SUBJECT: Department of Geology and Mineral Industries' 2014 Government-to-Government Report

I am pleased to submit this report in response to legislative direction ORS 182.162 – 182.168 (SB 770). The report describes activities and tribal contacts of the Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) for 2014.

Executive Summary

DOGAMI is a relatively new member to the Natural Resources Work Group and Cultural Resource Cluster Group as such, this is the second Government-to-Government annual report submitted by DOGAMI. Since the initial participation at the Natural Resources Work Group meeting in March 2012, by Asst. Director Gary Lynch, DOGAMI has responded to meet the objectives of Executive Order EO-96-30. DOGAMI has effectively developed a partnership with the LCIS, SHPO, and Oregon's Indian Tribal Governments. Working cooperatively, concerns raised at subsequent meetings have been addressed. Fossil hunters in Oregon are now aware they may not disturb archeological sites. Tribal government representatives now have the opportunity to review and comment on all applications to DOGAMI for mineral and energy development projects. DOGAMI will continue to identify and address mutual goals and concerns that affect Tribal interests.

Major Highlights for 2014

- DOGAMI continues to circulate all new permit applications for mining, oil & gas, and geothermal development to the LCIS for distribution to the appropriate tribal government staff for review and comment.
- DOGAMI staff met individually with tribal cultural resource staff members to discuss ways to better share information and coordinate the review process.
- DOGAMI now circulates all new permit applications for mining, oil & gas, and geothermal development to SHPO for review and comment.

- DOGAMI staff contacted the Burns Paiute Tribe regarding participation in a lidar data collection flight in the Harney basin.
- The Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde were contacted by DOGAMI staff to coordinate with the Oregon Health Authority seismic hazard project conducted by DOGAMI.
- All federally-recognized tribes in tsunami mapping and outreach project areas were invited to be members of local tsunami mitigation advisory committees, as well as invited to meetings to review draft tsunami evacuation maps. Tribes chose to participate with varying degrees of involvement, but these included the following:
 - Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians (Dean Sawyer)
 - Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians (Howard Crombie, Brad Kneaper, Paula Williams)

Department Relations with Indian Tribes

Oregon statutes (*ORS 182.162-182.168, SB 770*) require that state agencies that work with tribal governments submit annual reports describing their relationship in response to five factors that should be codified in an agency policy. Each of the factors is listed below, along with DOGAMI's response:

182.164 State agencies to develop and implement policy on relationship with tribes

ORS 182.164 directs state agencies to develop and implement a policy that:

- Identifies agency staff responsible for developing and implementing agency programs that affect the Tribes;
- Establishes a process to identify agency programs that affect Tribes;
- Promotes communication between DOGAMI and Tribes;
- Promotes positive Government-to-Government relations; and
- Establishes a method of notifying agency staff of the statutory provisions and agency policy.

DOGAMI Response to ORS 182.164

DOGAMI has drafted an agency policy to conform to Executive Order EO-96-30. The policy is in final agency review and should be adopted by the end of 2014.

Since attending the Government-to-Government Natural Resources Working Group Meeting on March 14, 2012, in Pendleton, DOGAMI has moved forward to implement the goals of ORS 182.164. Specifically, DOGAMI has:

- Established several internal processes to better facilitate relations between the Tribes and DOGAMI staff.
- Provide notification to the public on the importance of protecting archeological sites in Oregon.
- Established a notification process to better coordinate and inform Tribes about proposed mine, oil & gas, and/or geothermal development projects under

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consideration.

- Provide the opportunity for tribal governments to review and comment on proposed mine, oil & gas, and/or geothermal development projects.
- Continue Government-to-Government relations on natural resource issues involving mineral and energy development, and geological data gathering.
- Participate in the natural resources working group and the cultural resource cluster group.
- DOGAMI's participates in a Technical Advisory Team lead by Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation for the development of a groundwater model of the upper Umatilla River basin.
- The Burns-Paiute Tribe is one of our stakeholders on the FEMA Silvies Watershed project.

(a) *The name of individuals in the state agency who are responsible for development and implementing programs of the state agency that affect Tribes.*

DOGAMI Response to Subsection (a)

Dr. Vicki McConnell is the Oregon State Geologist (Director) and is the primary contact responsible for overall relations, and for development and implementing of agency programs that affect Tribes. Gary Lynch is Assistant Director of Mineral Land Regulation and Reclamation; Andre Pollack is Assistant Director Geologic Survey and Services, both are the alternate contact for the Director.

