 Definitions.** (1) "Business day" means any day that the House meets in floor session or committees hold meetings. During the interim "business day" shall mean any day of the week except Saturdays, Sundays and state holidays.

(2) "Committee" includes standing, special, joint, conference and

interim committee, and legislative statutory committees, task forces, boards, commissions, and any subcommittee thereof.

(3) “Measure” means bill, resolution, or memorial, but does not include amendments.

(4) “Member” means member of the House.

(5) “Printing” includes electronic transmission of data and any other means of reproducing and distributing documents.

(6) “Remonstrance” shall be considered as a “protest” under Article IV, section 26, of the Oregon Constitution.

(7) “Rule” means a rule and “rules” means the rules of the House of Representatives of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly.

(8) “Session day” begins with the initial convening of the House floor session on that particular calendar day and ends with the adjournment of that floor session.

(9) “Within the bar” means within the House chamber floor area that contains the members’ desks and the rostrum and that is enclosed by waist-high partitions along the north and south sides of the chamber floor area and by the east and west walls of the chamber including the two closets at the back of the House floor area .

## RULES

**2.01 Use of Mason's Manual.** *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure* (2020 edition) shall apply to cases not provided for in the Oregon Constitution or these rules.

**2.03 Legislative Branch Personnel and Contracting Rules.** (1) The Legislative Branch Personnel Rules, as adopted by the House of Representatives on January 14, and August 10, 2020, and as adopted or revised by the Legislative Administration Committee on November 22, 2021 and January 26, 2022, are incorporated into the House Rules by this reference as rules of proceeding of the House.

(2) The Legislative Branch Contracting Rules, as adopted by the Legislative Administration Committee on January 15, 2016, are incorporated into the House Rules by this reference as rules of proceeding of the House.

(3) The Legislative Branch Personnel Rules and Legislative Branch Contracting Rules apply to the nonpartisan offices of the legislative branch when adopted by both the House of Representatives and the Senate.

(4) The Respectful Workplace Policy as adopted by the Joint Committee on Conduct on December 22, 2020 is incorporated into the House Rules by this reference as a rule of proceeding of the House.

(5) Building Policy XV – Capitol Security, as adopted by the Legislative Administration Committee on January 26, 2022, is incorporated into the House Rules by this reference a rule of proceeding of the House.

**2.05 Procedure for Amending Rules.** Thirty-one or more votes are required to adopt, amend or rescind any rule. However, forty or more votes are required to amend or rescind Rule 9.30. Once the House has organized for business the adoption, amendment or rescission of any rule must be proposed in writing, read at a regular business session under the order of business Other Business of the House, referred to the Committee on Rules by the presiding officer, and if reported from the Committee on Rules, upon distribution of the report, it shall be in order to vote on

the proposed amendment immediately.

**2.10 Procedure for Suspending Rules.** (1) Forty or more votes are required to suspend any rule, except for House Rule 3.08 which takes a majority of members present.

(2) When a motion to suspend the rules is defeated, the motion shall not be renewed until after an intervening recess or adjournment.

**2.20 Rules of the House.** Except as modified or rescinded under Rule 2.05, these rules shall be in effect for the entire term of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly, whether the House is in session or has adjourned sine die.

## CONVENING

**3.01 Quorum.** (1) A quorum of the House is forty members.

(2) If a quorum is present, the House shall proceed to transact its business. If there is no quorum present, a lesser number of members may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members.

**3.03 Attendance.** (1) Except for emergencies, a member shall attend all sessions of the House unless an Excused Absence Request is filed with the Chief Clerk forty-eight (48) hours in advance. All requests for an excused absence will be presumed approved unless the member is otherwise notified by the presiding officer.

(2) A member shall attend all meetings of the committees of the House of which he or she is a member unless excused by a chair.

(3) No member shall be considered excused, however, unless the presiding officer or a chair has announced the excuse at the opening of the House session or committee meeting, or at the earliest possible time thereafter. As required by the Oregon Constitution, 10 or more unexcused absences by any House member from legislative floor sessions called to transact business during a regular or special legislative session shall be deemed disorderly behavior and shall disqualify the member from holding office as a Representative for the term following the election after the member’s current term is completed. For the purposes of this rule, attendance at “legislative floor sessions” shall be determined when the quorum roll call is performed at the beginning of a session day or if there is a Call of the House during that session day. No excuse may be announced while the House is under a Call of the House. No member shall be assessed an unexcused absence more than once per calendar day.

(4) Appeals of rulings made by the presiding officer or the Speaker shall be handled under House Rule 6.35.

**3.05 Session Hour.** Unless otherwise ordered by the presiding officer or a majority of the members present, the regular hour of meeting shall be 11:00 a.m. on the session day as set by an adopted motion.

**3.07 Open Sessions.** All deliberations and meetings of the House shall be open to the press and public.

**3.08 Daily Session Length.** (1) A session day begins with the initial convening of the House that calendar day and ends with the adjournment of that session. The House shall not meet for more than twelve hours on any session day, excluding time used in recess, unless a majority of those members present vote to suspend this provision.

(2) The convening of a new House floor session after adjournment of a floor session constitutes the beginning of a new

session day.

## VOTING

**3.12 Electronic Roll Call System.** The electronic voting system shall be under the control of the presiding officer and shall be operated by the Chief Clerk. The names of the members shall be listed on the electronic roll call board in alphabetical order, except that the name of the Speaker shall be last.

**3.15 Roll Call.** (1) The electronic voting system shall be used as the roll call to determine the presence of a quorum and/or the presence of members under a Call of the House. Members shall press the “yea” button on their desk or be recognized by the Chief Clerk to record their attendance.

(2) A roll call vote of “yeas” and “nays” shall be taken and recorded on the final passage or adoption of all measures. Except as otherwise provided in these rules, the vote shall be recorded by the electronic voting system.

(3) Upon demand of two members, an oral roll call shall be taken and recorded on any measure that requires more than 31 affirmative votes. The Clerk shall call the roll of the membership, alternating between alphabetical order and reverse alphabetical order. The Speaker’s name shall be called last.

(4) If the presiding officer is in doubt on any motion or a division is called for on a motion, a roll call shall be taken and recorded by the electronic voting system on the motion. On all other questions to be voted upon, unless otherwise provided in these rules, the presiding officer may order the “yeas” and “nays” taken by the electronic voting system.

(5) The electronic voting system shall not be used for election of officers.

(6) In the event the electronic voting system is not in operating order when voting on any question, the presiding officer shall order all “yea” and “nay” votes be taken by oral roll call. The Clerk shall call the roll of the membership in alphabetical order. The Speaker’s name shall be called last.

(7) The vote of any member that has not been recorded because of malfunction of the electronic voting system shall be entered into the record if that member was within the House chamber at the time of the vote and attempted to cast their vote at the appropriate time, and the fact of such malfunction is reported to the presiding officer prior to the announcement of the result of the vote.

**3.20 Requirements for Voting.** (1) Each member within the bar as defined in House Rule 1.01(9) when the question is pending, and the member’s name is called, shall vote. No member shall be allowed to abstain from voting.

(2) If a member refuses to vote when the member’s name is called, the presiding officer shall immediately call for the member’s vote a second time. If the member again refuses to vote, the presiding officer shall read subsection (3) of this rule. The presiding officer shall then call for the member to announce the member’s vote immediately. If the member fails to vote immediately after this third request, the presiding officer shall state for the record: “The member’s failure to vote constitutes an intentional violation of House Rule 3.20, subsection (1) and a high breach of decorum. The Journal shall show that the Representative is censured for the violation; the clerk shall record the Representative’s vote on the measure or motion on which the member refused to vote as a ‘yea;’ and the member may also be subject to other penalties as the House may order.”

(3) Any member’s refusal to vote, as required by House rules, shall be recorded in the Journal as an intentional violation of Rule 3.20 (1) and a high breach of decorum. The Representative shall be censured; the Clerk shall record the Representative’s vote on the measure or motion on which the member refused to vote as a “yea;” and the member may also be subject to other penalties as the House may order.

(4) No member, except by unanimous consent, shall be permitted to vote upon any question unless he or she is within the bar before the electronic voting system is closed. No member shall vote or be allowed to change their vote after the presiding officer announces the result of the roll call by declaring the question has passed or failed to pass.

**3.21 Announcement of Conflict of Interest.** (1) When involved in an actual or potential conflict of interest, as defined by ORS 244.020, a member shall announce, on the floor or in the committee meeting, the nature of the actual or potential conflict prior to voting on the issue giving rise to the conflict.

(2) The member shall file in writing a statement of the nature of the actual or potential conflict with the Chief Clerk or the committee assistant by 5:00 p.m. the next business day following the vote on the measure. The statement shall be limited to the substance of the oral explanation given on the floor or in committee. The member’s announcement of an actual or potential conflict of interest shall be recorded in the Journal or in the committee recording log.

**3.26 Electronic Roll Call; Time, Changes.** When a vote is taken using the electronic voting system, the members shall be allowed thirty seconds to cast their vote, during which time the vote tallies will be displayed. The presiding officer shall call all of the names of the members present who have yet to vote before determining that a vote shall be closed and the result declared. Before the result is declared, any member who was within the bar and desires to change his or her vote may request that of the presiding officer. The presiding officer shall direct the Chief Clerk to make the proper entry into the electronic voting system.

**3.28 Electronic Roll Call; Misuse, Penalties.** No member shall vote for another member using the electronic voting system. No member shall tamper with, alter, or attempt to alter the electronic voting system, or cause the electronic voting system to register a vote without the member personally depressing a voting button during each roll call vote. Any member who violates this rule may be punished as determined by the vote of at least 31 members. If a person not a member votes or attempts to vote for any member or violates a provision of this rule, he or she shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session, and he or she may be punished further as determined by the vote of at least 31 members.

**3.30 Voting by Presiding officer.** The Speaker shall vote whenever a roll call is required. The Speaker’s name shall be called last on an oral roll call vote.

**3.35 Explanation of Vote.** (1) Any member who wishes to explain his or her vote shall file the written explanation with the Chief Clerk by 5:00 p.m. the next business day following the vote on the measure. The vote explanation filed under this subsection must comply with subsection (2) of this rule. If the explanation does not meet those requirements in the determination of the Chief Clerk, the Speaker may refuse to cause the explanation to be printed in the Journal. An appeal of the presiding officer’s ruling may be taken to the full body at the next floor session pursuant to

House Rule 6.35.

(2) The vote explanation shall be germane to the subject and shall not reflect on the honor or integrity of any other member.

**3.45 Written Measures Required for Voting.** No measure or amendment to a measure shall be finally voted on until it has been made available electronically or printed and placed on the desks of the members.

**3.50 Third Reading Requirement.** (1) No bill shall pass the House until after third reading and no measure shall be read more than once in any one day.

(2) A bill may be referred or re-referred to committee on third reading.

**3.55 Call of the House.** (1) Six members may demand a Call of the House at any time before a roll call has begun.

(2) Upon a Call of the House, no other business shall be transacted until the proceedings are so terminated.

(3) Upon a Call of the House, the Sergeant at Arms shall cause all members who are not excused to come to the House chamber. If the Sergeant at Arms cannot locate any unexcused member, the Sergeant at Arms shall so report to the presiding officer, who shall announce the fact to the members.

(4) All members must remain within the House chamber until the vote is taken for which the Call was made. However, when the House is waiting for an unexcused member to return to the floor, or in order to access the facilities, or the presiding officer has announced that the House is "at ease," the members may have access to restrooms if escorted directly to and from the facilities by House floor staff, staff will wait outside the facility. Members must then return to within the House chamber.

(5) A Call of the House shall be considered terminated when the question for which the Call was invoked has been voted upon or when a motion to terminate the Call is approved by at least forty members. The motion to terminate the Call shall be in order when the Sergeant at Arms has reported that unexcused members cannot be returned within a reasonable time. Termination of the Call under this subsection terminates the requirement that the Sergeant at Arms search for unexcused members. In the absence of a quorum after the report of the Sergeant at Arms is received, the House may terminate the Call by the unanimous consent of the members present.

(6) Upon a Call and until the proceedings are terminated, the presiding officer shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to authorize members of the Senate, representatives of the news media and staff identified under House Rule 17.01(1) to leave or enter the chamber.

## ORDER OF BUSINESS

**4.01 Order of Business.** (1) The general order of business shall be:

- (a) Call to Order.
- (b) Opening Ceremony, prayer and/or inspirational message. (At the opening session of the day only.)
- (c) Courtesies.
- (d) Verification of Quorum.
- (e) Messages from the Governor.
- (f) Messages from the Senate.
- (g) Introduction and First Reading of Memorials and

Resolutions.

- (h) Committee Reports
- (i) Propositions and Motions.
- (j) Introduction and First Reading of House Bills.
- (k) Second Reading of House Bills.
- (l) Consent Calendar.
- (m) Third Reading of House Bills.
- (n) Final Reading of Memorials and Resolutions.
- (o) Bills, Reports and Other Business Lying on the Table.
- (p) First Reading of Senate Bills.
- (q) Second Reading of Senate Bills.
- (r) Third Reading of Senate Bills.
- (s) Other Business of the House.
- (t) Announcements.
- (u) Remonstrances.
- (v) Adjournment

(2) The presiding officer, under the orders of business Committee Reports may announce the distribution of the committee report file to the members' desks. No reading of such reports will then take place.

(3) Messages from the Governor, the Senate or any state official and committee report files may be read or distributed at any time.

(4) A quorum is not required under the orders of business Opening Ceremony, Courtesies, Remonstrances or Adjournment, nor will a Call of the House be in order.

(5) Under the order of business Courtesies, a member's remarks are limited to 60 seconds and yields are not permitted. All honorary pages and/or groups shall be greeted by the presiding officer on behalf of the House. A request to return to the order of business Courtesies shall be out of order until all other orders of the day have been completed.

(6) Under the order of business Remonstrances, no member may speak for longer than three minutes, or for a second time, or yield time to another member. The motives or integrity of any member of the House or the Senate shall not be impugned.

(7) Questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided without debate.

(8) The general order of business shall not be varied except upon suspension of the rules. However, any subject before the House may be made a Special Order of Business upon the vote of a majority of the members present and, when the time fixed for consideration of the subject arrives, the presiding officer shall take up the subject.

(9) Appropriation bills shall take precedence over all other measures on the Third Reading Calendar.

**4.05 Consent Calendar.** (1) Each session day, a consent calendar of measures may be presented for consideration and vote of the House. The consent calendar shall be made available to members prior to consideration.

(2) (a) Any measure reported out of committee unanimously, with or without amendments, may be placed on the consent calendar if the committee reporting the bill so recommends.

(b) Any measure reported out of committee with the recommendation that it be placed on the consent calendar shall be placed on the second reading calendar under House Rule 9.32 (1) and (2).

(3) Any measure recommended for the consent calendar shall be placed on the calendar but held at the Desk for two days after the day on which the measure was listed on the committee report file or read under the order of business of Committee Reports. During that period, members may submit written objection to the placing of the measure on the consent calendar. If four objections signed by members of the House are received at the Desk within the two-day period, the measure shall be removed from the consent calendar and placed in its proper order on the third reading calendar for the next session day. A measure may also be removed from the consent calendar by order of the Speaker.

(4) If no objections or an insufficient number are filed within the two-day period, the measure shall be placed in numerical order on the next consent calendar. When the order of business Consent Calendar is reached, the presiding officer shall announce the calendar. The clerk shall read each measure by number, title, and short summary. Immediately following the reading, the presiding officer shall place the question of third reading and final passage and call for the vote. Only a Call of the House shall be in order prior to a roll call being taken.

(5) No measure which has been made the subject of a motion to reconsider shall be placed on the consent calendar.

## MOTIONS

**5.01 Making a Motion.** (1) When a motion is made, it shall be restated by the presiding officer.

(2) A motion shall be reduced to writing upon request of the presiding officer or of any member.

(3) No second to a motion is required.

**5.05 Motion in Possession of the House.** After a motion is restated by the presiding officer, it is in the possession of the House. The motion may be withdrawn only with the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present and at a time before decision is made on the motion or the motion is amended.

**5.10 Precedence of Motions.** (1) When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except the following:

- (a) To adjourn.
- (b) To recess.
- (c) To lay on the table.
- (d) For the previous question.
- (e) To postpone to a certain time or day.
- (f) To refer or re-refer.
- (g) To amend.
- (h) To postpone indefinitely.
- (i) To reconsider.

(2) The motions listed in subsection (1) of this rule shall have precedence in the order in which they are listed.

**5.15 Nondebatable Motions.** Motions to adjourn, to recess, to lay on the table, to withdraw a measure from committee and for the previous question are not debatable. Pending a decision on any of those motions, all incidental questions of order, whether or not on

appeal, shall be decided without debate.

**5.20 Votes on Motions.** If the presiding officer is in doubt of the outcome on any motion, the vote on the question shall be conducted as provided under Rule 3.15 (3).

**5.30 Division of the Question.** Any member may call for a division of a question if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that, if one is taken away, a substantive proposition remains for the decision of the House. The question of final passage or adoption of any measure is not subject to division.

**5.35 Amendments to be Germane.** No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

**5.37 Amendments to the Title of a Bill.** The "Relating to" clause of a bill up to the first semicolon shall not be amended by the House. If a title of a House bill is amended by the Senate, the bill upon return shall be held at the Desk and no further consideration of the bill shall occur.

**5.40 Amendments on the Floor.** No measure shall be amended on the floor of the House.

## DEBATE AND DECORUM

**6.01 Decorum During Session and Committee Proceedings.** (1) No one shall be disruptive during proceedings of the House.

(2) To maintain professionalism and safety in the legislative process, members and employees should dress according to standards of contemporary business, cultural, or ceremonial attire.

(3) It shall be considered disorderly behavior under Article IV, Section 15, of the Oregon Constitution for any member to, among other things, act in a manner that creates a reasonable concern for the immediate security of the Capitol.

**6.05 Use of Electronic Devices.** (1) Audible use of cellular phones is prohibited during floor sessions and committee meetings.

(2) Any use of electronic equipment that distracts from the proceedings of the House is prohibited during floor sessions and committee meetings.

**6.07 Recognition of Members.** (1) When a member seeks to be recognized by the presiding officer, the member or caucus designee shall use the appropriate electrical signal device at the member's desk.

(2) The device labeled "to speak" shall be used when a member seeks recognition for purposes of debate or making motions.

(3) The device labeled "personal privilege" shall be used only for purposes requiring immediate consideration by the House as described under *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*, section 92.

(4) The only exceptions to this rule shall be when demanding a Call of the House or a roll call.

**6.10 Conduct in Debate.** (1) When a member is recognized by the presiding officer, the member shall rise from his or her seat, unless this requirement is waived by the presiding officer, and respectfully address the presiding officer.

(2) The member must confine discussion to the question under debate. No person may indulge in personalities, impugn motives of members, use indecent or profane language, or participate in conduct that disrupts or disturbs the orderly proceedings of the

body.

(3) (a) All questions asked of a member shall be addressed to the member through the presiding officer.

(b) In speaking, a member shall address another member by using the title of Representative and the member's district number or other description of district, or the title of Representative and his or her surname.

(4) A member may refer to discussions or actions that have taken place in committee meetings.

(5) Under circumstances where a member is present inside the chamber and in order to accommodate their medical condition, a member wishes to have their remarks on a measure read by another member of their choice, the presiding officer may allow the designated member to read the requesting member's remarks as written. The member reading the remarks will begin by identifying that they are reading the remarks of their colleague, and while doing so must adhere to the time limits and other House rules of debate. Once the remarks are finished the requestor will signify to the presiding officer that the preceding remarks were correctly offered in accordance with their request.

**6.20 Interrupting a Member.** Only the presiding officer is authorized to interrupt without consent a member who is speaking.

**6.25 Frequency with Which a Member May Speak.** (1) The author of a motion or the member designated to carry a measure shall have the privilege of closing the debate on the motion or the measure.

(2) Except as authorized by subsection (1) of this rule, no member shall speak more than once on any question until every member wishing to speak on the question has spoken.

(3) If a pending question is lost by reason of adjournment and is revived on the following day, a member who has spoken on the question on the preceding day shall not be permitted to speak again on the question until every member wishing to speak on the question has spoken.

