In 2001, the Oregon State Legislature passed Senate Bill 770, Section I through Section IV, requiring state agencies within the State of Oregon to report to the Governor activities pertaining to the relationship between the State Government and Tribal Governments. The following constitutes that report from the **Department of State Police**.

Attached with this report is a copy of Chapter 500.11 of the Oregon State Police Policies Rules and Procedures Manual titled, State-Tribal Government-to-Government Relations. This policy set out to formalize the government-to-government relationship that exists between Oregon Indian tribes and the Oregon State Police. The policy also establishes a process to assist in the resolution of potential conflicts, maximizes key inter-governmental relations, and enhances an exchange of ideas and resources for the greater good of all of Oregon's citizens, whether tribal members or not.

The above-referenced policy identifies "key" contacts within the Department by position and provides an additional key contact list that contains names and telephone numbers of these individuals.

The following is a summary of the various interactions between Tribal Governments and the representatives of the Oregon State Police.

Tribal Gaming Section:

The Tribal Gaming Section has regular daily interactions with all gaming tribes in Oregon. Personnel also actively participate in monthly Oregon Association of Indian Gaming Commissions (OAIGC) meetings. Due to the nature of the Section's mission, they have had numerous occasions to increase their awareness of the cultures, beliefs, and governmental systems of Oregon's Native American tribes. Some of those opportunities are listed below:

Major Craig Durbin and Lieutenant Joel Lujan attended Government-to-Government Public Safety Cluster meetings throughout 2009. The meetings are held to discuss public safety issues affecting the Tribes and other entities within the State of Oregon.

February 4, 2009 - Members of the Tribal Gaming Section attended the monthly Oregon Association of Indian Gaming Commissions (OAIGC) at Seven Feathers Casino in Canyonville, Oregon.

March 4, 2009 - Staff members attended the OAIGC in Coos Bay hosted by the Coquille Indian Tribe Gaming Commission in Coos Bay.

May 2009 - Members of the Tribal Gaming Section attended the Tribal Flag Dedication Ceremony at the State Capitol. The ceremony was well attended by citizens, tribal members, and state employees.

April 2009 - Lieutenant Joel Lujan visited and met individually with each Tribal Commission. The objective was to acculturate with the Tribal Commissions and encourage a partnership-oriented dialogue.

May 2009 - Staff attended the video screening of "Standing Strong" and fry bread reception at Willamette University.

June 1, 2009 - Tribal Gaming Section staff members attended the Tribal Government Information Day and flag ceremony at the State Capitol.

June 3, 2009 - Staff attended the Oregon Association of Indian Gaming Commission meeting at Spirit Mountain Casino in Grand Ronde.

August 5, 2009 - Staff attended the Oregon Association of Indian Gaming Commission meeting at the Chinook Winds Casino in Lincoln City.

Fish and Wildlife Division:

The role of the Fish and Wildlife Division in relation to the Tribal Governments is to:

- ✦ Investigate violations of Native American archaeological laws and coordinate with State and Federal prosecutors and magistrates to bring defendants of archaeological crimes to justice.
- ✦ Provide a staff trained on the Endangered Species Act and Tribal treaty rights, Tribal sovereignty issues, and a foundational knowledge of Tribal sovereignty.
- ✦ Coordinate with Tribal Representatives, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission, and the Oregon State Legislature on issues relating to Fish and Wildlife.
- ✦ Coordinate with the Columbia River Treaty Tribes on enforcement issues related to the Columbia River.

Activities:

Lieutenant Lane (Northwest Region Headquarters) continues to serve as the Oregon State Police representative to the Cultural Resources Cluster Group. The group meets two or three times per year at various locations throughout the state.

September 2009 - Meeting at the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Community Center.

Lieutenant Lane is the primary contact for the Department regarding reports of the inadvertent locating of Native American remains. Nine (9) separate incidents of discovered Native American remains were reported since the last Fish and Wildlife Division Government-to-Government report. Details of those incidents were reported in the Cultural Resource Cluster Group meeting reports.

Lieutenant Samuels and Lieutenant Lane continue to participate in the Columbia Basin Law Enforcement Council "CBLEC". The CBLEC meets quarterly during the year. The Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fisheries Enforcement also participates in the Council. This provides the opportunity for participants to confer with managers from the Tribal Fisheries Enforcement agency on matters that may concern tribes conducting tribal fisheries on the Columbia River or its tributaries.