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The agency's primary and alternate contacts are responsible for assuring that the agency is kept apprised of activities that may be of interest to the Tribes, to provide appropriate tribal contacts, and ensure that the Tribes are informed of agency activities. The agency recognizes that maintaining good communication is a benefit to the Tribes and to the State of Oregon.

(b) *The process the state agency established to identify the programs of the state agency that affect Tribes.*

DOGAMI Response to Subsection (b)

DOGAMI informs the Tribes of agency programs that potentially affect the Tribes, primarily through agency participation in the Natural Resource Working Group and Cultural Resource Cluster Group which are comprised of representatives from other state agencies, and from the several Tribes. These groups provide a forum for two-way communication and government-to-government relations. As directed by the agency's primary and alternate contacts, the contacts assigned to the clusters provide periodic updates to the Tribes on agency program activities, while the Tribes inform contacts of relevant tribal programs, and agency programs affecting the Tribes.

DOGAMI may also meet with governmental and natural resource representatives of individual tribes to address specific issues as they arise in geographic regions around the state. These department efforts have proven successful, given the diverse interests of the Tribes, the complexity of resource extraction issues that affect the Tribes' unique interests, and the diverse services that DOGAMI provides to the state.

DOGAMI participation in the Government-to-Government process is reflected in the following list of meetings:

Cultural Resources Cluster Group: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Salem on January 13 and 14, 2014.

LCIS Meeting: Dr. Vicki McConnell and Gary Lynch participated in the meeting held in the State Capitol in Salem on February 12, 2014.

Natural Resource Work Group meeting: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Salem on March 20, 2104.

Cultural Resource Cluster Meeting: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Grand Ronde on May 21, 2014.

LCIS Government-to-Government Spring Gathering: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Grand Ronde on May 22, 2104.

Natural Resources Work Group meeting: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Salem on August 6, 2014.

Ben Mundie met with the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians cultural resource staff in Roseburg on September 3, 2014.

Cultural Resource Cluster meeting: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Salem on

September 16, 2014.

Ben Mundie met with the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde cultural resource staff in Grand Ronde on September 30, 2104.

Interagency Cultural Resource Council meeting: Ben Mundie participated in the meeting in Sherwood on November 7, 2014.

(c) *The effort of the state agency to promote communication between the state agency and the Tribes, and Government-to-Government relations between the state and Tribes.*

DOGAMI Response to Subsection (c)

Being an active participant in the Natural Resources Work Group and Cultural Resource Cluster Group is a significant step towards promoting two-way communication and government-to-government relations. The agency's designated contacts and others have participated in cluster groups or working groups, as well as with the Tribes directly to insure potential impacts from mineral extraction and energy development activity are addressed prior to development.

DOGAMI recently initiated the process to include all Tribes in the review and comment process regarding proposed mineral extraction and energy development projects statewide. This process will help identify those proposed development projects with the potential to impact cultural and historic sites, and develop mitigation strategies. DOGAMI has actively sought to meet with individual tribal staff to insure communication and coordination occurs between the proper individuals.

The agency is committed to conducting meetings around the state as often as possible, and will continue to invite tribal governments to participate in the meetings themselves.

(d) *A description of the training required by statute. (ORS 182.166(1) pertains to training(s) offered by the Department of Administrative Services at least once a year.)*

DOGAMI Response to Subsection (d)

DOGAMI is committed to attend future Summit meetings as well as Cluster Group meetings. These meetings are an important source of training for department staff in a wide range of subjects of concern to the tribes. The information gained in this manner is shared with other members of the department. DOGAMI is committed to attending the cultural resource training course taught by Oregon State Parks personnel in 2015.

(e) *The method the state agency established for notifying employees of the state agency of the provisions of ORS 182.162 to 182.168 and the policy the state agency adopts under ORS 182.164.*

DOGAMI Response to Subsection (e)

DOGAMI holds Leadership Team Meetings in the Portland Office twice a month, and the Mineral Land Regulation and Reclamation Program in Albany conducts staff meetings at least once a month. The provisions of ORS 182.162 to 182.168 are a regular topic of discussion in both settings.

When new staff that may work with a Tribe is hired, the agency's primary and alternate contacts brief them on cluster activities, and provide an overview of the statutory requirements for working with tribal governments on agency activities.