(4) No member may speak more than twice on any question.

**6.27 Floor Letters.** (1) All informational literature must bear the legible name and signature of the House member making the request. No anonymous material may be distributed by the Clerk's office at any time.

(2) The requester shall provide the Chief Clerk with 61 total copies of the material, 60 for distribution to the members' floor desks, and an original for the Chief Clerk's office use.

(3) If the material is associated with a legislative measure, the measure number should be featured prominently in the header of the floor letter to assist the Clerk's Office in posting the information to OLIS correctly. If the floor letter deals with multiple measures the Clerk's Office will link it to all numbers listed in the header. If the letter does not have a bill number, the Clerk's Office will post it by the subject listed in the header and by the date filed.

(4) The time to provide materials to the Chief Clerk's Office begins at 8:00 AM or at least 60 minutes prior to the starting time of floor session and ends 30 minutes before the scheduled starting time of that day's floor session. If there is a supplemental Third Reading issued for that day's floor session, a new opportunity will be offered to distribute floor letters for those added measures only.

(5) House Rule 6.10 applies to floor letters. Floor letters that do not comply with House decorum rules in the opinion of the Chief

Clerk will be held at the Desk and will not be distributed.

(6) An appeal of the decision of the Chief Clerk to not distribute a floor letter may be taken to the Speaker if the sponsoring member disagrees with the Clerk's determination. If the Speaker sustains the Clerk's determination, an appeal of the presiding officer's ruling may be taken to the full body at the next floor session pursuant to House Rule 6.35.

**6.30 Limitation on Duration of Debate.** The following rules apply to the length of debate:

(1) On the final passage or repassage of a measure, the chair of the committee that reports the measure shall designate a carrier that may speak for ten minutes. Other members may speak for five minutes.

(2) When a committee report is accompanied by a minority report, the member carrying the committee report may speak for ten minutes, and upon a motion to substitute a minority report for the committee report, the member carrying the minority report may speak for ten minutes. Other members may speak for five minutes.

(3) The carrier shall have ten minutes to close on final passage of a measure or on a motion to substitute a minority report. The Clerk shall keep the time.

(4) On other debatable motions, no member shall speak longer than five minutes.

(5) Any member may yield his or her time allowed under subsection (1) of this rule to another member. However, no member may yield his or her time to a member closing debate.

**6.35 Call to Order.** (1) The presiding officer shall call to order any member who violates the rules of the House. The member who is called to order shall cease speaking and shall be seated immediately unless the presiding officer permits him or her to explain.

(2) If the member who is called to order appeals the ruling of the presiding officer, the House shall decide the appeal without debate. If the House decides the appeal in favor of the member, the member may proceed with the debate. If the House decides the appeal against the member, the member may be liable to a motion of censure of the House.

**6.40 Discipline.** If a member objects to words spoken in debate, the member shall immediately depress the electrical device labeled "personal privilege." The presiding officer shall recognize the member prior to any other member. Once recognized, the member shall repeat the words to which the objection is taken, and they shall be recorded by the Desk personnel. However, if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the objection to them was made, the member shall not be held answerable or subject to censure therefor.

## OFFICERS OF THE HOUSE

**7.01 Election of Officers.** (1) The members shall elect a presiding officer who shall be Speaker of the House. They shall also elect a Speaker *Pro Tempore* of the House and a Chief Clerk of the House.

(2) Officers of the House of Representatives must receive the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected.

**7.05 Temporary Presiding Officers.** (1) The Speaker may designate a member other than the Speaker *Pro Tempore* to act temporarily as the presiding officer. The designation shall not

extend beyond the daily adjournment of the day of appointment. The member does not lose the right to vote while presiding. The Speaker may resume the chair at any time.

(2) If at any time the office of Speaker becomes vacant because of the removal from office, death, resignation, or other disqualification of the person holding that office, then the Speaker *Pro Tempore* becomes Speaker until the that basis is removed or a new Speaker is elected. The Speaker *Pro Tempore* shall not be considered the Speaker within the meaning of Article V, section 8a, of the Oregon Constitution, providing for succession to the Governorship.

**7.10 Duties of Presiding Officers.** (1) The Speaker shall enforce all rules, laws, and regulations applicable to the body.

(2) The Speaker, as presiding officer, or in the Speaker's absence, another member acting as temporary presiding officer, shall take the chair every session day at the hour as provided in these rules or the hour to which the body adjourned the preceding daily session, and immediately call the members to order.

(3) The Speaker, as presiding officer, or in the Speaker's absence any member acting as temporary presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum and decide questions of order subject to appeal by any two members.

(4) The Speaker, as presiding officer, or in the Speaker's absence any member acting as temporary presiding officer shall have general control and direction of all employees of the Legislative Assembly when they are on the floor of the House.

(5) The Speaker shall have control of the area set aside for use by the House and the ways adjacent thereto.

## COMMITTEES

**8.01 Names of Committees.** The Speaker shall name standing, special, joint and conference committees to which to refer all measures during legislative session, and interim committees to operate during the interim periods.

**8.05 Committee Appointments.** (1) Except as otherwise provided by law or resolution, members of all standing, special, statutory, joint, and conference committees and subcommittees, and the Chairs and Vice-Chairs thereof, for session and interim, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

(2) The Speaker shall appoint majority party and minority party members to all committees, in no lesser than the same proportion as the number of minority party members in the House to the total membership of the House. Except as otherwise provided by law, the Speaker shall determine the number of members of each committee.

(3) In determining committee appointments, the Speaker shall survey the interest of each House member and shall consult in good faith with the elected leader of each caucus.

**8.10 Committee Quorum; Rules.** (1) A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business before the committee, provided, however, that each committee may by rule designate a lesser number of its members as a quorum for receiving public testimony.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in these rules, all committees of the House shall be governed by *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*.

**8.15 Committee Meetings.** (1) All committees shall meet at the call of the Chair, or upon the request of a majority of the

members of the committee directed by and with the approval of the Speaker.

(2) No committee shall meet during the time the House is in session without leave of the Speaker. Any member attending such a meeting shall be considered excused to attend business of the House subject to a Call of the House.

(3)(a) Meetings of the House and its committees shall be open to the public. No quorum of any committee shall meet in private for the purpose of deliberating or taking collective action on any matter.

(b) As used in this subsection:

(i) "Collective action" means a joint decision, commitment or promise made between two or more persons.

(ii) "Deliberate" means to discuss for the purpose of taking collective action, whether or not collective action is actually taken.

(4) The House and its committees shall not hold a meeting in any building where discrimination on the basis of race, creed, color, sex, age, disability, religion, sexual orientation or national origin is practiced.

(5)(a) The House and its committees shall provide for and give public notice, reasonably calculated to give actual notice to interested persons, of the time, place and subject matter of regular and special meetings.

(b) As used in this rule, "notice" includes, but is not limited to, posting of notice outside the House chamber, and if possible, on the Oregon Legislature's website, and any other suitable and conspicuous place.

(c) All committee meetings during the organizational session shall be considered emergency meetings under the provision of ORS 192.640.

(d) Notice requirements for the 2023 regular session are as follows:

(i) Measures scheduled for their first public hearing shall not be held without at least 72 hours' notice.

(ii) All other committee meetings shall not be held without at least 48 hours' notice.

(iii) Committees may conduct meetings on measures with one hour's notice if notice of the meeting was posted three weekdays prior to the convening of the 2023 regular session. This subparagraph applies to only the first three days of the 2023 regular session.

(e) Notice requirements for the 2024 regular session are as follows:

(i) Measures scheduled for their first public hearing shall not be held without at least 48 hours' notice.

(ii) All other committee meetings shall not be held without at least 24 hours' notice.

(iii) Committees may conduct meetings on measures with one hour's notice if notice of the meeting was posted 48 hours prior to the convening of the 2024 regular session. This subparagraph applies to only the first three days of the 2024 regular session.

(f) Notice requirements for the interim are as follows:

(i) Items scheduled for public hearing shall not be held without at least 48 hours' notice.

(ii) All other committee meetings shall not be held without at

least 24 hours' notice.

(g) In case of an actual emergency, a meeting may be held upon notice appropriate to the circumstances.

(h) With approval of the Speaker, interim committees may conduct public hearings.

(6) When the Speaker has reason to believe that adjournment sine die of the session is imminent or that the public interest would be seriously prejudiced by delay, the Speaker may invoke the provisions of subsection (5)(g) of this rule relating to emergencies by declaring that an emergency exists. If the House is in session, the presiding officer shall announce the emergency and the reasons why it is declared to exist. If the House is not in session, the Speaker shall notify members that an emergency exists and the reasons therefor by distributing such information to the desks of the members. For any meeting called under this emergency provision, notice shall be posted outside the House chamber, and if possible, on the Oregon Legislature's website, and any other suitable and conspicuous place. If the meeting scheduled is for the purpose of taking public testimony, at least 24 hours' notice must be given by posting the notice outside the House chamber and any other suitable and conspicuous place. A majority of the members may invoke this subsection and notice shall be given as described in this subsection.

(7) The Chair or the Speaker shall cause notice of each committee meeting to be given to the public and notice to be posted outside the House chamber, and if possible, on the Oregon Legislature's website, and any other suitable and conspicuous place. Such posting and notice to the public shall be given immediately upon call of meetings, and notice of the meeting shall be announced on the floor if the House is in session.

(8) All meetings of House committees shall be recorded. A recording log sufficient to serve as an index to the recording shall be available to the public within a reasonable time after the meeting and shall contain at least the following information:

(a) Members present, excused or absent;

(b) All motions and their disposition;

(c) The results of all votes;

(9) Testimony and exhibits submitted shall be considered as part of the official record.

(10) Committee members may, upon approval of the Speaker, participate in any type of committee meeting through the use of telephone or other electronic communication medium that allows them and other participants to hear or read proceedings as they occur and to hear or read votes as they occur. The Chair may allow members of the public to testify by telephone or other electronic means. Nothing in this rule modifies a chair's existing authority to place time limits on witness testimony or limit testimony to topics germane to the committee's agenda.

(11) Whenever any person has cause to believe that either the declared purpose or the procedure specified in this rule has been violated by the House, by any committee or by any member, the person is entitled to file a complaint with the Committee on Rules. The committee shall conduct a hearing on the matter and shall, if it concludes that the complaint is justified, recommend to the House that censure or other action be taken.

**8.20 Committee Action Required.** (1) The Chair shall schedule a hearing or work session on a measure in possession of the committee upon receipt of a written request signed by a majority of committee members. The request must be filed with the

Chair, the Speaker and the Chief Clerk. The hearing or work session shall be held only after notice as required by Rule 8.15 (5) but shall be held within five business days after the date of the request.

(2) Except by a suspension of the rules by the affirmative vote of a two-thirds majority of the members of the committee or subcommittee, a committee or subcommittee may take action on amendments to a measure only after the full text of the amendments has been made publicly available online for at least four hours unless the conditions under House Rule 8.15(6) are invoked and then amendments must be publicly available online for at least one hour.

(3) A committee may act on each measure in its possession:

(a) By tabling the measure in committee; or

(b) By reporting the measure out of the committee:

(i) With the recommendation that it be referred to another committee;

(ii) Favorably as to passage; or

(iii) Without recommendation.

(4) In reporting a measure out, a committee shall include in its report:

(a) The measure in the form reported out;

(b) The recommendation of the committee;

(c) An identification of all substantive changes made by the committee in the measure;

(d) An analysis of the measure;

(e) The fiscal impact statement prepared by the Legislative Fiscal Officer;

(f) The revenue impact statement prepared by the Legislative Revenue Officer; and

(g) The budget notes, if any, as adopted by a majority of the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.

(5) In compliance with the appropriate Enrolled Concurrent Resolution (of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly), all committees shall complete their work as outlined. No exception to this rule shall be allowed unless provided for by at least 40 affirmative votes.

(6) For the 2023 regular session, when a measure is reported out of committee, it shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the House within three session days after the committee action reporting the measure out.

(7) For the 2024 regular session:

(a) When a measure is reported out of committee without amendments, it shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the House within one business day after the committee action reporting the measure out.

(b) When a measure is reported out of committee with amendments, it shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the House within two business days after the committee action reporting the measure out.

**8.22 Limitation on Committee Amendments.** Whenever a measure has a subsequent referral to the Ways and Means Committee or Revenue Committee, neither of those committees shall propose to amend the measure in a manner that affects the

substance with any other than a fiscal or revenue impact unless the Chair of the House committee to which the initial referral was made consents to the amendments. The proposed amendments must be consistent with Rule 5.35.

**8.23 Sponsorship of Proposed Amendments.** (1) Every proposed amendment offered in a House policy committee and joint policy committee shall bear the name of the legislator or committee that requested the proposed amendment. Amendments that bear the name of a committee shall also include the name of the legislator or the name of an individual, organization, state agency or local government on whose behalf the amendment was requested, or both.

(2) The member or committee making the request shall notify Legislative Counsel in writing at the time the request is made. No more than two requesters may be listed on a proposed amendment.

**8.25 Committee Actions to be Recorded and Reported.** (1) Motions on measures before a committee shall be voted on by the members of the committee, and the vote of each member shall be recorded in the committee recording log. All motions on measures shall be adopted only on the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the committee.

(2) The report of committee action on each measure must be made to the Chief Clerk who shall cause the report to be entered appropriately in the House Measure History Report and Journal as a part of the history of the measure.

**8.30 Committee of the Whole Prohibited.** No motion to resolve into the committee of the whole shall be allowed.

## REFERRAL OF MEASURES; COMMITTEE REPORTS

**9.01 Referral to Committee.** (1) Upon first reading of any measure, the measure shall be passed to the Speaker for referral. For the 2023 regular session, not later than seven calendar days following such reading, the measure shall be referred by the Speaker to any standing, special or joint committee, however, those measures read for the first time during the organizational session shall be referred no later than eight calendar days from the opening day of that session. For the 2024 regular session, not later than five calendar days following such reading, the measure shall be referred by the Speaker to any standing, special or joint committee.

(2) Referrals shall be listed on the committee referral notice which shall be made available to the members or announced by the presiding officer immediately following the measure's first reading. Referrals shall be posted in the House Measure History Report and upon convening of the House, the Journal shall include a cumulative listing of all referrals in order by date.

(3) In carrying out the provisions of this rule, at the time of initial referral, the Speaker may make a subsequent referral of any measure to one or more standing, special or joint committees to be effective after the measure is reported out of the committee to which it was first referred.

(4) At the request of a committee reporting on a measure, the Speaker may rescind or add a subsequent referral to another committee.

(5) The Chair of the committee having jurisdiction of a measure by referral or subsequent referral under this rule may request the Chair of any other standing, special or joint committee to review the measure. Upon acceptance of the measure by the Chair of the reviewing committee, and with the consent of the Speaker, the reviewing committee may conduct hearings, hold work sessions and

forward a recommendation, including proposed amendments, to the original committee, which shall retain jurisdiction over the measure.

**9.05 Committee Reports.** After it is submitted to the Desk, every committee report recommending amendments to a measure shall be sent by the Chief Clerk to the Publication Services unit of the Legislative Counsel for examination in the same manner as bills are examined by the unit.

**9.10 Consideration of Committee Reports.** (1) Reports from standing committees shall be listed on the committee report file, which shall be made available to the members or be read under the order of business of Committee Reports in the numerical order of the measure, except that reports on appropriation measures shall precede reports of other measures. Committee recommendations shall be posted in the House Measure History Report and upon convening of the House, the Journal shall include a cumulative listing of all committee recommendations in order by date.

(2) No motion is required to adopt a committee report, unless the bill has a minority report also.

**9.15 Minority Reports; Dissents.** (1) If a minority report, subscribed to by at least two members who are present and vote in opposition to the committee report, accompanies the committee report, both shall be filed and placed on the calendar under the order of business Propositions and Motions. No member may sign on to more than one report for a particular measure at the same time. For the 2023 regular session, the minority report shall be filed and placed on the calendar no later than the second session day after distribution of amendments. For the 2024 Regular Session, the minority report shall be filed and placed on the calendar no later than the session day following second reading.

(2) As all committee reports are properly before the House without debate or requirement of adoption prior to third reading and final passage, when the committee report is accompanied by a minority report the following process shall be in order. The carrier of the committee report shall explain the committee report and without debate the carrier of the minority report may move immediately that the minority report be substituted for the committee report. After the motion to substitute has been decided, the measure, if a bill, shall be immediately considered as provided by Rule 9.37 (2) or, if other than a bill, as provided by Rule 9.35 (3).

(3) The notice of intent to file a minority report may only be applied to a measure reported out of a policy committee. They shall notify the Chair and committee staff no later than two hours after adjournment of the committee meeting during which such final action was taken. "Policy Committee" for the purposes of this rule means any House committee to which measures are referred, but does not mean joint committee, statutory committee, subcommittee, special committee, or conference committee.

(4) The deadlines for delivery of the minority report to committee staff shall be as follows:

(a) For the 2023 regular session, any members giving such notice shall have until 5 p.m. of the second business day after giving notice to deliver the minority report, including a Legislative Counsel draft, to the committee staff. Minority reports shall be filed at the Desk on the same day the committee report is filed.

(b) For the 2024 regular session, any members giving such notice shall have until 5 p.m. of the next business day after giving notice to deliver the minority report, including a Legislative Counsel draft, to the committee staff. Minority reports shall be filed at the Desk on the same day the committee report is filed.

(c) A minority report must be filed with the committee staff not later than the next business day following the day on which notice is given to the committee of intent to file the report, if the presiding officer has ruled that adjournment sine die is imminent.

(5) Any member of a committee who dissents from the committee report shall be listed in the committee report as not concurring therein. The names of members dissenting shall be recorded in the Journal and House Measure History Report.

(6) The minority report is subject to the requirements of Rule 5.35.

(7) Issues contained within a minority report must have been submitted as proposed Legislative Counsel amendments and distributed to the committee for possible consideration. The current version of a measure as submitted to the committee may be used as a minority report without it having to be resubmitted as an amendment.

(8) If a work session occurs within 24 hours of the first House public hearing, subsection (7) will not apply. However, the issues contained within the minority report must have come under discussion of the measure, in the committee filing the committee report.

**9.30 Withdrawing Measure from Committee.** (1) A measure, including one referred by the House to a joint committee, may be withdrawn from a committee by the affirmative vote of 31 or more members.

(2) The motion to withdraw a measure from committee shall be in order only under the order of business Propositions and Motions.

(3) Immediately following a motion to withdraw a measure from committee, the presiding officer shall direct the Clerk to read the measure's number, title and summary and without debate place the question and call for the vote. The measure shall be scheduled in compliance with Rules 9.32, 9.35 and 9.37. The version withdrawn from committee shall be the version that exists at the time the motion is made as provided under subsection (2) of this rule.

**9.32 When a Bill Goes to Second Reading.** (1) Prior to third reading and final consideration, a bill must be read a second time. No motion affecting the status of the bill on second reading will be in order.

(2) When a bill is reported favorably without amendments, the bill shall be placed on the next available calendar for second reading. When a bill is reported favorably with amendments, the bill shall be placed on the next available calendar for second reading after the amendments or the engrossed bill is made available electronically or printed and distributed to the desks of the members.

(3) When a bill is reported with a minority report, the bill shall be placed on the next available calendar for second reading after the amendments or engrossed bills are made available electronically or printed and distributed to the desks of the members.

**9.35 When a Measure Other Than a Bill Goes to Final Reading.** (1) When a measure other than a bill is reported favorably and without amendments, the measure shall be placed on the calendar for final reading the next session day following receipt.

(2) When a measure other than a bill is reported favorably with amendments, the measure shall be placed on the calendar for final reading the next session day after the amendments or the

engrossed measure is made available electronically or printed and distributed to the desks of the members.

(3) When a measure other than a bill is reported with a minority report, the measure shall be placed on the calendar for final reading on the same session day on which the minority report was substituted or rejected.

**9.37 When a Bill Goes to Third Reading.** (1) A bill shall be placed on the Third Reading Calendar on the session day following its second reading or the next available calendar if the bill is reported after having previously been read for a second time.

(2) When a bill is reported with a minority report, under the order of business Propositions and Motions, after the question of the minority report is decided, the bill shall immediately be read a third time and proceed to final consideration.

## RECONSIDERATION

**10.01 Reconsideration.** (1) When a measure has passed or failed to pass or a motion has been adopted or defeated, any member voting on the prevailing side may move for reconsideration of the measure or motion. The motion for reconsideration is not in order on a vote whereby a measure is indefinitely postponed.

(2) The member who intends to move for reconsideration must state his or her intent orally prior to adjournment on the same day on which the vote to be reconsidered was taken.

(3) A motion to reconsider may be debated together with the main question if the subject of the main question is debatable and the vote on the main question was not ordered by a motion for the previous question. If the vote on the main question was ordered by the previous question, neither the motion to reconsider nor the main question is debatable. However, a debatable motion to refer shall be allowed if the vote on the main question is reconsidered.

(4) The motion to reconsider shall be voted on the first session day after that on which the vote to be reconsidered was taken. The motion for reconsideration has precedence over any other motion, subject to the provisions of Rule 5.10. However, if the measure subject to reconsideration was passed so late in the session that the Speaker has reasonable cause to believe that its retention will unnecessarily delay the orderly process of legislative business, the Speaker shall immediately lay the motion for reconsideration before the House.

(5) Thirty-one or more affirmative votes are required to reconsider the final vote on a measure.

(6) There shall be only one motion for reconsideration of any final vote even though the action of the House reverses its previous action.

**10.05 Transmitting Measures on Which Notice of Reconsideration Has Been Moved.** When a member has given notice of intention to move for reconsideration of the final vote passing a measure, the Chief Clerk shall not thereafter transmit that measure to the Senate until the motion for reconsideration has been disposed of or time for making the motion has expired.

**10.10 Recall of Measure.** (1) If a measure has been transmitted to the Senate before the motion to reconsider is made, the motion to reconsider must be preceded by a motion to recall the measure. The motion to recall a measure is subject to the same time limit as the motion to reconsider.

(2) A motion to recall a measure shall be acted upon immediately, with debate on the motion but not on the merits of the measure.

(3) If a bill has been transmitted to the Governor before the motion to reconsider is made, the bill may be recalled from the Governor without regard to which house originated the bill and at any time prior to the signing and filing of the bill by the Governor.

## **CONCURRENCE; CONFERENCE**

### **11.01 Vote to Concur in Amendments of Other House.**

(1)(a) For the 2023 regular session, upon the return to the House of a House measure amended in the Senate, the vote to concur and repass the measure or not to concur in the Senate amendments shall not be taken sooner than the first session day after the message from the Senate has been read.

(b) For the 2024 regular session, upon the return to the House of a House measure amended in the Senate, the vote to concur and repass the measure or not to concur in the Senate amendments shall be in order no sooner than one hour after the message from the Senate has been read.

(2) A motion to concur and repass the measure or not to concur in the Senate amendments shall come under the order of business Propositions and Motions and is not subject to referral to committee.

(3) A majority of the members present may order that the questions of concurrence and repassage be divided.

(4) Thirty-one or more affirmative votes on a roll call are required to adopt a motion to concur and repass a bill or joint resolution.

**11.05 Conference Committee.** When the House fails to concur in amendments made to one of its measures by the Senate, or when the House is notified that the Senate has failed to concur in amendments made to one of its measures by the House, the Speaker shall appoint a conference committee of not less than two members to represent the House to meet with a similar committee of the Senate.

**11.10 Authority of Conference Committee.** (1) The conference committee has authority to propose amendments only within the scope of the issue between the houses.

(2) As soon as practicable after appointment, the House conferees shall meet with the Senate conferees at a time and place agreed upon by a majority of all the conferees, and shall cause notice of the meeting to be given to the public and to be posted outside the House chamber. Notice of the meeting shall be announced on the floor if the House is in session.

**11.15 Adoption of Conference Committee Report.** (1) If a majority of the members of the House conference committee and a majority of the members of the Senate conference committee agree to an amendment, or otherwise resolve the issue between the houses, each shall file its report with both houses. All conferees shall sign the report. A dissenting conferee shall indicate that fact when signing the report.

(2)(a) No motion is required to adopt the conference committee report if repassage or readoption of the measure is not required. A motion is required to adopt the conference committee report if repassage or readoption of the measure is required.

(b) If the motion to adopt the report prevails, it shall be next in order to immediately take up the question of repassage or readoption of the measure.

(c) For the 2023 regular session, a motion to adopt a conference committee report shall not be made sooner than the first session

day after the conference committee report has been made available electronically or printed and distributed to the members.

(d) For the 2024 regular session, a motion to adopt a conference committee report shall be in order immediately after the conference committee report has been made available electronically or printed and distributed to the members.

(3) It shall not be in order to refer or re-refer or to amend a conference committee report.

**11.20 Discharge of Conferees.** (1) If the House conferees cannot agree with the Senate conferees within a reasonable time, the House conferees shall so advise the Speaker and request discharge. The Speaker shall then discharge the House conferees and may appoint a new conference committee to represent the House.

(2) If a conference committee does not report within a reasonable period of time after its appointment, the Speaker may discharge the House conferees and appoint a new conference committee to represent the House.

## **SPONSORSHIP AND INTRODUCTION OF MEASURES**

**12.00 Sponsorship.** (1) Every measure introduced in the House by a member, member-elect or special, standing or joint committee shall bear the name of the member or special, standing or joint committee sponsoring the measure.

(2) Every measure introduced at the request of a person, state agency or legislative interim committee shall bear the statement "Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00" and indicate the identity of the requester.

(3) Upon their request, a member may be added as a co-sponsor to any measure introduced by another legislator, after the measure has been first read and prior to the presiding officer's announcement of the outcome of the vote on final consideration, and at any time the measure is in the possession of the House prior to a motion to concur on any Senate amendments. To be added to any measure as a chief sponsor the member must provide the Chief Clerk written approval from the first listed chief sponsor of the measure, after the first reading and prior to the presiding officer's announcement of the outcome of the vote on final consideration.

(4)(a) A sponsor may be withdrawn from a measure at any time the measure is in possession of the House. The request must be processed by 5:00 p.m. the next business day following final consideration of the measure.

(b) If all of the chief sponsors are withdrawn, the House committee reporting the measure shall become the chief sponsor of the measure.

**12.10 Committee Sponsorship.** (1) Any measure introduced by a committee or designated as "At the request of" a committee must be approved by the Chair and a majority of the members of the committee.

(2) The Chair shall sign the proposed measure for presentation to the Chief Clerk for introduction as a committee measure.

(3) Every measure introduced by a House policy committee and joint policy committee shall bear the name of the legislator that requested the proposed measure or the name of an individual, organization, state agency, or local government on whose behalf the measure was requested, or both.

**12.20 Requirements for Introduction.** (1) Except for all pre-session filing, for which two copies of a Legislative Counsel

draft are required, all drafts of measures presented for introduction shall be submitted in the form of one Legislative Counsel draft of the measure and one properly completed Legislative Counsel bill back. Such presentation shall be submitted in the manner prescribed by the Chief Clerk of the House by a member, member-elect, an authorized person of the member's staff, an authorized member of the caucus staff or, in the case of a committee, by the Chair or an authorized member of the committee staff. The Chief Clerk or a person authorized by the Chief Clerk shall, upon request, provide a receipt to the person presenting the measure.

(2) Immediately after presentation to the Desk, the measure shall be assigned a measure number and sent by the Chief Clerk to the Publication Services unit of the Legislative Counsel for examination and any corrections as to accuracy of form and style to conform substantially to the *Form and Style Manual for Legislative Measures* and preparation of a copy for the State Printer. No corrections that might affect the substance of the measure shall be made without the consent of the sponsor of the measure.

(3) An original bill folder shall be created for each measure introduced. The original bill-backed copy of the measure shall be placed in the folder along with all amendments, reports and other official papers, including a recording of all actions taken on the measure.

**12.25 Executive and Judicial Branch Measures.** Measures being requested by the executive or judicial branches shall be filed and introduced as prescribed in ORS 171.130 or in any applicable joint rule of both houses of the Legislative Assembly authorizing such filing and introduction.

**12.35 Priority Drafting Requests for the 2023 Regular Session.** (1) Every member shall be entitled to not more than five priority drafting requests of the Legislative Counsel during the 2023 regular session.

(2) The Chief Clerk shall not accept draft measures for introduction under this rule unless they bear the priority designation of legislative counsel.

**12.40 Pre-session Drafting and Measure Filing for the 2023 Regular Session.** (1) Except as otherwise provided in these rules, drafting requests and pre-session measure filing shall be governed by the applicable Enrolled Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Eighty-first Legislative Assembly.

(2) After 5 p.m. on the Friday immediately following the opening day of the 2023 organizational session, the Legislative Counsel shall discontinue accepting requests for drafting of all measures except:

(a) Appropriation or fiscal measures approved for drafting by the Committee on Ways and Means.

(b) Measures approved for drafting by the Chair of the Committee on Rules.

(c) A proposal requested for drafting by a member under Rule 12.35.

(3) Members, members-elect and committees may not request drafting services from the Legislative Counsel for an agency or officer of the executive or judicial departments unless the agency or officer has arranged to pay any charges the Legislative Counsel imposes under ORS 173.130.

(4) No measure shall be accepted by the Chief Clerk for introduction in the House after 5:00 p.m. on the 36th calendar day

of the 2023 regular session, except:

(a) Measures approved by the Speaker and identified for introduction by a committee.

(b) Appropriation or fiscal measures sponsored by the Committee on Ways and Means.

(c) Measures drafted by the Legislative Counsel and presented to the Desk as provided in Rule 12.35.

(5) Every measure filed under this rule shall be filed in compliance with Rule 12.20.

(6) The Chief Clerk shall order the measure printed and no printed measure shall be withdrawn.

(7) The content of the measure shall be deemed public information upon receipt by the Chief Clerk.

**12.50 Pre-session Drafting and Filing for the 2024 Regular Session.** (1) Except as otherwise provided in these rules, drafting requests and measure filing shall be governed by the applicable Enrolled Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly.

(2) Members and committees may not request drafting services from the Legislative Counsel for an agency or officer of the executive or judicial departments unless the agency or officer has arranged to pay any charges the Legislative Counsel imposes under ORS 173.130.

(3) Every measure filed under this rule shall be filed in compliance with Rule 12.20.

(4) The Chief Clerk shall order the measure printed and no printed measure shall be withdrawn.

(5) The content of the measure shall be deemed public information upon receipt by the Chief Clerk.

**12.60 Pre-session Drafting and Filing for the 2025 Regular Session.** (1) Except as otherwise provided in these rules, drafting requests and measure filing shall be governed by the applicable Enrolled Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly.

(2) Members, members-elect and committees may not request drafting services from the Legislative Counsel for an agency or officer of the executive or judicial departments unless the agency or officer has arranged to pay any charges the Legislative Counsel imposes under ORS 173.130.

(3) Every measure filed under this rule shall be filed in compliance with Rule 12.20.

(4) The Chief Clerk shall order the measure printed and no printed measure shall be withdrawn.

(5) The content of the measure shall be deemed public information upon receipt by the Chief Clerk.

Rule 13 is Reserved

## PUBLICATIONS

**14.01 Journal; Status Report.** (1) The House shall cause a Journal of its proceedings to be maintained. The Journal shall contain a full, true and correct chronological record of all proceedings of the House.

(2) The House shall cause a House Measure History Report, arranged chronologically by the measure number, to be maintained. The status report shall contain a synopsis of the

actions taken in each house on each measure.

**14.05 Other Legislative Publications.** (1) Unless otherwise directed by resolution or Rule 14.10, the provisions of ORS 171.206 shall govern.

(2) All orders for printing and distribution of publications printed for the House, except those publications the printing or distribution of which are governed specifically by statute or otherwise, shall be signed by the Speaker or by a person authorized by the Speaker.

**14.10 Distribution of Legislative Publications.** (1) There shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk the numbers of copies of measures, the House Measure History Report, the legislative schedule, and the legislative index as required for the operations of the House.

(2) There may be distributed free of charge to any person one copy of any measure with amendments, corrections or engrossment, the legislative schedule and cumulative index. Additional copies may be obtained upon payment pursuant to the schedule adopted by the Legislative Administrator and posted in the Distribution Center.

(3) Any person, agency or organization wishing a complete set of measures, House Measure History Reports, calendars, legislative schedules and indexes may obtain it upon payment pursuant to the schedule adopted by the Legislative Administrator and posted in the Distribution Center.

(4) Charges that may be imposed pursuant to this rule do not apply to the Chief Clerk and the Secretary of the Senate for the proper functioning of each house, the Legislative Fiscal and Revenue Officers, the Legislative Counsel, and the Legislative Administrator.

**14.15 Measure Summaries.** (1) No measure shall be accepted at the Desk for introduction unless it is accompanied by an impartial summary of the measure's content, describing new law and changes in existing law proposed by the measure. Any measure presented to the Chief Clerk which does not comply with this subsection shall be returned to the member who presented it.

(2) The summary shall be printed on the first page of the measure.

(3) If a material error in a printed summary is brought to the attention of the Legislative Counsel, the Legislative Counsel shall cause to be prepared a corrected summary which shall show the changes made in the summary in the same manner as amendments to existing law are shown. The Legislative Counsel shall deliver the corrected summary to the Chief Clerk. The Chief Clerk shall order a printing of the corrected summary for distribution.

(4) Whenever a measure is amended, the person who edits the measure summaries shall prepare an amended summary. The amended summary shall appear on the first page of the measure if engrossed or may be made a part of the amendments. The summary shall be amended to show changes in the measure proposed by the amendments thereto with changes in the summary shown in the same manner as amendments to existing law are shown.

**14.25 Financial and Revenue Impact Statements.** (1) A copy of every measure introduced shall be transmitted by the Chief Clerk to the Legislative Fiscal and Revenue Officers. Upon notice of a measure being scheduled by a House committee for work session, the Legislative Fiscal and Revenue Officers shall review each measure and make an estimate of the anticipated change in state,

county, and municipal expenditures and revenues under the provisions of the measure. The Legislative Fiscal Officer shall prepare a statement, which will outline the changes in expenditures, to be known as either a Fiscal Impact Statement or Budget Report to be attached to each measure. The Legislative Revenue Officer shall prepare a statement known as a revenue impact statement, which will outline the changes in revenues, to be attached to each measure. The financial and revenue impact statements shall set forth the fiscal and revenue impact of the measure and any governmental subdivision affected by the fiscal and/or revenue impact as determined by the Legislative Fiscal and Revenue Officers.

(2) The fiscal and revenue impact statements shall be delivered by the Legislative Fiscal and Revenue Officers to the committee to which the measure has been referred. When amendments to a measure are adopted by a committee, the appropriate changes shall be made in the fiscal and/or revenue impact statements.

(3) When a measure is reported out of committee, the fiscal and/or revenue impact statements shall be filed with the committee's recommendation and forwarded to the Chief Clerk. The Chief Clerk shall attach the fiscal and revenue impact statements to the original measure and shall prepare and distribute copies either electronically or in hard copy to each member.

**14.30 Legislative Newsletters.** (1) Each member may issue legislative newsletters or other informational material to their constituents. Costs for newsletters and informational material may be billed to the member's individual expense account. Such newsletters or other informational material may be distributed at state expense at any time during a member's term with the following exception:

(a) The period commencing 60 days before the primary election until the day following the election if the member is a candidate for any election or reelection at the primary election.

(b) The period commencing 60 days before the regular general election until the day following the election if the member is a candidate for any election or reelection at the general election.

(2) As used in this rule, "constituent" means an individual that lives within a member's legislative district.

(3) As used in this rule, "distributed" means that the legislative newsletter or informational material has left the possession and control of the member.

(4) As used in this rule, "informational material" and "legislative newsletter" means material suitable for distribution to members of the public informing them of official activities of a legislator and/or concerning legislative related issues. Such material shall not be campaign material, serve partisan political purposes, or take a position on a citizen initiative.

**14.40 Sanctioning of Fact-Finding Trips.** The following provisions govern whether fact-finding missions will be officially sanctioned under ORS 244.020(7)(b)(H)(i):

(1) The Chief Clerk of the House shall prepare an application form to collect information required to make the appropriate determination. An application must be submitted to the Chief Clerk before the start of the mission, unless as determined by the Chief Clerk that good cause exists for submitting the application after the deadline. The application must include the following information as an attachment:

(a) A written opinion from the Oregon Government Ethics

Commission concluding that the event is a permitted fact-finding mission under ORS 244.020(7)(b)(H)(i) and the rules of the commission; and

(b) A written itinerary or agenda for all scheduled meetings, events, presenters, meals, travel, lodging, or other activities planned during the mission.

(2) Applications will be approved by the Chief Clerk of the House only if the applicant provides all the information required under subsection (1) of this rule and that information substantiates that the purpose of the activity is for the developing of state commerce, or is for public policy related educational purposes, or is to develop intergovernmental relations or assistance.

(3) All approved applications shall be posted promptly on the Chief Clerk of the House's webpage.

## RECORDS RETENTION

**14.50 Policy on Records.** (1) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this rule, records of members and their legislative assistants that contain information relating to the conduct of the public's business that are prepared, used or retained by the member or assistant must be retained for two years after the records are created.

(2) (a) A member must retain notices of amounts of expenses required by ORS 244.100 (2) for five years.

(b) A member must retain documents in support of statements of economic interest required by ORS 244.050 for five years.

(c) A member must retain relevant documents that are in the member's possession when the member receives a public records request, or a request for discovery of records issued in a court or administrative proceeding, until the request for records is resolved.

(d) Ephemeral communications, including, but not limited to, voicemail, text messages and instant messages, are not required to be retained.

(3) A member or legislative assistant may, at any time, deliver records required to be retained under this rule to the Legislative Administrator. A person who ceases to be a member of the Legislative Assembly shall deliver records under subsection (2) of this rule to the Legislative Administrator within 60 days after the member ceases to be a member. Records delivered to the Legislative Administrator under this rule must identify the person delivering the records and specify the date on which the records may be destroyed.

(4) In order to ensure consistent and timely compliance with the disclosure provisions of the Public Records Law, the Legislative Counsel shall presumptively be designated to receive public records requests on behalf of members. The Legislative Counsel will assist each member in preparing responses to requests and will consult with each member prior to the disclosure of any of the member's records to a requester. A member may respond to a public records request directly, but should notify the Legislative Counsel of the request. Regardless of whether or not a member has designated the Legislative Counsel to receive their public records requests, the member may request assistance from the Legislative Administrator or Legislative Counsel in responding to public records requests at any time.

(5) This rule applies to all records of members and legislative assistants, whether created before, on or after the effective date of this rule.

(6) (a) Before each regular long session, each member and each

legislative assistant must receive training provided or approved by the Legislative Counsel's office on compliance with this rule and applicable portions of the public records law. Members not elected to the Legislative Assembly and legislative assistants not employed by the Assembly at the time of this training must be provided information about compliance with this rule within 30 days following their swearing in or hire.

(b) Training must include but is not limited to the requirements for retaining public records and responding to a public records request.

(7) If the response to a records request has not been completed within 10 business days following acknowledgement of the request, the member must provide the requestor an estimate of the number of days required to respond to the records request. If the estimated records production date passes without records being produced or exemptions claimed, the member shall provide a new estimate and explanation of the status of the request. The member may designate the Legislative Counsel to provide the estimate.

(8) As used in this rule, "legislative assistant" means a person employed to assist a member, to assist the Speaker of the House or to assist either caucus leader.

## PERSONNEL RULES AND PROCEDURES

**15.01 Personnel Rules and Procedures.** (1) Except as otherwise provided by law, the Speaker may establish such rules of employment for employees of the House that are deemed necessary.

(2) All salaries for legislative officers and legislative personnel elected or appointed shall be fixed by the appointing authority in accordance with the policies and procedures as adopted by the Legislative Assembly and as provided in the current Legislative Assembly budget.

(3) Employees of the House are at-will employees; therefore, they serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority and shall be appointed or discharged by written notice to the Chief Clerk and the Legislative Administrator.

## CHIEF CLERK; PERSONNEL; ALLOWANCES

**15.05 Chief Clerk; Election and Duties.** (1) There shall be a Chief Clerk who shall be elected by the members and shall be an officer of the House. The Chief Clerk shall take an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Oregon, for the true and faithful exercise of the duties of the Office of the Chief Clerk, and to keep the confidences of the House. The Chief Clerk serves at the pleasure of the body and may be removed only by a majority vote of the members. In the event that the office becomes vacant at a time when the House is not in session, the Speaker may appoint an acting Chief Clerk to serve until the next regular or special session of the House, at which time the members shall elect a Chief Clerk of the House.

(2) The Chief Clerk shall perform the following duties:

(a) Appoint a Sergeant at Arms in consultation with the Speaker.

(b) Appoint such other non-partisan employees deemed necessary for the effective operations of the House of Representatives in compliance with the Legislative Branch Personnel Rules.

(c) Serve as parliamentarian of the House, providing impartial recommendations.

(d) Keep the measures, papers and records of the proceedings

and actions of the House and have charge of the publication and distribution of publications related thereto, except as otherwise provided by law.

(e) Prepare all measures, histories, journals and related publications for printing.

(f) Retain all measures and official papers or records in the Chief Clerk's office or in the Chief Clerk's custody except on duly signed receipts from persons authorized to receive custody.

(g) Perform such other duties as directed by the Speaker or prescribed by law.

(3) The Sergeant at Arms shall perform the following duties:

(a) Under direction of the presiding officer and/or the Chief Clerk, the Sergeant at Arms, assisted by Security Personnel when directed by the presiding officer, shall maintain order in the chamber and other areas assigned to the House.

(b) Permit such ingress to and egress from the chamber during sessions as may be directed by the presiding officer or allowed by the rules.

(c) Execute all processes issued by authority of the House or any of its committees.

(d) Perform such other duties as the Chief Clerk or Speaker may direct.

**15.10 Member's Personal Staff.** (1) (a) A member may appoint personal staff for the session, the interim or both, according to the allowance provided in Rule 15.25.

(b) A member shall establish salaries payable to persons appointed under paragraph (a) of this subsection in accordance with the policies and procedures as adopted by the Legislative Assembly.

(c) Fringe benefits for persons appointed under paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be as set forth in the Legislative Branch Personnel Rules.

(d) The time of service for all employees begins on the date of filing their appointment with the Legislative Administrator but not sooner than the date set forth in the Legislative Branch Personnel Rules.

**15.15 Leadership Office Personnel.** (1) The Speaker may appoint personnel necessary to perform the functions of the Speaker's office.

(2) In compliance with the Legislative Branch Personnel Rules, the Republican and Democratic leaders may each appoint such employees deemed necessary to perform the functions of the caucus offices.

**15.20 Other Personnel.** (1) In compliance with the Legislative Branch Personnel Rules, the director of the Legislative Policy and Research Office shall, in consultation with each chair of a committee and the Speaker, appoint such personnel as deemed necessary in the operations of the committees under their purview.

(2) In addition to personnel otherwise authorized, the Speaker may appoint such other personnel as the Speaker considers necessary.

(3) No personnel employed by the House of Representatives shall for the duration of such employment serve as a lobbyist or be employed by a lobbyist; serve as a reporter, commentator or editorialist on legislative matters or be employed by a radio station, television station, newspaper or magazine. All such personnel are

subject to ORS 260.432.

**15.25 Expense Allowance.** (1) Each member has an allowance during the 2023 regular session for personal staff, services and supplies as defined in Rule 16.01 and legislative newsletters as defined in Rule 14.30.

(2) Any amount remaining unexpended or unobligated in a member's individual expense account at the end of a regular session may be used during the interim for expenses as described under subsection (1) of this rule.

## SERVICES AND SUPPLIES

**16.01 Services and Supplies.** (1) Each member shall have an individual services and supplies account. New members will receive a one-time allowance for start-up expenses.

(2) A member may obtain services and supplies necessary to conduct legislative business by submitting a requisition to personnel responsible for supplying the services or supplies. The requisition shall be signed by the member or by a person authorized by the member. The costs of requisitioned services and supplies shall be charged against the member's individual services and supplies account.

(3) Services and supplies that may be obtained under this rule include:

(a) Postage (all classes).

(b) Subscriptions to newspapers and periodicals related to the duties of a state representative until the end of the legislator's term in office.

(c) Stationery.

(d) Office supplies and consumables regularly used in office settings by members and staff to conduct legislative business. Medical supplies like nonprescription painkillers, bandages, and similar items as would be found in a first aid kit are eligible. Coffee, tea, and water and associated equipment for the preparation and service of these beverages in the member's office are eligible. Food, snacks and meals are not eligible. Mini fridges, microwave ovens, toasters, and all other similar items used to prepare or store food and beverages are not eligible. Decorative items such as artwork, frames, rugs and accessories are considered personal items and therefore not eligible.

(e) Copying.

(f) Communications with constituents, including electronic town halls (e.g. tele-town halls), in compliance with Rule 14.30.

(g) Rental expenses incurred for a town hall meeting, excluding food and beverages.

(h) Establishment and maintenance of a district office, not to exceed the member's term in office.

(i) Billings from state agencies for services and supplies.

(j) Reasonable travel expenses incurred by members while on official legislative business. This item does not include in-district travel. Reimbursement for a member's travel for legislative business must be preapproved by the Chief Clerk. Approval will be granted for attending meetings of organizations for which the Legislature provides dues or approves member payment of dues and for official meetings in which member participation is identified in statute and where the member has been officially appointed to the group by the Speaker. For other travel events members must submit appropriate documentation prior to travel

such as a letter of invitation, agenda or completed registration form. Itemized receipts must be submitted for reimbursement upon completion of travel.

(k) Reasonable travel expenses incurred by caucus office staff, speaker's office staff, and member's personal staff while on official legislative business as authorized by the member.

(L) Language translation and interpretation services and equipment.

(m) Any other service or supply authorized by the Speaker.

(4) Any member who exceeds his or her allowance as provided under these rules or the adopted Legislative Assembly budget will have the overage deducted from his or her personal monthly expense allowance and any additional indebtedness will be prohibited.

(5) Should a member retire, resign or be removed from office, the individual expense allowance as provided under these rules or the adopted Legislative Assembly budget shall be prorated based on length of service and, in the event an overage exists, further indebtedness shall be prohibited and the overage shall be deducted from his or her personal monthly expense allowance and any remaining indebtedness shall be billed by the Legislative Administrator and appropriate steps for collection taken. Any amount expended in excess of allocation is a debt owed to the state.

(6) All equipment, furniture, unused supplies, and stationery are the property of the Legislative Assembly and shall be returned at the end of a member's legislative service in compliance with ORS 171.136.

**16.05 Attorney General Opinions.** (1) Requests by members for opinions of the Attorney General require approval of either caucus leader or the Speaker as a condition of authorizing payment from legislative appropriations. The legislative appropriation specifically intended for payment of costs for Attorney General opinions shall be divided in the same proportion as the number of party members in the House. The cost of an opinion shall be deducted from the approving leader's allocation. This rule takes precedence over ORS 180.060 (2).

(2) The Legislative Counsel shall provide legal advice and opinions to members without approval of the Speaker, or either caucus leader.

## PRIVILEGES

**17.01 House Chamber Privileges.** (1) The presiding officer shall balance access to the chamber and physical safety by ensuring that the total number of people in the House chamber does not exceed the total capacity limit of the chamber as determined by the Fire Marshal. Consequently, certain people otherwise allowed to access the chamber may be asked to leave until such time that the total number of people in the chamber is within safety limits. When the House is in session, no person shall be permitted within the bar except:

- (a) Members of the Legislative Assembly;
- (b) Floor personnel of the House;
- (c) One of the following individuals seated at a member's desk:
  - (i) One individual from the member's personal staff employed under Rule 15.10 or receiving credit in the intern program;
  - (ii) A member of the staff of a House standing committee, statutory committee, special committee, or;
  - (iii) a member of the staff of the caucus offices; or;

- (iv) a member of House floor staff including Honorary Pages, or;
- (v) A family member. ;
- (d) Speaker's and caucus staff;
- (e) Persons authorized by the Speaker; and
- (f) Accredited representatives of the news media.

(2) Courtesies of the house and floor privileges may be extended only to special dignitaries and former members of the Legislative Assembly with the permission of the body. However, courtesies shall not be extended to any former member who is registered as a lobbyist with the Oregon Governmental Ethics Commission.

(3) Seating in the side aisle beyond the bar shall be reserved for the families and guests of members of the House and such other persons as may be authorized by the Speaker. However, the privilege shall not be granted to any person actively engaged in seeking the passage or defeat of any measure. An exception may be granted to members of families that have spoken in support of a memorial or resolution in their honor.

(4) Seating in the rear of the chamber is for members, and staff of the Speaker and caucus offices only.

(5) To ensure access to the chamber proceedings, an area on the south side of the third-floor gallery shall be reserved for accredited representatives of the news media as defined in House Rule 18.01, and the south-side of the third-floor gallery shall be available to the public and press. The presiding officer may set time limits on public access to the chamber to ensure an equitable opportunity to all members of the public to observe the proceedings of the House.

(6) While the House is in session, the center aisle of the floor shall be kept clear of all persons except members and the Chief Clerk or someone acting under the Chief Clerk's direction in conduct of the business of the House. Access to the chamber while the House is in session shall be by the side doors and side aisles.

(7) During the period beginning thirty minutes before the opening of each session and ending thirty minutes after the session, no person shall be permitted in the House chamber except those authorized to be in the chamber under this rule.

(8) No person who is a lobbyist as defined in ORS 171.725 shall be permitted on the House floor or the adjacent side aisles while the House is in session.

(9) The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce this rule.

**17.05 Lounge Privileges.** The privilege of using the House lounge shall be limited to members of the House and the Chief Clerk except as otherwise authorized by the Speaker.

**17.10 Assembly Transition.** Those members not returning to serve in the next Legislative Assembly shall vacate their office space in the State Capitol 30 days prior to the convening of that assembly.

## ACCREDITATION OF NEWS MEDIA

**18.01 Accreditation of News Media.** (1) As used in these rules, "accredited representatives of the news media" means bona fide representatives of publications of general circulation and of news wire services and bona fide representatives of radio and television facilities.

(2) In order to obtain accreditation, representatives of the news media shall register in the office of the Chief Clerk, indicating the publication, news, wire service, radio or television station represented. However, any representative of a news media who is

also attending the session as a lobbyist as defined in ORS 171.725 shall not be entitled to accreditation or the privileges of the floor.

(3) If a member of the media disrupts the proceedings of the House or its committees, the presiding officer may call the individual to order and direct the individual to leave the chamber or meeting room.

(4) The Speaker may revoke or suspend the credentials of a member of the media who disrupts the proceedings of the House or its committees.

## LOBBYISTS

**19.01 Regulation of Lobbyists.** (1) It is the intention of the House to provide opportunity for all individuals who comply with the requirements of ORS 171.725 to 171.785 and subsection (2) of this rule to appear before members and committees of the House on behalf of or in opposition to any measures before the Legislative Assembly.

(2) The Committee on Rules may, and on the complaint of five members of the House, shall investigate and report on any alleged violation of ORS 171.725 to 171.785 or any alleged improper conduct or wrongdoing by any lobbyist. The committee may as an incident of the investigation require such additional information about the alleged violation, improper conduct or wrongdoing as the majority of the committee considers pertinent and necessary.

(3) If the committee determines that the lobbyist has violated ORS 171.725 to 171.785 or is guilty of improper conduct or wrongdoing, it shall report its findings and recommendations to the House. The House may take such action as it deems proper.

## CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS, PROHIBITED ACTIONS

**19.10 Statement of Philosophy.** The House of Representatives is committed to open deliberations. Prompt, thorough and accurate reporting of any campaign contribution is an integral factor in maintaining open government.

**19.20 Campaign Contributions During Session.** No member of the House, during a regular session, organizational session or during the period between the organizational session and the regular session scheduled during the odd-numbered year, shall accept and/or solicit a contribution to the member or the member's principal campaign committee or accept and/or solicit an expenditure in support of the member from any person. This does not limit a member from using existing campaign funds.

## POLICY ON A HARASSMENT-FREE WORKPLACE

**20.01 Policy on a Harassment-Free Workplace.** (1) The House of Representatives is committed to providing a safe and respectful workplace that is free of harassment. Members and all employees are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that is free of harassment and to discourage all harassment in the workplace and at events, professional meetings, seminars or any events at which legislative business is conducted.

(2) The procedures provided for in Legislative Branch Personnel Rule 27 shall apply to members, staff, interns, volunteers, lobbyists and others as specified in the rule.

(3) (a) If the House Conduct Committee recommends a member be expelled, the committee shall report their recommendation to the House.

(b) When the recommendation is reported from the committee, it shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the House within one business day following the committee's action.

(c) A motion to adopt the committee's recommendation shall be scheduled for the first session day after the report is made available electronically or printed and distributed to the desks of the members.

(d) 40 or more affirmative votes on the motion are required to adopt the committee's recommendation that a member be expelled,

(4) The House shall provide education concerning harassment and procedures to implement this Rule.

Holvey moved adoption of the report by the Special Committee on Rules. The Honorable Tina Kotek, Governor of the State of Oregon, delivered the following Inaugural Address:

Governor Tina Kotek

Inaugural Address as Prepared  
January 9, 2023

“Good afternoon. It’s wonderful to see you all.

“Today is a day to recognize everyone who voted in last November’s election. For the first time ever, Oregon had the highest voter turnout rate in the nation. That is a credit to the strength of our democracy, and a credit to Oregonians — no matter who you voted for.

“I would also like to thank my predecessor, Governor Kate Brown. In addition to leading our state through very difficult times, she led with a deep love for our state and compassion for everyday Oregonians. Thank you, Governor Brown for your leadership.

“I’d also like to thank my wife Aimee, the First Lady of Oregon. Thank you, my love, for all of your support.

“I am honored, and humbled, by this opportunity to serve

Oregon.

“For me, this job will mean waking up, every day, with a mission. My mission, simply put, is to deliver results for Oregonians. To take on our biggest challenges and make things better.

“It’s a simple idea – making things better – but as we all know, a difficult thing to achieve.

“So, today, in my first remarks as Oregon’s Governor, I want to talk about this possibility – the possibility to be a force for positive change.

“My sense of what this possibility means has evolved over the course of my life. I imagine many of you can relate to that.

“My grandparents were immigrants. My parents were proud first-generation Americans who believed in hard work and being engaged in their community. My mom — her name was Florence — volunteered at the library in my elementary school. After he retired, my dad, Jerry, volunteered on our local zoning board.

“They did what they could to make things better for our family, for our community.

“When I was in my twenties, I fought for domestic partnership benefits for faculty and students at the University of Washington.

“That was a positive change for couples who had been denied, for too long, the dignity and respect everyone deserves.

“When I moved back to Oregon, I found my calling as an advocate for others. I gratefully accepted a job at Oregon Food Bank, inspired by its mission to end hunger. That calling eventually brought me into public service, like many of you in this chamber today.

“I was honored to spend much of the last decade leading this chamber as Speaker of the House. So, I know that there will be many difficult decisions ahead of you – many competing priorities and complex issues demanding your attention.

“Before you take up that work, I ask you to step back and consider our shared mission as public servants:

“Making things better for Oregonians.

“I recognize that this idea of a ‘shared mission’ might be a tough sell at a time when our politics feel so divisive. But today — this convening of Oregon’s 82nd Legislative Assembly — marks a meaningful transition.

“We are moving out of election season, which is ultimately a very public reflection of individual values, and we are moving into the season of governing. Governing is about more than competing values — it’s about serving our people. Not Democrats, Republicans or independents – but parents and children, teachers and students, business owners and workers – families from the Rose City, and families from towns without a stop light. Governing is about serving Oregonians — *all* Oregonians.

“And I have heard from people loud and clear: the status quo is not working – and for many Oregonians, it has never worked. I believe that for most of us, this isn’t a partisan issue, or frankly, a criticism of one leader. This concern transcends party lines and county lines and cultural divides. Oregonians in every single corner of our state are demanding better. They want to see the idea of Oregon – Land of Majestic Mountains... Land of Promise – match up with the realities in their everyday lives.

“And so do I.

"It is my pledge to all Oregonians, including the leaders in this chamber, that I will work every day to turn things around – to be a partner with you in solving problems, big and small. We won't be perfect, but we will improve every year, so Oregonians can proudly say their state government was there for them.

"So here's how we're going to do that:

- First, for me, personally, that means strengthening connections with Oregonians from every part of our state so that we can deliver results on issues of shared concern: affordable housing and homelessness, behavioral health and addiction care, and education.

- For the executive branch overall, that means focusing on the basics. I will set clear expectations for agency leaders, and then follow through to make sure we are building systems to do our fundamental job – serving Oregonians – better than ever.

- And finally, for all Oregonians, we must all come together to be part of the solution. I invite everyone listening today to help build the Oregon you want to live in.

"Let me expand on these commitments.

### **"CONNECTIONS**

"First, my personal promise to strengthen connections across the state.

"We can only deliver results on our complex problems by listening, digging into the details, and forming solutions together. And by advocating for better results at every level of government. That's why I pledged to visit every county in Oregon within my first year of office.

"Governor Vic Atiyeh made a similar commitment in 1979. Here's what he said in his inaugural address:

"I have and will continue to listen, and not just only to those people who have the means and the urgency to press their case in Salem. I will go to our people to listen. I will go to every county of this state. I will be in your own communities, not talking *to* you, but meeting *with* you.... I will listen to you, the elected representatives of our people, and to the many dedicated workers in our government who truly want to serve people. I will listen to all."

"It may surprise some of you to know that Governor Atiyeh, the last Republican to serve in this role, has been a source of inspiration as I prepare to take on this great responsibility. He too was a former legislator with deep knowledge of our state budget. And we are both 'firsts' – he, the first elected governor of Arab descent in the United States – and me, the first openly lesbian governor in the United States, along with the new governor of Massachusetts. I will endeavor to listen and lead with the same authenticity, compassion, and skill that Governor Atiyeh brought to this job.

"And in that spirit, I launched my One Oregon Listening Tour in Yamhill County a couple of weeks ago. On this visit, and the ones to follow, I want to hear directly from people who are doing the hard work every day to serve their community — especially on issues of shared concern across our state.

"One story in particular has stuck with me. During our roundtable on housing and homelessness, we heard from a woman named Rachel, who works at a nonprofit serving survivors of domestic and sexual violence.

"Many survivors get to a point where it may not be safe for them

to stay another night under the same roof as their abuser. That's why her nonprofit provides emergency shelter for up to 30 days, so that survivors — most often women with children — have a safe place to stay while they seek more permanent housing.

"But in Yamhill County, like most counties in Oregon, affordable housing is extremely hard to come by.

"With emotion in her voice, Rachel told us that some survivors end up declining services altogether, because they know that 30 days won't be enough time to find an affordable, more permanent place to live. And if they can't find an affordable place to move in to, they could face another impossible choice: either becoming homeless, or going back to their abuser.

"Going back... Rachel said... can be even more dangerous than never leaving at all.

"We must do better. For the survivors Rachel is serving, for our unsheltered neighbors, for all working families, for the future of our economy and our state – we must take on our housing crisis at the scale needed to solve it.

"So, on my first full day in office tomorrow, I'm moving forward on two promises on this front.

"First, I am signing an executive order that will address the underlying challenge facing our state: we need more housing.

"My executive order will establish an ambitious statewide housing production target of 36,000 new homes per year. That is an 80 percent increase over recent construction trends. Building more housing is key to creating healthier and safer communities and supporting economic growth. I look forward to bringing comprehensive recommendations to this body as soon as possible.

"Second, I am declaring a homelessness state of emergency. Our state's response must meet the urgency of the humanitarian crisis we are facing.

"A lot of good work is already underway in communities across our state — and thank you for that. Still, we need everyone to keep bringing forward solutions. To that end, I am proposing an urgent \$130 million investment in our communities that will help at least another 1,200 Oregonians who are experiencing unsheltered homelessness move off the streets within a year.

"I am urging you, as leaders, to start the legislative session by taking up this investment package as quickly as possible. And believe me, this is only the first step. I look forward to building on this emergency investment with a comprehensive housing and homelessness package by the end of this session.

"Together, we can act with the urgency people across our state are demanding. Bold ideas, concrete solutions, disciplined follow through. That's how we can deliver results.

### **"ACCOUNTABILITY**

"The second big thing I'm committed to, so we can turn things around, is increased accountability in state government.

"This week, I am delivering a new set of expectations to the leaders of every state agency. We need to focus on the basics. As we do that, I want to acknowledge the incredible strain that the pandemic has put on our state government. Our systems have been stress tested under extreme pressure and showed us where we can and must do better.

"I am directing agency leadership — with my support — to prioritize customer service. That means being more efficient, more effective, and creating systems that will empower the state's 42,000

public servants to deliver for Oregonians. So many state employees are working incredibly hard to do their jobs, but struggle because of unnecessary bureaucratic barriers or outdated systems that do not meet the challenges of the day.

“Whether you’re going to the DMV, applying for a permit, or starting a new business — our job is to make things work as efficiently as possible. And when your community or your family is facing a crisis — our job is to provide the tools that you need — not barriers that make things harder.

“So as we address the very large, complex challenges our state faces — whether it’s housing, behavioral health, or education — we have to put our own house in order too.

“My administration will work hard every day to ensure that you have improved access to services when you need them.

#### **“INVITATION TO HELP**

“And, finally, the last commitment — and the big ask of you. Today, I ask all my fellow Oregonians to believe in our state and its future. We need you. True transformation will require each and every one of us to be engaged — and I hope you will hear my call for each of us to act as a force for positive change.

“We need you to be a part of the solutions that will make a difference in your life and in your community.

“As you know, this upcoming weekend is a weekend of service to commemorate the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. This Saturday, my team and I are joining a community cleanup. We’re excited to be out there — not just to pick up trash, but to be in community with each other. To stand shoulder to shoulder with neighbors, doing the work and solving problems on the ground.

“So, whether it’s joining a neighborhood clean-up... volunteering at your daughter’s elementary school... serving on a local planning board... taking a shift at your local food pantry... or staying up late to answer a few more constituent emails — that’s making things better.

“It will take all of us, doing what we can, to build the Oregon we want to live in.

“I’d like to leave you with an idea of what this vision can add up to — with all of us working together to make things better.

“Imagine an Oregon where no one has to live in a tent on a sidewalk. Where Oregonians seeking help for a mental health concern or substance use issue can find and afford the support they need.

“Imagine an Oregon where every child has a safe place to receive a high-quality public education, and every working family has access to affordable child care.

“Imagine an Oregon where everyone has financial stability and pathways to greater opportunity. Where all Oregonians feel safe in their homes and communities.

“That’s an Oregon worth fighting for — and today is a new beginning. I’m eager to get to work. And I hope you will join me.

“Thank you.”

“In January, Republican vice-chairs of House policy committees penned a letter to Governor Kotek requesting her to issue a moratorium on regulatory rulemaking for the remainder of the biennium. This reflects concerns about the lack of oversight and accountability over executive agencies and their rulemaking.”

HB 2292 – Bynum requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“This bill concerns the ability for a person to cancel a landscaping contract within three days. I support this provision and the overall intent of the bill.

“However, as stated in Section 3. ‘(2) The State Landscape Contractors Board may adopt rules and take any other action before the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the board, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section to (1) undertake and exercise all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the board by (2) section 2 of this 2023 Act.’ I vehemently disagree with the Board being able to navigate on its own without proper oversight. This language appears to give the Board an unchecked amount of freedom.

“I oppose Boards acting on their own accords because they have the power to pick winners and losers, shut out minority communities, and proceed with making rules that may not be in the public interest. I do not assume they have bad intent, however, power without oversight is extremely dangerous in the wrong hands.”

"I have thought about this bill a lot since its public hearing. I've spoken to constituents, advocates, opponents, and folks who've stayed neutral. I re-listened to the hearing and reviewed the testimony really trying to get to yes. I was told to consider that there was no opposition. So, I asked folks who may have opposed. It turns out that there is opposition to the bill. But advocates are taking on bigger fights this session, like ensuring that addiction treatment services stay fully funded, as voters approved in Measure 110. Everyone agrees that fentanyl is wreaking havoc and tragedy on communities. But the question is whether further criminalization will help us avoid those tragedies.

"The media sensationalism and moral panic in the testimony that we heard in the House Judiciary Committee mirrors the same tough on crime, War on Drugs mentality of the 1980s and 90s that has left long lasting negative consequences we are still trying to recover from. But the War on Drugs has really been a war on drug users. If there is any doubt in the intent of the War on Drugs look no further than the explanation of John Ehrlichman, an advisor in Nixon White House, who said: 'We knew we couldn't make it illegal to be either against the war or black, but by getting the public to associate the hippies with marijuana and blacks with heroin, and then criminalizing both heavily, we could disrupt those communities. We could arrest their leaders, raid their homes, break up their meetings, and vilify them night after night on the evening news. Did we know we were lying about the drugs? Of course we did.' Drug crimes have been and continue to be used as a pretext for harassment by police of protesters, low-income communities and communities of color.

"This bill has been referred to as another tool in the toolbox, but like so many tools in the War on Drugs, this is another hammer. Drug use and addiction is a fragile issue; we're blowing glass, not forging steel. We already have so many hammers for arrest, prosecution, and incarceration but to what end? Research by the University of Pennsylvania shows that our country has spent more than a trillion dollars prosecuting the War on Drugs, while addiction rates and overdoses have reliably increased year after year.

"It sounds like the goal for all of us in this conversation is to save lives but criminalization is not a part of harm reduction. Oregon voters were not ambiguous two years ago when they said by a more than 15-point margin (and more than 25 in my county) that they wanted to move away from criminalization toward more compassionate solutions. Nor were they ambiguous in the 2022 survey by Data for Progress, which showed 72% of Oregonians still support addressing drug use and addiction through the public health system as opposed repealing Measure 110. What we need is treatment and healthcare, which I hope we deliver on when it comes to the budget this year.

"We are facing many crises hurting our communities. Lack of affordable housing and living wage jobs, as well as a mental health epidemic at a time when even if you can afford healthcare, you often can't find a provider that will take your insurance, or one that has availability, all exacerbate our crisis of drug misuse and addiction. It is the urgency of these crises that we should focus on rather than increasing punitive responses."

HB 2058 (A-Engrossed) – Levy B requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“I stood in chamber last session and expressed my beliefs about the harm that Ag Overtime would do. The district which I represent which consists of agriculture would be negatively affected.

“In 2022, multiple amendments were proposed to help all farmers and all farm workers, but they were ignored. The only thing offered as a solution in HB 2004 was contained in Section 6c. It said:

‘No later than September 30, 2022, the State Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Business Development Department shall make recommendations for legislation to a regular or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to agriculture regarding available options for establishing a grant program, loan program or lending program to which \$10 million will be allocated for the purpose of providing financial assistance to employers to mitigate the costs associated with compliance with the overtime compensation requirements.’

“At present, HB 2058 A addresses that \$10M allocation by developing a state loan program. This ‘pay day loan’ will allow farms with less than \$3M in gross income to take out state loans to pay their Ag OT payroll expenses. The premise is that this will tide them over until they get their Ag OT payroll tax credit down the road. However, there is no guarantee they will qualify for that tax credit in the future.

“Additionally, for farms with operating lines of credit, or small business loans, they may not even be allowed to take these payday loans if their lender precludes them from taking on additional debt.

“On the flip side, Section 1 of the bill says:

‘In reviewing applications, the Oregon Business Development Department is not required to perform any due diligence with respect to the applicant, the applicant’s ability to repay the award, any collateral or other security for repayment of the award or the applicant’s creditworthiness’

“That may be a win for the farmer down the road if they can’t repay it due to cash flow issues, crop loss, commodity price drop, etc. There is also nothing in this bill that precludes a farm with multiple LLC’s and/or corporations from taking out multiple pay day loans.

“This bill assumes that farms with over \$3M in gross sales each year don’t have cash flow problems and therefore don’t need the ‘pay day loan.’ However, the sales value generated by the farm does not correlate to labor costs or any other costs for that matter. Farm sales are 100% based on what you grow on that farm, how you grow it, and what the market will pay for it.

“For example, a \$3M fresh market organic farm could have \$1M in labor because they hand rogue, hand pick, and hand process their product. While a \$3M commodity crop farm could have only \$600K in labor because they use conventional farming practices which involve less labor.

“The assumption in this bill is that if you are a large farm, you can afford to carry the payroll costs and don’t need the pay day loans. I would attest that all farms, small, medium, and large need help with the payroll burden passed by this body. I would also like to add that no two farms are alike.

“According to Legislative Fiscal Office, in an Agriculture background brief from 2018, there were 16.3M acres of farmland and the average farm size was 477 acres. In the ag statistics report, 326-acre farms, the closest category reported to the average, only have economic sales between \$10,000 and \$99,999.

“Small farms in Oregon: less than \$10K in annual sales

- Account for 61% of the total farms in the state
- Own only 14% of the farmland
- Generate less than 2% of the Ag sales in the state

“Medium farms: \$10K to \$250K in annual sales

- Account for 31% of the total farms in the state
- Own 35% of the farmland
- Generate 11% of the total ag sales in the state

“Large farms: greater than \$250K (~315 of those are over \$2.5M)

- 8% of the total farms in the state
- Own 56% of the farmland
- Generate 87% of the total ag sales in the state

“The reality is small, medium, and large farms in Oregon, almost all have one thing in common – they are family owned and operated. 96.7% of all Oregon farms are family owned and operated. They are multi-generational, they are stewards of the land, and they feed the world.

“I voted no for this bill in committee, and I still don’t like it. The real solutions to Ag OT were ignored in 2022 when a partisan bill passed out of this body and was unfairly burdened on all farmers in this state. However, I am going to cast a reluctant yes vote today. Because if this bill helps just one family farm from the devastating effects of HB 2004 from 2022, then it is worth it.... until the day we can repeal Ag Overtime all together.”

HB 2058 (A-Engrossed) – Scharf requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“Almost one year ago, on March 1<sup>st</sup>, I stood in this chamber and spoke about the harm that Ag Overtime would bring to the entire agriculture industry, and specifically how it would affect farms of all sizes across the state.

“In 2022, multiple amendments were proposed to help all farmers and all farm workers, but they were ignored. The only thing offered as a solution in HB 2004 was contained in Section 6c. It said:

‘No later than September 30, 2022, the State Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Business Development Department shall make recommendations for legislation to a regular or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to agriculture regarding available options for establishing a grant program, loan program or lending program to which \$10 million will be allocated for the purpose of providing financial assistance to employers to mitigate the costs associated with compliance with the overtime compensation requirements.’

“Today, HB 2058 A addresses that \$10M allocation by developing a state loan program. This ‘pay day loan’ will allow farms with less than \$3M in gross income to take out state loans to pay their Ag OT payroll expenses. “There are good parts of this bill. It will help save the lives of those who overdose, but it does nothing to encourage those struggling with addiction to stop doing drugs. It just makes it easier to survive an overdose. We can do better.”

HB 2395 (A-Engrossed) – Morgan requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“I have been heavily invested in the conversations surrounding the Opioid epidemic as it has had a devastating effect on my friends, family and community. While there are many powerful tools in this package that I do support, actions that will save lives, I could not vote in favor of this bill. This has been touted as this session’s big opioid victory, however throughout the conversations surrounding this bill, long term recovery and support for getting off drugs was left by the wayside.

“I cannot in good conscience support legislation that does not adhere to the intent and will of the voters to help their fellow citizen find a better quality of life. If all we are doing is enabling the cycle of addiction, we are not doing right by our citizens. We need to do better, and I hope that by not supporting this legislation I can get the conversation around long term recovery started. My goal is that a person not need to be administered a short-acting opioid antagonist, and instead can live free of the drain and pain that comes with addiction.”

- The bill provides great protection for tenants, at the expense of landlords. We should not treat landlords poorly simply because they oversee a property.
- The state continues to follow a Housing First policy which:
  - 1) Doesn't work (relies on skewed data) and
  - 2) Continues to fund non-profits for a policy that does not benefit communities, including our homeless population,
- Modular Housing provision excludes manufactured housing — one of the most cost-effective ways to build and deploy affordable housing.

“In total, there were too many concerns to get me to support the HB 2001B on the House Floor, and therefore I voted no.”

“I am writing to express my opposition vote on HB 3201 A. I believe that this bill will give more authority to an agency that has been ineffective with the authority that they have had for the past 3 years. When the Broadband office was started there was millions of dollars, now there are hundreds of millions. At the beginning, and throughout the past 3 years, the agency has had the opportunity to make rules and set up the funds. In fact, we were hopeful that the office would do so and identify where the connectivity needs were.

“The issue I find in this bill is that it removes the definitions of ‘unserved’ and ‘underserved’ which leaves that to the office to determine. Currently the preference is to grant first to unserved and second to underserved. They could have made these distinctions with the maps provided to them 3 years ago but now I believe oversight is necessary and the legislature can now make the decision about where the money needs to go. The agency has taken an unacceptable approach and therefore I have concerns about expanding their rulemaking authority.”

HB 3201 (A-Engrossed) – Reschke requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“HB 3201A’s intent is to see high speed, broadband access expanded all across Oregon — to ensure unserved and underserved communities get the high-speed internet they need. However, my opposition to HB 3201A is not to prevent Oregon from benefiting from such Federal Funding, which will be substantial. Instead my No vote was simply to let the Senate know that I believe there is more work to be done.

“In its present form I believe HB 3201A removes important statutory safeguards to ensure taxpayer money is spent to provide broadband access to Oregonians who otherwise will not receive it. If I believed the House had the appetite to address my concerns I would’ve made a motion on the floor to send this bill back to committee.

“I think this bill could be improved by making the following two changes:

“First: The requirement that funds be prioritized to projects in unserved or under-served locations, must align with federal guidance. I think HB 3201 needs to be crystal clear concerning this policy to the Broadband Office. Another way of stating this is to say, HB 3201A should clearly define ‘unserved’ and ‘underserved’ locations by aligning those definitions with those used by federal programs.

“Second, this legislation should include a challenge process that clarifies that if a location is successfully challenged, funds will not be awarded for that location. I believe that process should specify the application itself need not be rejected in whole — just the challenged location. This is a process that benefits both applicants and taxpayers.

“It is my job as a legislator to provide clear statutory direction and legislative intent. In my opinion, HB 3201A still falls short of those objectives. I look forward to the possibility of voting yes on a concurrence measure, after the Senate has addressed these issues.”

Chaichi in Chair.

SB 4 (B-Engrossed) – Chaichi requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“I want to begin by saying I deeply appreciate the work that has gone into SB 4, and the thoughtful amendments made to protect valuable land in our state. As a lifelong Beavertonian and Washington county resident I know that good tech jobs have been important to families and our community, as is protection of land outside the urban growth boundary (UGB). Family wage job creation in our state, especially during a time of increasing economic inequality, is also important. But, I also want to be sure that while we build prosperity for current generations we are building a world where future generations can prosper in a habitable climate.

“As I mentioned, the amendments around the UGB are appreciated. But it's not just the footprint of the actual land we should think about, the carbon footprint of semiconductor manufacturing is also quite significant. Semiconductor manufacturing produces hazardous waste, complex air emissions, and uses literal tons of water. Our state has spent years under resourcing important state agencies related to protecting our natural resources and environment. Yet throughout my many conversations related to this bill I am not convinced that we will see adequate investment in the agencies tasked with regulating negative climate impacts. For that reason, I regretfully could not support this bill.”

SB 4 (B-Engrossed) – Levy B requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“Colleagues, the more I talk to my constituents over the years, the more I see agricultural workers spiral into dissatisfaction with state government. Nearly ten years ago the legislature passed what we called the Grand Bargain, which designated land in Washington County specified as rural and urban reserve. Now we are undermining that Grand Bargain, allowing farmland to be used for industrial purposes.

“Oregon’s agriculture industry is the most diverse in the nation, thanks to incredible land and soil producing 220 high-quality agricultural products grown across the state. Beaver State agriculture has a \$33.3 billion economic footprint representing 15.4% of Oregon’s economy and over 20% of jobs.

“To convert valuable agricultural land into paved industrial sites is to permanently destroy natural and working lands. This conversion prevents once fertile soil from sequestering carbon and supporting our food system forever. 40% of the 4.6 million acres of high-value farmland soils in Oregon are in the Willamette Valley. Around 3.4 million acres of high value soils are located outside urban growth boundaries and are zoned for agriculture.

“Senate Bill 4 fails to consider whether the lands chosen for industrial sites are high value farmland soils. These properties are not simply undeveloped cheap land – they are a vital part of Oregon’s economy. We desperately need our agricultural lands to ensure that we can sustainably feed and clothe our population. Several decades from now, we may not want or even need microchips. People will always need food, and paving over farmland to create industrial sites destroys it for hundreds of years without the possibility of reversal.

“Colleagues, I urge you to vote no on the current version of Senate Bill 4. As a member of the Joint Semiconductors Committee, it pains me to ask for your opposition after a difficult few months and hard work by the committee chairs and co-chairs. However, there is a better way forward that we need to consider, and our farmers cannot afford to wait and see how we will feed fellow Oregonians if agricultural land is unilaterally re-zoned for this project.”

SB 4 (B-Engrossed) – Reschke requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“Semiconductor development and manufacturing is an important part of Oregon’s economy. Ensuring this industry’s health and growth is essential. However I voted no on SB 4B for the following reasons.

- There are no guarantees of funding or development from the federal government. The economic impact is both speculative and indeterminate, especially for rural Oregon. SB 4 B allocates over \$200 million to attract specific businesses to the state at a time when the economy is anything but certain. Recently state economists warned the legislature of a potential recession during the next biennium.
- With SB 4 B there are significant land use policy implications; moreover, the broad increase in Executive authority without a guarantee of success is concerning. SB 4 B’s land use considerations are not how a democratic-elected republic should govern. One person should not be authorized

with such power in determining potential winners and losers. That is certainly not the Oregon way.

“On the whole, if Oregon had a friendly tax policy and flexible land use laws, SB 4 B would be unnecessary. Businesses would, without much thought, expand their current operations in Oregon and new CHIP manufactures would open operations in our beloved state. While federal funding for CHIP development and manufacturing is a great opportunity, this is a wake-up call for the Oregon legislature to rethink how we tax businesses and how land use laws discourage companies, of all types, from finding Oregon the most attractive option.”

SB 4 (B-Engrossed) – Scharf requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“Oregon’s statewide land use planning program was created in 1973 when the Legislative Assembly passed the Oregon Land Use Act. Under that program all cities and counties adopted comprehensive plans that meet mandatory state standards. These regulations have resulted in 50 years of success protecting farm and forest land, containing urban sprawl, and protecting natural resources. SB 4B completely undermines this act.

“Section 10 of SB 4B gives the Governor a one-time fast pass around Oregon’s 50-year land use laws. While supporters will say that Section 10 is a one-time deal, has restrictions and is only to attract semiconductor businesses to Oregon, I would disagree.

“There are no geographical location sideboards for the application of this new power given to the Governor. While it may seem obvious to most that the two ‘super sites’ greater than 500 acres will most likely be placed in proximity to existing semiconductor companies in the Silicon Forest area of Washington County, it is not a requirement. The parcels are only required to be within three miles of the urban growth boundary (UGB). Even if that is the case, there is some high value farmland in that area which produces food for Oregonians and provides jobs for families and their employees. Farmland that once it is paved over can never be reclaimed.

“The six other sites allowed under Section 10 are required to be under 500 acres in size. These six sites are also not restricted by any geographic area and could easily be 499 acre ‘semiconductor supply chain support campuses’. These ‘support campuses’ could be placed anywhere in the state. For comparison’s sake, 500 acres is a large amount of land...a football field is approximately one acre, the Woodburn outlet mall is approximately 40 acres and Washington Park is 410 acres.

“Additionally, large open parcels of land flank our major highway corridors. I-5, HWY 22, HWY 26 corridor, HWY 20, etc. Many of those parcels are within three miles of a UGB and would all be permissible per Section 10. These sprawling parcels of land are also some of the most valuable farmlands in the state. Those parcels in the Willamette Valley alone produce over \$2.3 billion in ag products annually. Again, farmland that is paved over can never be reclaimed.

“Lastly, there is no guarantee that the federal government is going to invest and approve grants through the Oregon Business Development Department. The legislature is providing broad authority to the Governor with no assurance.

“Protecting our farmland and ensuring we are fiscally responsible is of grave importance, and that is why I am opposing SB 4B.”

SB 4 (B-Engrossed) – Stout requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal.

“After weeks of public hearings, work sessions and many conversations with fellow law makers revolving around SB 4-B and the Semi-Conductors for America Act, two words come to mind today with this vote on what could prove to be unique to this state - Reactionary vs. Visionary.

“Like so many of the bills that come before our legislators year after year, we stop and admit to a struggle in our decision making on any number of them because there is some good, a step in the right direction, or ‘a start’ to fixing a problem. Still, we say they do not go far enough, and we are disappointed in the fact we could have done better. This bill in my mind is one of those quarters in the overall game.

“What we are seeing today on SB 4-B is in my opinion a reactionary attempt in one specific private business sector to attract millions of federal dollars to Oregon. I do not wish to dismiss or in any way diminish the difficult process the committees were tasked with at the start of this session to craft something that ‘might’ give our State a shot at something good. Time was short and the job was enormous. Still, I feel we have seen this approach play out before and there is no guarantee that any of these monies will achieve the desired lofty end results of the aspirational visions of those in the arena in this current legislation.

“I, as the representative for House District 31, have the unique perspective of having cities and communities in our part of rural Washington County that are living in the shadows of the likes of Intel and other high-tech companies. While many are wishful for expansion and a piece of the pie there are just as many who are fearful for their way of life in their farm and agricultural businesses that are a rock throw away from being wiped out. In Columbia County, there are hundreds of correctly zoned and planned areas for light industrial and high-tech companies to locate to, yet attracting them to come has proven difficult over the years. It is a unique perspective, and this legislation will most likely play a role – one that we just do not know how it will play out - and have no assurance of success or measure thereof.

“My ‘no’ vote today is a signal for us all to come together to craft visionary legislation at all levels that reflects the diverse nature of our communities. It is a signal that we need not end run our land use and planning system for one industry. It is a statement that we need to honor prior agreements and laws set in place to ensure stability to our businesses and farmers as opposed to giving the governor power to put in place piecemeal exceptions. This is to say that there are significant land use policies implicated for no reason and the broad increase in Executive authority is concerning. Furthermore, the economic impact for rural Oregon, my district, is both speculative and unclear at best. Ultimately it is the land use component of this bill that is the overriding factor for my vote today and this is in no way a reflection or statement that I do not support our business community or economic growth in this specific sector of Oregon's economy.”

“I stand before you today in opposition to HB 3443. This bill seeks to protect tenants who are victims of a bias crime by relieving them of any damages resulting from the crime and allowing them to stay in their rental agreement without fear of eviction. On the surface, this may sound like a good idea; however, this bill is misguided and threatens to create more problems than it solves.

“Rather than helping victims of bias crimes, HB 3443 will actually put them in danger by creating a disincentive for landlords to intervene or take action if they suspect a tenant is being the victim of such a crime. In addition, this bill would give tenants an incentive not to report any potential bias crimes occurring on their premises out of fear that they will be financially responsible for damages or evicted due to the incident.

“Moreover, HB 3443 would also place an undue financial burden on landlords who often operate within slim margins and can ill afford such losses. As an unintended consequence, landlords may pass these costs onto other tenants in the form of higher rent prices or discourage new tenants from entering into leases altogether—resulting in disruption of our housing market. This bill would place an unnecessary financial burden on landlords who, in many cases, operate within very tight budgets. The damage resulting from the commission of a bias crime can be incredibly expensive; this bill would require landlords to absorb these costs with no additional compensation.

“Moreover, this bill does not address the root causes of such crimes; instead, it penalizes landlords for something that is out of their control. Rather than creating legislation that shifts the burden of responsibility away from perpetrators onto property owners, we should be looking for ways to prevent bias crimes from occurring in the first place.

“Finally, I worry that this bill might have an unintended consequence of scaring tenants away from reporting potential bias crimes out of fear they will be financially responsible or evicted due

to the incident. We need to ensure that tenants feel safe and secure in their homes—not create incentives for them to stay quiet about any possible discriminatory behavior.

“In conclusion, HB 3443 is misguided and would do more harm than good by causing financial hardship for landlords and disincentivizing tenants from reporting potential bias crimes.”

If these civil rights coordinators are so necessary now, why hasn't there been such a need for them in the previous years?”

“Today I stand before you to oppose HB 3471 which would make it unlawful for employers to require workers to enter into settlement agreements that contain provisions barring them from seeking further employment or reinstatement with the same employer. I understand why this law may seem necessary on the surface level, but it will actually do more harm than good in the long run.

“First and foremost, this law's main purpose is to protect workers from feeling trapped in their positions with no chance of advancement. However, this protection comes at a cost: it removes the employer's ability to both incentivize and retain their top-performing employees. This means that employers would have less incentive to offer wage increases and promotions, since once an employee reaches a certain level of seniority, they cannot be removed from their position. This could create stagnation within the workplace and result in fewer opportunities for career growth for employees.

“Furthermore, if employers are unable to incentivize their employees with meaningful career advancement opportunities due to this new law, those same employees may look elsewhere for better options—which could lead to a shortage of qualified workers in certain industries or sectors. In addition, this new law could potentially discourage employers from hiring new talent since they would face an increased risk of losing quality staff should they choose not to renew an expired agreement.

“Finally, this proposed law stands in direct opposition to what is already established by many state laws across the country: that employment relationships are ‘at-will’ meaning either party can terminate at any time for any reason (or no reason). By banning all settlement agreements that include a provision barring workers from seeking further employment or reemployment with the same employer, we are effectively taking away an employer's right to modify existing contracts and removing an important tool used by businesses when hiring new candidates—all without taking into consideration any potential impacts on existing labor relationships or business practices as a whole.

“In conclusion, while this bill may seem like a good way of protecting workers' rights on the surface, its implications will far outweigh any potential benefits it may bring. The detriment it could cause businesses over time is simply too great and could result in fewer job opportunities overall instead of more.”

It is equally unfair to then also expect our first responders to risk their own lives and safety to effect rescues in this instance.

"There is no amount of careful crafting that can make right a policy that intentionally and deliberately would place people—and in particular people in need of affordable housing—deliberately into harms way. I believe that we can do better."

“Furthermore, this bill does nothing to address the underlying issue of unfair labor practices. Instead, it simply shifts the burden from one party (the subcontractor) to another (the contractor). This may provide a short-term solution but does nothing to solve the root problem.

“Finally, I would like to point out that this bill also puts third parties at risk of being held liable for unpaid wages or contributions not made as part of employee compensation. This could create a situation where third parties face potential liability without any prior knowledge or involvement in a dispute between two separate parties.

“In conclusion, I urge you to vote no on House Bill 2057 on the grounds that it unfairly punishes small businesses and entrepreneurs while providing little protection against unfair labor practices.”

"I am a trial attorney and before every case, I dig into the details to learn all the facts of the matter before trial. I do the same with legislation. When I learned House Bill 2178 would come to the House Floor, I gathered all the facts available and determined that I would vote 'no' on this bill.

"I voted 'no' for three reasons:

- 1) The bill would provide an additional burden on agencies, primarily Department of Corrections, already tasked with numerous operative and budgetary matters.
- 2) Persons who are incarcerated in Oregon do not themselves receive any significant compensation for their services and putting them to work for less than what the job merits is akin to involuntary servitude.
- 3) Projected out, this bill risks making it possible to take advantage of low-wage labor. Incarcerated persons doing work for the state should be paid an appropriate wage and the work should have a narrow and specific role contributing to the benefit of and cost saving for the State of Oregon itself. For example, building furniture and the like for Oregon agencies.

"Oregon Corrections Enterprises does great work. Oregon is a state that treats adults incarcerated with respect, much like the sponsor of this measure indicated during his floor remarks. That said, I still voted 'no' on this measure for the reasons expressed above.

"My father was a minister. In our household, our dinner table conversations were about how we can make the world a better place. That's what I'm trying to do here in the legislature, and I believe my vote today was an important step to doing that. Should this legislation pass, I will work with my colleagues to ensure it is implemented in a way that moves Oregon forward."

HB 2178 – Neron requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

"I believe strongly that our correctional facilities should be providing work training and opportunities for meaningful work as a way of promoting successful reintegration and a reduction in recidivism rates. Oregon Corrections Enterprises (OCE) provides these opportunities—and, in turn, provides state agencies with furniture and other items that are truly beautiful.

"However, I voted against this bill because I have deep concerns about the approach taken in HB 2178. First, it's an added layer of unnecessary bureaucracy on state agencies; they're already working closely with OCE. Adults in custody are getting meaningful opportunities, and agencies are getting quality products. More bureaucratic processes aren't needed.

"Second, I worry that this bill could cause OCE to significantly expand in order to meet increased demand, turning it into a high-volume manufacturing operation rather than the thoughtful, successful training and rehabilitation program it is today. There's an important line we must maintain between work training opportunities and exploitative, forced prison labor. I worry that HB 2178 crosses that line."

“These locally elected boards are responsible for making budget and policy governance decisions at the local level as representatives of the community college district voters. I oppose changing this governing authority and replacing it with a rigid, statewide multiplier that is mandated by the state.”

“ORS 171.134 is a statute applicable to the legislature, and for which the legislature is the sole judge of whether a measure is in compliance. In a 2020 case, the Oregon Supreme Court, in considering another legislative enactment, stated that ‘even assuming [the measure summary of the statute at issue] violated ORS 171.134, neither ORS 174.134 nor any other source of law suggests that [the statute in question] might be invalid for that reason.’ *City of Damascus v. State by and through Brown*, 367 Or. 41, 54 (footnote 6) (2020). *Damascus* is the only court case that has considered the meaning of ORS 171.134. In other words, the Supreme Court has determined that each house of the legislature is the sole judge of compliance with ORS 171.134.

“As you know, custom, usage and precedent play a significant role in parliamentary procedure. Under section 4 of *Mason's Manual*, custom, usage and precedent is given greater precedential weight than statutes in determining legislative procedure. Since ORS 174.134 was enacted in 1979, the overwhelming majority of enacted legislative measures have not scored a Flesch readability test of 60 or greater. Accordingly, the custom, usage and precedent of the House is that Flesch readability test scores of measure summaries are not considered in determining whether to enact a measure.

“House Rule 14.15 provides that a measure may not be accepted at the Desk for introduction unless it is accompanied by an impartial summary. If there is a material error in a printed summary, it is to be brought to the attention of the Legislative Counsel, who shall correct the summary. The measure summary is also to be modified to reflect amendments. Significantly, HR 14.15 does not reference ORS 171.134. Under section 4 of *Mason's Manual*, adopted rules like HR 14.15 are granted greater precedential weight than statutes. HR 14.15 can be read to require objections to the measure summary to be raised earlier than when

a measure is third read; namely, as soon as practicable after the measure is first read or, if the objection is to changes made following engrossing, as soon as practicable after the engrossed bill is posted to OLIS. Accordingly, an objection to the measure summary is not timely made if made during third reading of the measure.”

HB 2002 (B-Engrossed) – Conrad requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“HB-2002 is an omnibus Reproductive Health Rights bill that addresses numerous aspects of reproductive health care. I support this bill because, overall, I think its cumulative impact will strengthen Oregon’s health care system. Specifically, it will provide support to people in need of critical healthcare services by allowing them to make the best decisions for themselves based upon their individual circumstances. The bill accomplishes this by providing legal protections for patients, providers, and staff while ensuring medically necessary treatments are covered by insurance.

“A few key points in the bill include (all section references are to the B-engrossed bill):

1. Defines ‘Reproductive Health Care’ (Section 2).
2. States ‘Every individual has a fundamental right to make decisions about the individual’s reproductive health...’ (Section 3).
3. Protects a person’s right to make decisions regarding their reproductive health (Sections 4 - 6).
4. Allows public employees to abstain from providing reproductive health care information and services if they are contrary to their religious beliefs and establishes a process to ensure the patient receives the services (Section 7).
5. Prohibits insurance companies and coordinated care organizations from denying medically necessary gender affirming treatment that is prescribed in accordance with standards of care and directs them to contract with providers in their networks (Sections 20 & 24).
6. Provides legal protections for health care providers and individuals who provide legal reproductive health care in Oregon (Sections 31 – 38).

“Reproductive Health Care

“As a member of the House Behavioral Health and Health Care Committee, I voted “No” on advancing this bill to the floor due to

my concerns about providing reproductive health care to minors, particularly children under 15 years old, without the involvement of their parents. After the work session, I continued researching and discussing my concerns with medical and mental health care practitioners. Although I remain cautious about the possibility of providing reproductive health services to minors without active involvement of their parents or guardians, this bill does not change the treatment currently being provided – rather, it ensures equitable access to reproductive health care for all Oregonians. Polls show that 72% of Oregonians support abortion in most or all cases, and this bill does not alter abortion services currently being provided, but instead codifies existing practices and provides legal protections for service providers.

“It became clear during the public hearings for this bill that my legislative colleagues share my concern about parental involvement in children’s crucial healthcare decisions. However, as a police officer for 14 years, I also know that many children have irresponsible or absentee parents who sometimes leave children to fend for themselves. In these situations, children are left to rely on kind and caring adults such as parents or friends or other members of their extended family to help them. I want to ensure these teenagers are not forgotten and have the option to receive the health care they need with the help and support of other responsible adults. So, while it is possible that some bad actors may take advantage of this lack of parental notification requirement, it is also true that doctors and other medical providers continue to have mandatory reporting requirements and standards of care to adhere to which provide protections for minors in these situations.

“Gender-Affirming Care

“Another main point of contention for this bill is the possibility of providing gender affirming care to minors with minimal or no parental involvement. Gender affirming care in the United States and in Oregon has been practiced for several decades, and this bill does not change the services that are already being provided. Further, most major U.S. medical associations, including those in the fields of pediatrics, endocrinology, psychiatry, and psychology, have issued statements recognizing the medical necessity and appropriateness of gender affirming care for youth, typically noting harmful effects of denying access to these services.

“It is important to understand that there are several different categories of treatment that fall under this gender affirming care umbrella. Some are reversible, such as mental health counseling and choosing different clothing or pronoun usage, while others are partially reversible, such as hormone treatment. These treatments are the primary focus of treatment for those who experience gender dysphoria, especially young people, and are consistent with the current international ‘standards of care’ (SOC) for gender affirming treatment as described by the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH) 8. Those who seek more permanent treatment are almost always older teens or adults who make these more significant choices after months or years of gender affirming care.

“For people of all ages, these SOC recommend a multi-disciplinary team approach to treating people and adolescents with suspected gender dysphoria, including a primary care provider, endocrinologist, and behavioral health specialist, along with other disciplines. Per WPATH 8, the recommended SOC for treatment of adolescents includes clear standards which must be met prior to treatment, including:

- The adolescent must experience sustained duration of dysphoria/incongruence (6.12.b), and

- They need to demonstrate emotional and cognitive maturity (6.12.c), and
- Providers must ensure their mental health concerns are addressed (6.12.d).

“My concerns are lessened knowing medical providers have adopted and are adhering to these standards. I trust that highly trained medical professionals and the respective licensing boards will address any lax practitioners that prove too eager to provide irreversible medical treatment to minors.

“The subject matters addressed in this bill, abortion and gender affirming care, are emotional topics both nationally and in Oregon, particularly when minors are involved. The crux of this bill does not change existing practices, which ensure that every patient’s healthcare needs are met by protecting their freedom to make independent health care decisions with the support of their family and medical professionals. To meet people’s needs, healthcare providers need the ability to provide services unfettered by public opinion and harassment, or by government interference.

“My ‘Yes’ vote is a vote supporting those who are facing difficult circumstances, supporting providers focused on ensuring equitable and appropriate healthcare is provided to people of all ages, and supporting people’s rights to choose what is right for them.”

HB 2002 (B-Engrossed) – Cramer requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“I voted no on HB 2002-B for the same reasons I spoke to on the House Floor. HB 2002-B rolls back parental involvement in permanent, life, and body-altering procedures.

“The policies we propagate as a House of Representatives influence Oregonians’ behaviors. By degrading the relationship between parent and child, I fear we risk discouraging parents from taking responsibility for their children’s well-being.

“We should instead be pursuing policies that encourage parental involvement. Many other states have a default of parental knowledge and consent. For instance, where a parent is not acting in the best interest of a child, there are other ways to proceed. But the default is parental engagement. We have alternatives, but HB 2002-B rejects that middle ground for extreme policies that shut out parents from the very beginning.”

HB 2002 (B-Engrossed) – Helfrich requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“Today, I voted ‘no’ today on House Bill 2002-B.

“There are many parts of this bill that I have problems with, but my biggest issue is this bill strips parents of their right to be involved in their child’s life-altering medical decisions.

“There are bad parents in our state. I don’t deny that. But the overwhelming majority parents are good and try to do right by their children. Just because we may disagree with how someone raises their child does not mean the parents are neglectful, abusive, or dangerous.

“To quote Chief Justice Berger when writing the opinion of the court in *Parham v. J.R.*, 442 U.S. 584 (1979):

“The law’s concept of the family rests on a presumption that parents possess what a child lacks in maturity, experience, and capacity for judgment required for making life’s difficult decisions. More important, historically it has recognized that

natural bonds of affection lead parents to act in the best interests of their children.

“The statist notion that governmental power should supersede parental authority in all cases because some parents abuse and neglect children is repugnant to American tradition.

“Simply because the decision of a parent is not agreeable to a child or because it involves risks does not automatically transfer the power to make that decision from the parents to some agency or officer of the state.”

“I believe the best people to raise a child are the parents, not the state. In my opinion, House Bill 2002-B removes parental involvement and awareness from important situations. I support children, parents and families over the government which is why I voted ‘no’ on House Bill 2002-B.”

SCR 15 – Read first time and passed to Speaker's desk for referral.

Osborne moved that, in compliance with Article IV, Section 19 of the Oregon Constitution, and notwithstanding any provision of the Rules of the House of Representatives of the Eighty-Second Legislative Assembly, the requirement that on its final passage each bill shall be read section by section be suspended for HB 2005 and that it be read by title only.

Speaker in Chair.

Motion carried on viva voce vote.

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Read third time as Special Order of business.

Reschke rose to a point of order regarding whether or not HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) met the provisions of ORS 171.134 and House Rule 14.15.

Speaker ruled that HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) does comply with ORS 171.134 and HR 14.15, citing an opinion received from Legislative Counsel dated May 1, 2023.

“ORS 171.134 is a statute applicable to the legislature, and for which the legislature is the sole judge of whether a measure is in compliance. In a 2020 case, the Oregon Supreme Court, in considering another legislative enactment, stated that ‘even assuming [the measure summary of the statute at issue] violated ORS 171.134, neither ORS 174.134 nor any other source of law suggests that [the statute in question] might be invalid for that reason.’ *City of Damascus v. State by and through Brown*, 367 Or.

41, 54 (footnote 6) (2020). *Damascus* is the only court case that has considered the meaning of ORS 171.134. In other words, the Supreme Court has determined that each house of the legislature is the sole judge of compliance with ORS 171.134.

“As you know, custom, usage and precedent play a significant role in parliamentary procedure. Under section 4 of *Mason's Manual*, custom, usage and precedent is given greater precedential weight than statutes in determining legislative procedure. Since ORS 174.134 was enacted in 1979, the overwhelming majority of enacted legislative measures have not scored a Flesch readability test of 60 or greater. Accordingly, the custom, usage and precedent of the House is that Flesch readability test scores of measure summaries are not considered in determining whether to enact a measure.

“House Rule 14.15 provides that a measure may not be accepted at the Desk for introduction unless it is accompanied by an impartial summary. If there is a material error in a printed summary, it is to be brought to the attention of the Legislative Counsel, who shall correct the summary. The measure summary is also to be modified to reflect amendments. Significantly, HR 14.15 does not reference ORS 171.134. Under section 4 of *Mason's Manual*, adopted rules like HR 14.15 are granted greater precedential weight than statutes. HR 14.15 can be read to require objections to the measure summary to be raised earlier than when a measure is third read; namely, as soon as practicable after the measure is first read or, if the objection is to changes made following engrossing, as soon as practicable after the engrossed bill is posted to OLIS. Accordingly, an objection to the measure summary is not timely made if made during third reading of the measure.”

Reschke, joined by Boshart Davis, appealed the ruling of the Chair.

The decision of the Chair was sustained, the vote being: Yeas, 34; Nays, 24 – Boice, Boshart Davis, Breese-Iverson, Cate, Conrad, Cramer, Diehl, Elmer, Goodwin, Helfrich, Javadi, Levy B, Lewis, Mannix, McIntire, Morgan, Osborne, Owens, Reschke, Scharf, Smith G, Stout, Wallan, Wright; Excused, 2 – Hieb, Ruiz.

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Carried by Reynolds, Evans.

Reschke rose to a point of order stating that events that happened in another state are not relevant to an Oregon bill.

Speaker ruled to allow the comments.

House recessed until 1:15 p.m. on motion of Smith G.

By unanimous consent, on request of Smith G, use of visual aid permitted during debate on bill.

Call of the House demanded by Reschke, joined by Mannix, Stout, Javadi, Scharf, Helfrich. All present except: Excused (not subject to Call), 1 – Hieb.

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – On passage of the bill the vote was: Yeas, 35; Nays, 24 – Boice, Boshart Davis, Breese-Iverson, Cate, Conrad, Cramer, Diehl, Elmer, Goodwin, Helfrich, Javadi, Levy B, Lewis, Mannix, McIntire, Morgan, Osborne, Owens, Reschke, Scharf, Smith G, Stout, Wallan, Wright; Excused, 1 – Hieb. Bill passed.

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Conrad requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“HB 2005 B is a compilation of HB 2006 & HB 2007, which combine to significantly change Oregon laws regarding firearms. HB 2005 B does several things (all section references are to 2005 B):

1. Bans/restricts the sale, transfer, and manufacturing of unserialized or undetectable firearms (ghost guns) and firearm components (Sections 1 -5, 14, 16-17)

2. Raises the age to possess/purchase a firearm to 21, unless specific exemptions are met (Sections 6 – 7, 15)

3. Prohibits possessing firearms on public property if the government entity has banned them (Sections 8-12)

“The tragic number of mass shootings and incidents involving gun violence throughout the country is shameful and a sad commentary on the inability of people in our society to cope with stress and accept people who are different. Unfortunately, the popular media narrative by some outlets only serves to foster fear and confusion in people who are unable to rationally manage their thoughts and actions. This media influence, combined with the lack of a sufficient mental and behavioral health system, are only two ingredients in a complex issue long in the making.

“I voted ‘No’ on HB 2005 B because it is unconstitutional and will not solve the gun violence problem in our country or state. Specifically, the sections restricting the possession of firearms by people 18 -20 years old has already been deemed unconstitutional in numerous courts cases at various levels throughout the country. Each of these cases decided that constitutional rights vests in people when they turn 18, including:

“As a result, this bill is likely to be immediately challenged upon passage and tied up in court for an extended period of time, and then likely overturned. I respect the bill's proponents and their desire to stem the tide of gun violence, but unfortunately I don't think the proposed legislation will be the solution.

“I also have concerns with other aspects of the bill such as the lack of a definition for ‘adjacent grounds’ as used in Sections 8 -12, and how the bans on unserialized and undetectable guns will be implemented given that many people currently own guns that fall into this category. But my principal opposition is to the age limits - I will not support legislation that is clearly unconstitutional.

“In the meantime, my focus is on repairing our failed mental and behavioral health system in order to identify and help people who might commit these crimes in the first place and restrict them from owning or accessing guns. Additionally, we need to focus on our judicial system to prosecute criminals so that they can't repeat their crimes, but more importantly, we need to improve our community youth programs to help them avoid pursuing a lifestyle of gun violence.

“The legal use of firearms by responsible guns owners should not be abridged, but I think it is incumbent on all of us to craft a society and culture where resorting to shooting someone is not the first, nor the second, impulse. Working together, we can achieve this vision by investing in and strengthening our mental and behavioral health system.”

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Cramer requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“According to the United Supreme Court's jurisprudence, HB 2005-B is likely an unconstitutional infringement on my constituent's civil rights as prescribed by the Oregon and United States Constitutions.

“The current policy of the State of Oregon is that discrimination based on age ‘threatens individual rights and privileges and menaces the institutions and foundations of a free democratic state’ (OAR 839-005-0000). Yet, HB 2005-B discriminates based on age to buy a firearm.

“HB 2005-B restricts the rights of law-abiding citizens to defend themselves in public spaces. Those who are most vulnerable to being harmed by violent crime are the ones who need this right the most. Those are my constituents. Yet, HB 2005-B unconstitutionally restricts when and where they can protect themselves with a firearm.

“Finally, as this body reduces criminal penalties for many crimes, this bill will make felons out of law-abiding gun owners overnight for exercising their constitutional right to possess a firearm.

“I took an oath to uphold the Constitution. I could not, in good conscience, vote for this bill.”

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Elmer requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“The U.S. Supreme Court has previously ruled that laws like HB 2005(B) are unconstitutional. Schools will not be safer if we strip law abiding citizens of their Second Amendment rights. Amongst many other reasons, I was a ‘no’ on this bill because of how it will perpetuate the discriminatory nature of gun control laws. Additionally, legislation like this will disproportionately impact black and disabled communities in Oregon.”

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Helfrich requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

“Today, I voted against House Bill 2005-B. While I am a gun owner myself and a strong supporter of our 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment rights, those are not why I voted against the bill. I voted against the bill because I worry about the time and money that will be spent defending this unconstitutional policy in the courts.

“It is no secret that this bill will be challenged in the courts. I received countless emails from Oregonians in my district and around the state telling me the lawsuits are already being drafted.

“I voted ‘no’ today because our state cannot afford to defend this bill.

“In November 2022, the voters of this state passed Measure 114. There was immediately a lawsuit and implementation of the measure has been paused as the courts deliberate.

“On February 17<sup>th</sup>, the Department of Justice told me they had been billed \$223,409.13 to date for the work on Measure 114 litigation. Nearly a quarter million dollars. And that was two and a half months ago! What does that number look like now? How much additional money will the state spend defending House Bill 2005-B in court?

“Our state is facing lower revenue and a tightened budget. Projects around the state are getting delayed or cancelled because the state does not have the funds for completion. So, why are we moving forward with a bill that will cost our state precious resources to defend in court?

“Oregon cannot afford House Bill 2005-B. That is why I voted ‘no.’”

HB 2005 (B-Engrossed) – Javadi requested the following explanation for his vote be entered in the Journal:

“I voted ‘No’ on HB 2005-B for several reasons. First and foremost, I believe this bill infringes upon the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding citizens. While I understand the intention behind the legislation is to curb the illegal use and manufacture of firearms, I am concerned that it will primarily impact responsible gun owners.

“Moreover, the bill’s definitions of ‘frame,’ ‘receiver,’ and ‘undetectable firearm’ are vague and could lead to confusion and unintended consequences. This lack of clarity could create a legal grey area for gun owners, manufacturers, and dealers, which could lead to unnecessary complications and potential criminal charges for individuals who are acting in good faith.

“Additionally, I am concerned about the potential burden placed on gun dealers by requiring them to provide the Department of State Police with a description of the unfinished frame or receiver being transferred and obtain a unique approval number. This added layer of bureaucracy may prove cumbersome for small

businesses and ultimately discourage them from participating in the legal firearms market.

“Finally, I believe that this bill fails to address the root causes of gun violence in our communities. Rather than focusing on regulations that primarily affect law-abiding citizens, we should be directing our efforts and resources towards improving mental health services, providing better education and job opportunities, and addressing the socioeconomic factors that contribute to violence.

“For these reasons, I have chosen to vote against HB 2005-B. While I am committed to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of our citizens, I believe that there are more effective and targeted ways to address the issue of gun violence without infringing upon the rights of responsible gun owners.”

HB 3620, 3621 – Introduced, read first time and passed to Speaker’s desk for referral.

Reschke rose to a point of order regarding whether or not HB 3620 and 3621 on today’s First Reading List met the provisions of ORS 171.134 and House Rule 14.15.

Should the committee find additional resources are required, OHA will submit a request for additional funding or positions in the future.'

2. SB 231 never went to Ways & Means. However, a bill with a similar fiscal impact did: namely HB 2005. This demonstrates a major problem in the legislative process where arbitrary decisions are made on how a bill travels through the legislature. For example, sometimes bills are sent to Ways & Means to prevent them from going to a second policy committee in the other chamber — avoiding full public input (as in the case of HB 2005). How a bill travels through the legislature can often mean whether it passes or not. Therefore it is important to have an objective standard.

“My No Vote on SB 231 was to help illustrate these problems with our process and not concerning the policy of the bill.”

"To be negatively impacted by this legislation, a person must:

1. Knowingly act as part of a private paramilitary organization,
2. Be armed with a dangerous or deadly weapon, and
3. Act to either substantially disrupt governmental operation or a proceeding, assume the powers of the government or a peace officer, or interfere with another person's rights.

"Organized paramilitary groups that do not interfere with people expressing their rights are not impacted by this bill. A private military organization is defined as: '...any group of three or more persons associating under a command structure for the purpose of functioning in public or training to function in public as a combat, combat support, law enforcement or security services unit.'

"I will never support organized groups that intentionally train and act to interfere with a person's constitutional rights of freedom of speech and to peacefully assemble. These are two of our most fundamental rights. This bill does not differentiate with respect to political ideologies – it provides a civil remedy to ensure people can exercise their rights uninhibited by others.

"I will always support the entire Constitution and ensure people can exercise their rights."

"There are a few things I would like to clarify regarding my vote of support for HB 2572-A.

"First, this bill does not restrict our right to defend ourselves and our property. In fact, I have supported other legislation which enhances that right.

"Second, I have been fighting all session to strengthen our law enforcement and to make use of our law enforcement to protect our citizens. I will continue in that fight, but I will not move in the direction of supporting vigilante justice.

"This bill is complex, but the essential point is that it allows persons to seek protections against unlawful vigilante groups who pretend to be providing security but are not obeying the commands and restrictions of law enforcement. It allows an individual to seek court action to protect himself or herself against such groups.

"This legislation only affects groups of three or more persons who are associating under a command structure for the purpose of functioning in public as combat support, law enforcement, or security service units, when they are not legally such organizations. The exemptions in this legislation make it clear that this does not apply to our armed forces, our national guard, our organized state militia, our unorganized or reserve militia called into service, groups who carry on historical performances or parades, (such as civil war reenactors), students in military education programs, lawful security service programs, or members of an organization that is authorized under state or federal law to provide paramilitary, law enforcement, or security services, or to engage in paramilitary activity as authorized by law."

“While ORS 471.282 currently allows up to five cases of wine to be shipped, I do believe a nuance exists as unlike cider and beer, wine is often collected and aged.

There is also uneasiness around a candidate not winning an election with a simple majority vote. I look forward to future discussions to make sure we have the most fair and ethical elections possible."

HB 2004 (A-Engrossed) – Wright requested the following explanation of his vote be entered in the Journal:

"I voted 'no' on HB 2004A because I believe ranked-choice voting will lead to confusion and perplexity in our elections. If enacted, HB 2004A will lead to diminishing of trust among Oregon voters and sow further doubt about our election process."

"At a time when we are facing increasing mistrust in our election systems, I believe it is irresponsible to move forward with such a dramatic overhaul of our elections without larger state-wide discussion on a bipartisan basis."

"I also question the fact that under HB 2004A, ranked-choice voting will only apply to the offices of President, Vice President, Governor, and congressional representatives, among others. It will, however, not apply to elections for State Representatives and State

Senators. This will undoubtedly create even more confusion among voters and will most certainly result in an increased number of spoiled ballots as we elect all our candidates using a single-page ballot.

"On top of these concerns, I worry that, if enacted, our election campaigns will no longer be a marketplace for a genuine exchange of free ideas and beliefs about public affairs but will instead become a contest in which no serious policy proposals will be put forward as candidates will aim to appease to 'big tent' electorate, hoping that they will not annoy or infuriate some voters. In that case, our elections will become gloomy, gray contests with no significant ideas and policies proposed.

"Additionally, Oregon is already facing criticism for slow release of voter results and enacting ranked-choice voting threatens even more delays and increased irregularities. It will also be a significant burden on our elections and county officials that will be required to spend significant time and effort learning new system, while also maintaining the old one for our elections to the State Legislature.

"I believe that instituting such a change of election system requires a diligent bipartisan effort that we currently lack. In addition, due to the controversy and scandal surrounding the office of Secretary of State, it is my belief that Oregon is currently in no capacity to successfully implement and rollout such a system – even in 2026 or 2027.

"Oregon also lacks experience and precedent with ranked-choice voting in our history. Oregon has utilized the first-past-the-post system ever since it became a part of the Union in 1859. In the United States, only Maine and Alaska use ranked-choice voting on a statewide level.

"For these reasons stated above, I voted 'no.' "

We need to take immediate action now.

“In addition, it only affects private business, and the subpoena does not apply to other state bodies.

“For this reason stated above, I voted ‘no.’ ”

And if the employer continues to expose workers to significant workplace hazards, employers are appropriately investigated, fined, and punished. This system forces employers and workers to work collaboratively in enforcing and applying occupational safety procedures.

“The effect of this SB 907-A will, in my view, create uncertainty in the workplace and the workforce. What the State should be focusing on is punishing bad actors who shirk their responsibility over their employee safety.

“I am also concerned about the unintended consequences of SB 907-A, including the impact on our communities during public safety emergencies. For example, taken to an extreme application, this bill would allow those responsible as first responders for protecting our communities in times of crisis to refuse to do so because of their apprehension of occupational circumstances.

“Not only is this a dangerous precedent for our communities, but under the bill there is no recourse for those who neglect their responsibilities to community safety.

“While I will continue to work for my community, including for our workers’ interests and small businesses, I do not think this SB 907-A will have the desired effect that proponents seek. Rather it places unnecessary regulatory burdens on employers and the workforce and could have downstream consequences which are not considered.”

“I file this vote explanation today as a bookmark in the record of this legislative body to flag a significant expansion of our state's warrant authority and to explain why I voted against Senate Bill 954.

“Warrants are one of the most powerful tools the state can exercise in its justice system. They authorize law enforcement to enter upon private property, sometimes without warning and armed with guns, to seize property and make arrests at the behest of the government.

“Senate Bill 954A gives judges new authority to issue warrants that can be executed outside of their judicial district when there is ‘interrelated conduct’ relating to suspected violations of our state's marijuana or psilocybin laws. This is an extra-ordinary step, and I was a no vote in committee and on the floor because I believe this new power is not tempered by adequate political accountability.

“Judges stand as the main gatekeeper in the warrant process and take an oath to abide by a set of judicial ethics. Judges are however not infallible; mistakes are made, and warrants are sometimes issued even if probable cause is lacking. When bad warrants are issued, voters can hold their local judge accountable at the ballot box. By contrast, under this bill where a judge can issue an extra-jurisdiction warrant, voters in neighboring districts where the warrant is executed are unable to express their dissent through the election process.

“I believe this bill also opens the door for judge shopping, where law enforcement and prosecutors will look outside of their jurisdiction for magistrates who are more readily inclined to approve a warrant application. Whether this cherry-picking is done purposefully or subconsciously, it removes judicial and prosecutorial discretion from communities who elect their judges based on a set of localized priorities.

“The threat of judge shopping is more than hypothetical. To put things in perspective, we heard another bill in judiciary committee that entailed stories of district attorneys obtaining blanket disqualifications against judges that bar them from hearing any criminal case brought into their courthouse. Such an instance occurred in Jackson County, which is at the center of the fight against illegal marijuana production and a location where prosecutors will likely seek extra-jurisdictional warrants.

“Further, nothing in current law stops law enforcement from applying for warrants to judges in multiple jurisdictions at the same time, thereby allowing searches to occur simultaneously across district lines while still maintaining accountability for each individual judge.

“There was discussion in committee that a motion to suppress could act as an adequate safeguard by excluding evidence from a criminal trial when a defective warrant is authorized. I am not satisfied with this solution as the remedy occurs only after the fact where the state has searched and seized private property, or restrained the freedom of citizens through arrest or detention. Suppression also does nothing to redress the wrongs perpetuated against someone subjected to a criminal search warrant who is completely innocent, or those charged with a crime who enter a plea before a suppression motion is granted or even filed.

“Issuance and execution of warrants are high stakes situations where mistakes can be made, whether it be wanton misconduct or plain human error. The haunting death of Breonna Taylor and far too many others demonstrate examples where the checks on the warrant process fail, and life altering decisions are made that no court can adequately redress.

“This bill came from the House Bill 3000 Task Force, which was charged with addressing the humanitarian tragedies arising from illicit marijuana production. These problems and threats are real and need to be addressed, but we must remain wary of unchecked government power.

“Times of crisis call for us as legislators to remain conscious of civil liberties and protect the rights of our constituents.

“We must tread carefully and understand that while we hope for the best, we must expect that at some point the worst will occur. It is my hope that this legislative body will track the impact of this bill and make any necessary reforms in the future to ensure a proper balance between public safety and the awesome police power of the state.”

“During the 2022 Session, SB 1546 was passed and established the Elliott State Forest as a research resource. As described in SB 1546, a list of tasks was to be completed on or before July 1, 2023. The State Land Board was to report to an interim or regular committee of the Legislative Assembly related to forests on or before September 15, 2023, on whether all the tasks occurred. If the tasks were completed, the measure will become operative by January 1, 2024.

“In 2022, OSU estimated an initial investment of approximately \$23 million from 2024-2026 for research equipment and operational costs. These costs were being targeted as federally funded, and if federal funds were not allocated then it was not known what entity

would pay the costs. Additionally, OSU estimated \$17 million in capital costs for research and administrative facilities. However, no determinate costs were reported at the conclusion of the passage of SB 1546.

“HB 5048A allocates \$4 million for biennial expenses towards the research forest. Approximately \$599,902 for professional service contracts and \$3.4M for research operations for 18 months. Had the forest been sold, this is \$4M that could have gone to other programs within the state budget.

“As of this moment, we are unaware of the status of completion in the original task list. Is there a chance of insufficient funds being pulled and allocated in this \$4M allocation since we do not know the outcome of the task list. \

“I voted against HB 5048A because of the unknown actual costs that will be incurred after the task list report, and because if the forest would have been sold in 2016 for practically the same amount as its appraisal value of \$221 million, this would not be a fiscal issue for the state. In fact, the forest could have been professionally managed, generated funds for the state school fund, local communities, and could have housed OSU research. This bill prematurely allocates funds towards this project and may very well be too little to accomplish the goals set forth by former Governor Brown.”

That bill – HB 3187, is now section 18 and 19 of HB 2010. HB 3187 passed both the House and Sente Policy committees as well as the floor of the House but is stuck on the Senate floor. HB 2010A must be the life raft for HB 3187.

“HB 2010A never came through a policy committee, yet it contains multiple pieces of at least 14 policy bills that came through House and Senate committees. Bills that could have each been vetted on their own merits, funding been determined by W&M, and sent to the floor for a vote. Bills that could have easily been tracked in OLIS in the future. Now, they will sit in OLIS as if they never were completed or funded. Bills are not cross referenced in OLIS, but if this is how business is going to continue maybe that feature needs to be added to OLIS for the sake of transparency.

“My opposition to HB 2010A is about the practice of ‘packages’ verse standalone policy bills and the lack of transparency in this process.”

HB 2054 (A-Engrossed) – Read third time. Carried by Evans. On passage of the bill the vote was: Yeas, 55; Nays, 1 – Andersen; Excused, 2 – Bynum, Tran; Excused for Business of the House, 2 – Breese-Iverson, Speaker Rayfield. Bill passed.

“I am opposed to district attorneys and deputy district attorneys qualifying as police officers and firefighters under the Public Employees Retirement System. Thus, I voted in opposition to HB 2054-A which lowers the 30-year service eligibility requirement to 25 years as is the case with police officers and firefighters.

“Police officers put their lives on the line every day to keep our communities safe. Firefighters do the same and that their work is becoming even more challenging with the realities of the climate crisis we face. The current retirement system for police officers and firefighters is right and appropriate. As an attorney, I work with law enforcement, district attorneys, and other people in the criminal justice system. While they play an important role in the safety of our communities, district attorneys do not have the same

stressors or hardships in their work as experienced by police officers or firefighters. District attorneys and deputy district attorneys are not out in the community, putting themselves in harm's way, and they don't have the same potential of injury or death. I do not believe they should be put in the same category. I am in favor of keeping the requirements of their service to 30 years in line with other public employees.

"District attorneys make significantly more money than their public defender counterparts who are not public employees. Our public defense system in Oregon is broken. Recruitment and retention of attorneys doing both defense and prosecution is important and necessary. However, this legislation exacerbates the already unequal treatment of district attorneys and public defenders.

"As a Salem city councilor for eight years, I was involved in city budget discussions. I know how cities and counties are greatly impacted by funding PERS retirement costs which are entirely appropriate benefits for city employees. However, any changes to the PERS system should be taken very seriously given their impact on local governments' cost burden. In this instance, lowering PERS eligibility requirement to 25 years will be an expensive additional burden on Oregon cities and counties.

"I am a member of the Public Employees Retirement System and know that those working in our state are vital to its function and deserving of retirement benefits. I value all those contributing to Oregon including district attorneys and deputy district attorneys. However, the difference in PERS retirement eligibility exists because of the varying types of service to our great state. I will continue carefully assessing the benefits to those serving Oregon so that all those receiving benefits do so fairly."

Once amended, the bill returned to the House to be voted on today, June 21st.

"Today, I elected to show up to vote 'no' for the second time and vocalize my continued concerns. I truly believe that every Representative made the decision that best reflected the needs of their district. Rest assured, if there were measures we could have taken to prevent the passage of HB 2002 C entirely, we would have taken them. However, a walkout would have only prolonged the inevitable. "By choosing to provide quorum today, we were able to preserve the progress made by negotiations following the Senate walkout. If we had not shown up, HB 2002 C would have returned in its original, un-amended form with no guarantee of any other concessions. While I am disappointed by the outcome and its implications on Oregonians, I will continue to serve in the best way that I know how: showing up and expressing the true desires of my constituents in House District 24."

"I think it is important to clarify the intent of HB 2005-C. Please see below information of definitional intent provided by the Department of Justice dated June 15th, 2023.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the term "frame or receiver" means the following -

(1) The term "frame" means the part of a handgun, or variants thereof, that provides housing or a structure for the component (i.e., sear or equivalent) designed to hold back the hammer, striker, bolt, or similar primary energized component prior to initiation of the firing sequence, even if pins or other attachments are required to connect such component (i.e., sear or equivalent) to the housing or structure.

(2) The term "receiver" means the part of a rifle, shotgun, or projectile weapon other than a handgun, or variants thereof, that provides housing or a structure for the primary component designed to block or seal the breech prior to initiation of the firing sequence (i.e., bolt, breechblock, or equivalent), even if pins or other attachments are required to connect such component to the housing or structure.

(3) The terms "variant" and "variants thereof" mean a weapon utilizing a similar frame or receiver design irrespective of new or different model designations or configurations, characteristics, features, components, accessories, or attachments. For example, an AK-type firearm with a short stock (i.e., pistol grip) is a pistol variant of an AK-type rifle, an AR-type firearm with a short stock (i.e., pistol grip) is pistol variant of an AR-type rifle, and a revolving cylinder shotgun is a shotgun variant of a revolver.

(4) The following are nonexclusive examples that illustrate the above definitions:

(i) Hinged or single framed revolvers: The frame is the part of the revolver that provides a structure designed to hold the sear.

(ii) Colt 1911, Beretta/Browning/FN Herstal/Heckler & Koch/Ruger/Sig Sauer/Smith & Wesson/Taurus hammer-fired semiautomatic pistols: The frame is the lower portion of the pistol, or grip, that provides housing for the sear.

(iii) Glock variant striker-fired semiautomatic pistols: The frame is the lower portion of the pistol, or the grip, that provides housing for the sear.

(iv) Sig Sauer P250/P320 variant semiautomatic pistols: The frame is the internal removable chassis of the pistol that provides housing for the sear or equivalent component.

(v) Bolt action rifles: The receiver is the part of the rifle that provides a structure for the bolt.

(vi) Break action, lever action, or pump action rifles and shotguns: The receiver is the part of the rifle or shotgun that provides housing for the bolt, breechblock, or equivalent.

(vii) AK variant firearms: The receiver is the part of the weapon that provides housing for the bolt.

(viii) Steyr AUG variant firearms: The receiver is the central part of the weapon that provides housing for the bolt.

(ix) Thompson machineguns and semiautomatic variants, and L1A1, FN FAL, FN FNC, MP38, MP40, and SIG 550 firearms, and HK machineguns and semiautomatic variants: The receiver is the upper part of the weapon that provides housing for the bolt.

(x) Sten, Sterling, and Kel-Tec SUB-2000 firearms: The receiver is the central part of the weapon, or tube, that provides housing for the bolt.

b) Firearm muffler or silencer frame or receiver. The terms “frame” and “receiver” shall mean, in the case of a firearm muffler or firearm silencer, the part of the firearm, such as an outer tube or modular piece, that provides housing or a structure for the primary internal component designed to reduce the sound of a projectile (i.e., baffles, baffling material, expansion chamber, or equivalent). In the case of a modular firearm muffler or firearm silencer device with more than one such part, the terms shall mean the principal housing attached to the weapon that expels a projectile, even if an adapter or other attachments are required to connect the part to the weapon. The terms shall not include a removable end cap of an outer tube or modular piece.

c) Partially complete, disassembled, or nonfunctional frame or receiver. The terms “frame” and “receiver” shall include a partially complete, disassembled, or nonfunctional frame or receiver, including a frame or receiver parts kit, that is designed to or may readily be completed, assembled, restored, or otherwise converted to function as a frame or receiver, i.e., to house or provide a structure for the primary energized component of a handgun, breech blocking or sealing component of a projectile weapon other than a handgun, or internal sound reduction component of a firearm muffler or firearm silencer, as the case may be. The terms shall not include a forging, casting, printing, extrusion, unmachined body, or similar article that has not yet reached a stage of manufacture where it is clearly identifiable as an unfinished component part of a weapon (e.g., unformed block of metal, liquid polymer, or other raw material). When issuing a classification, the Director may consider any associated templates, jigs, molds, equipment, tools,

instructions, guides, or marketing materials that are sold, distributed, or possessed with the item or kit, or otherwise made available by the seller or distributor of the item or kit to the purchaser or recipient of the item or kit. The following are nonexclusive examples that illustrate the definitions:

Example 1 to paragraph (c)—Frame or receiver: A frame or receiver parts kit containing a partially complete or disassembled billet or blank of a frame or receiver that is sold, distributed, or possessed with a compatible jig or template is a frame or receiver, as a person with online instructions and common hand tools may readily complete or assemble the frame or receiver parts to function as a frame or receiver.

Example 2 to paragraph (c)—Frame or receiver: A partially complete billet or blank of a frame or receiver with one or more template holes drilled or indexed in the correct location is a frame or receiver, as a person with common hand tools may readily complete the billet or blank to function as a frame or receiver.

Example 3 to paragraph (c)—Frame or receiver: A complete frame or receiver of a weapon that has been disassembled, damaged, split, or cut into pieces, but not destroyed in accordance with paragraph (e), is a frame or receiver.

Example 4 to paragraph (c)—Not a receiver: A billet or blank of an AR-15 variant receiver without critical interior areas having been indexed, machined, or formed that is not sold, distributed, or possessed with instructions, jigs, templates, equipment, or tools such that it may readily be completed is not a receiver.

Example 5 to paragraph (c)—Not a receiver: A flat blank of an AK variant receiver without laser cuts or indexing that is not sold, distributed, or possessed with instructions, jigs, templates, equipment, or tools is not a receiver, as a person cannot readily fold the flat to provide housing or a structure for the primary component designed to block or seal the breech prior to initiation of the firing sequence.

(d) Multi-piece frame or receiver. The term “multi-piece frame or receiver” shall mean a frame or receiver that may be disassembled into multiple modular subparts, i.e., standardized units that may be replaced or exchanged. The term shall not include the internal frame of a pistol that is a complete removable chassis that provides housing for the sear or equivalent component, unless the chassis itself may be disassembled. The modular subpart(s) identified in accordance with § 478.92 with an importer's or manufacturer's serial number shall be presumed, absent an official determination by the Director or other reliable evidence to the contrary, to be part of the frame or receiver of a weapon or device.

(e) Destroyed frame or receiver. The terms “frame” and “receiver” shall not include a frame or receiver that is destroyed. For purposes of these definitions, the term “destroyed” means that the frame or receiver has been permanently altered such that it may not readily be completed, assembled, restored, or otherwise converted to function as a frame or receiver. Acceptable methods of destruction include completely melting, crushing, or shredding the frame or receiver, or other method approved by the Director.

(f)

(1) Frame or receiver classifications based on which part of the weapon was classified as such before April 26, 2022. Except as provided in paragraph (f)(2) of this section, the terms “frame” and “receiver” shall include the specific part of a complete

weapon, including variants thereof, determined (classified) by the Director to be defined as a firearm frame or receiver prior to April 26, 2022. Any such part that is identified with an importer's or manufacturer's serial number shall be presumed, absent an official determination by the Director or other reliable evidence to the contrary, to be the frame or receiver of the weapon. The following is a nonexclusive list of such weapons and the specific part determined by the Director to be the firearm frame or receiver as they existed on that date:

- (i) AR-15/M-16 variant firearms: The receiver is the lower part of the weapon that provides housing for the trigger mechanism and hammer (i.e., lower receiver).
  - (ii) Ruger Mark IV pistol: The frame is the upper part of the weapon that provided housing for the bolt or breechblock.
  - (iii) Benelli 121 M1 Shotgun: The receiver is the lower part of the weapon that provides housing for the trigger mechanism.
  - (iv) Vickers/Maxim, Browning 1919, M2, and box-type machineguns and semiautomatic variants: The receiver is the side plate of the weapon that is designed to hold the charging handle.
- (2) Frame or receiver classifications of partially complete, disassembled, or nonfunctional frames or receivers before April 26th, 2022. Prior determinations by the Director that a partially complete, disassembled, or nonfunctional frame or receiver, including a parts kit, was not, or did not include, a "firearm frame or receiver" under § 478.11, or "frame or receiver" under § 479.11 of this subchapter, as those terms were defined prior to April 26, 2022, shall not continue to be valid or authoritative after that date. Such determinations shall include those in which the Director determined that the Item or parts kit had not yet reached a stage of manufacture to be, or include, a "firearm frame or receiver" under §478.11, or "frame or receiver" under §479.11 of this subchapter, as those terms were defined prior to April 26, 2022."

“The new tax consists of 40¢ per line per month, totaling approximately \$27.4 million per year or \$32.9 million for the 2023-25 biennium. This new tax will be the highest in the nation along with Washington. For other context, Nevada’s 9-8-8 tax is \$0.35, Colorado is \$0.27, Virginia is \$0.12, and California is only at \$0.08 per line per month. 44 states have no phone tax for 9-8-8 services yet somehow, they are providing this service. The population of Oregon is greater than that of Nevada. So, the need for a higher tax due to lower population and the ability to generate revenue based on population is not a viable argument.

“Additionally, there is funding for the 9-8-8 program within the agency budget using general funds, so this tax is simply additional funding with very loose guidelines as to what it will be used for.

“Finally, the bill as written could be brought back at any time before the sunset date and the rate raised with a simple majority vote.

“We need 9-8-8, but this is the wrong way to go about it. In a time when the state is flush with money why are we doing a new tax?

“I opposed HB 2757B due to the above reasons and believe there is a better way to support this program without imposing a new tax.”

“I had reservations about this bill, as did other members of the House, because of concerns about permit backlogs, the full process, and wanting to ensure that DEQ and industry representatives would sit down for thorough conversations.

“I have received assurances from the Governor’s office that DEQ will have thorough discussions with the stakeholders who are responsible for paying the fees. I commit to staying involved with the operating permit fee process to ensure that there are real conversations between DEQ and stakeholders and that DEQ reports back to the Legislature on the ways that fees imposed are fair, and look at ways to have a scale for size and conduct operation review needs as per business permit type. In addition, I will continue to advocate that we focus on the results of our efforts and on requirement compliance.”

It could just as easily go to parts of our state that already have internet service at good speeds to make them even faster leaving others behind.

“The bill states:

‘To be eligible for a grant...an applicant must demonstrate that at least 80 percent of the broadband serviceable locations on a project service route are unserved or underserved.’

“The definition in the bill of unserved will be based on ‘broadband mapping data published by the Federal Communications Commission or the State of Oregon.’

“However, the federal maps are based on carrier information not independent research, and the State of Oregon map is based on a survey that was done by a recently formed portion of Business Oregon, but not vetted for accuracy. Local counties such as those in Polk, Marion and Yamhill have already been working on their own independent maps to determine where services are lacking and how the funds might be best allocated. This bill will exclude that locally collected data, which is the most accurate data available.

“Until we can use locally collected data to access these funds and make sure they get to all corners of the state, I must be a no. We need to get access to all Oregonians, not just elevate those that may already have internet access.

“For that reason, I was a no today.”

I want that for people obtaining breast cancer examinations as much as I want that for people being screened for lung cancer, gastric cancer, and every other kind of cancer in addition to treatment for other conditions. I have a strong philosophical opposition to healthcare bills that disproportionately protect some classes of patients over others as it further complicates our ability to care for our community as a whole due to our system being limited in funds.

“We must holistically address the challenges all Oregonians face as a result of our ineffective healthcare system. Coverage decisions should not be made by politicians nor should they be influenced by special interest groups who have the funds to influence politicians and their decisions. We must focus on making healthcare more accessible and more affordable for all, and I will continue to push for policy that keeps that top of mind while I continue to discourage carve-out policies in the future.”

“Oregon farmers, forest owners or fishermen make Oregon the great state that it is today. I value the unique financial situation that make up the generations of Oregonians who still call our state home. However, they aren't the subject of this bill. Current law already grants their qualifying estates a \$15 million exemption.

“As I understand it, the bill would sweep away the ceiling that excludes estates valued at more than \$15 million from using the exemption. It would allow the heirs of people who buy qualifying land as little as a year before death – that is not a ‘family farmer’ – to exploit it. It would also overturn the qualification that the inheritors continue the business use of the natural resource property.

“In support of current Federal law, the Oregon Agriculture Department states in its Tax Expenditure Report that ‘The (existing) estate transfer tax credit can help make it possible for beginning farmers and ranchers to afford inherited land and continue operating the family business.’

“In Oregon today, only 4% of estates pay any estate tax at all. Under the new law, fewer than 1% of estates cash out on exemptions.

“In the 2023 legislative session, legislators balked on an opportunity to expand SNAP benefits to immigrant families working hard to put food on their table. Now in the same year, we are expanding exemptions for the wealthiest among us, the top 1%.

“I am committed to supporting efforts to create a fair tax structure that is easy to understand and navigate. Our current tax system is complex and understanding tax provisions is one of the barriers to families working within the current system.

“We must improve our tax system, but SB 489-A is not about improving our tax system for all Oregonians. It creates a loophole for the top 1% of Oregonians, empowering to take even more advantage of a broken tax system that unequally benefits the wealthiest Oregonians.”

“These sideboards were an integral part of legislative approval of the project in 2013, according to then-Speaker (and now Governor Tina Kotek). “The last-minute legislative repeal of existing fiscal guardrails is deeply troubling. ODOT has a history of significant cost overruns, and the legislature needs every tool at our disposal to ensure this agency will successfully deliver a replacement bridge on time and on budget.”

Additionally, I have had multiple constituents reach out to me with a variety of concerns about the Interstate Bridge Replacement Project. There is a lack of trust of ODOT in HD 44 that does not seem to be improving. Furthermore, I would like to see a commitment to ensuring that there will be community benefits agreements that will benefit Oregon residents who are most impacted by the construction of a new interstate bridge, prior to the legislature committing 1 billion in general obligation bonds to the project.”

HB 5005 (A-Engrossed) – Pham K requested the following explanation of her vote be entered in the Journal:

“I strongly support so many of the investments that I see in HB 5005-A. It's so important that we are appropriating \$250M so we can more than match WA state's appropriation which will help us get in line for federal funding for the I5 bridge replacement.

“I was deeply surprised however that we are authorizing the full \$1 Billion to come from General Fund supported bonds, in the next 4 biennium, through 2031. And really the next 30 plus years, as we make payments on these bonds plus interest.

“Colleagues, our Transportation system has historically been paid for through transportation dollars (gas tax, weight mile tax, federal transportation grants, and from federal transportation grants). It's unprecedented for Oregon to pay for transportation infrastructure out of our General Fund.

“In testimony for HB 2098 the IBR policy bill, we heard from teachers who talked about teaching in crowded classrooms with 39 teenagers, broken HVAC systems, extreme heat or cold, and lack of air circulation. They talked about teaching in stairwells when the wings of a school were shut due to asbestos, classrooms with buckets on the ground to catch drips from leaky roofs, and schools with mold issues. GO Bonds are a critical source of funding for retrofitting school facilities.

“In a housing crisis, we need to also prioritize our General Fund bond dollars to build affordable housing to support families and keep kids safe. General Fund bonds are also needed to fix water systems, seismically retrofit our schools, and address other critical needs.

“We can't ask our students and communities to live with cuts and live within our budget means, and not ask our freeway megaprojects to also live within our transportation budget. This does mean that we will have to make hard choices about which transportation projects to prioritize across the state, but that's our responsibility to do as legislators. .

“Legislatures can't bind future legislatures, so we still need to appropriate this money in future sessions. I look forward to continuing conversations about how we can fund a 21st century transportation system with transportation dollars, while also protecting our General Fund-supported bonds to make sure we have enough money for the sewage and water systems, seismic retrofits of school buildings, and all the other critical needs our communities face.”

“Representative Reschke and others have raised several identical Points of Order over the past several weeks regarding the House’s consideration of measures in light of ORS 171.134. The presiding officer has waited to rule on these points until further information could be collected. It is now time to rule again on the points of order raised by the good Representatives.

“House Rule 14.15 provides that a measure may not be accepted at the Desk for introduction unless it is accompanied by an impartial summary. Under Article IV, section 21, a measure is considered ‘plainly worded’ so long as an act ‘clearly state[s] its purpose....’. Accordingly, if a measure summary summarizes the essential features of a bill that clearly states its purpose or otherwise satisfies the ‘plainly worded’ standard of Article IV, section 21, the measure summary satisfies ORS 171.134 requirements under an equivalent standard.

“Significantly, HR 14.15 does not even reference ORS 171.134. Under this law, if there is a material error in a printed summary, it is to be brought to the attention of the Legislative Counsel, who shall correct the summary. In other words, the statute at issue applies to the work of Legislative Counsel and is not part of House Rules of procedure regarding the introduction and consideration of measures.

“Furthermore ORS 171.134 does not invalidate a legislative enactment, whether or not a measure is found to be in compliance. In a 2020 case, the Oregon Supreme Court, in considering a legislative enactment, stated that ‘even assuming [the measure summary of the statutory enactment at issue] violated ORS 171.134, neither ORS 174.134 nor any other source of law suggests

that [the statute in question] might be invalid for that reason.’ *City of Damascus v. State by and through Brown*, (2020). *Damascus* is currently the only court case that has considered the meaning of ORS 171.134.

“As many of you know this matter has been the subject of new litigation. Since the last ruling from the Chair, a Marion County Judge ruled against the plaintiff’s request to prohibit the legislature from further consideration of a measure based upon ORS 171.134. It now looks like any further litigation will not happen until after the regular session of the legislature has adjourned sine die. Consequently, in the absence of new relevant information, the previous ruling of the presiding officers stands, and the House may proceed with consideration of the measures subject to the point of order raised.”