Lieutenant Scorby (Baker City) continues as a member of the Lower Deschutes River Managers' Group. The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs is an active participant in the group. Sr. Trooper Lindberg (Madras Worksite) is a member of the working group. He also works in the field with Warm Springs Tribal Enforcement Officers as part of his duties on the Deschutes River.

Lieutenant Scorby attended a meeting with the Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee in Lapwai, Idaho to discuss cooperative enforcement issues, application of state standard operating procedures, the Nez Perce Treaty of 1855, the Tribal enforcement code, and conservation enforcement. Also in attendance were members of the Washington and Idaho Fish & Wildlife Enforcement, and Nez Perce Tribal Enforcement.

On March 20th, at 10a.m., Sgt. Pond and Senior Troopers Prodzinski and Lindberg met with members of the Warm Springs Tribe. The meeting related to coordinating law enforcement efforts on Warm Springs Reservation sides of Lake Billy Chinook, the

Metolius Arm, and the Lower Deschutes River. The meeting was held at Warm Springs Power Enterprises located on the reservation. Tribal representatives included members representing Law Enforcement, the Natural Resource Division, and tribal relations.

April 2009 - Lieutenant Lane was invited to the State Capitol by Karen Quigley, along with other State agency representatives to attend a meeting with Alvin Warren and Senior Policy Advisor Francine Hatch of the Indian Affairs Department and New Mexico's Cabinet Secretary. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss Oregon's Government-to-Government process.

May 2009 - Sergeant Katzenstein (The Dalles) and Lieutenant Scorby attended a Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission meeting in Portland and gave a presentation on the use of un-encapsulated, polystyrene net floats. The Commission understands the environmental issues regarding the use of these floats and a plan is in place for their removal. Many questions were asked on a variety of enforcement topics.

May 2009 - Lieutenant Lane attended Government-to-Government training for state employees at the Hallie Ford Theater. A video detailing the history of the Western Oregon Tribes was shown. Lieutenant Lane also attended the Tribal Flag Dedication Ceremony at the State Capitol. The ceremony was well attended by citizens, tribal members, and state employees.

June 2009 - Sergeant Thompson (Newport), Lieutenant Samuels, and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife biologists and supervisors met with the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Natural Resources Committee at Siletz. Natural resources issues were discussed. There were no law enforcement concerns raised.

October 2009 - Trooper Thomas and Sergeant Hoodenpyl (both Tillamook) provided a presentation to the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde Community Natural Resources Department. The presentation was concerning fish and wildlife enforcement in primarily the Trask Big Game Management Unit.

The Newport Area Command, Fish and Wildlife Division Team, continues to provide salvaged big game meat to the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz, when possible.

Training:

July 2009 - Lieutenant Lane provided classes on two separate dates addressing archaeological investigations to 20 OSP recruit troopers (20 each date) during their post-academy training at DPSST in Salem. He also showed the video on Native American Remains and the Law at each class.

July 2009 - Lieutenant Lane provided a short presentation on the Native American Remains and the Law video to Fish and Wildlife Division Supervisors.

July 2009 - Lieutenant Lane showed the Native American Remains and the Law video to the Mid-Valley Fish & Wildlife Enforcement Team (Salem & Albany) at a team meeting in Salem. The video served as training for the team.

August 2009 - Lieutenant Lane provided a presentation showing the video on Native American Remains and the Law at the quarterly BLM Law Enforcement Cooperative meeting at the Salem BLM office. The meeting brings together federal, state, county, and private timberland security to discuss forest issues occurring in their areas of responsibility.

August 2009 - Lieutenant Gifford (SW Region Hdqs), Sergeant Punch (Patrol Division, Gold Beach), Sr. Troopers Harris (F&W, Coos Bay), Stinnett (F&W, Gold Beach), and Gardner (Patrol Division - Coos Bay), Trooper Davis (F&W, Coos Bay), and Lieutenant Lane attended the 2009 Archaeology Training for Law Enforcement at the Mill Casino/Hotel in North Bend. The training was sponsored by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) and the Coquille Indian Tribe. The training was also attended by Tribal police officers from the Coquille Indian Tribe, the Coos County Deputy Medical Examiner, and the Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw.

October 2009 - The Fish and Wildlife Division revised its long-standing Fish and Wildlife Division Enforcement Manual to a Fish and Wildlife Division Resource Manual. The manual has been provided to each Division supervisor and trooper with the expectation that it be carried while on patrol. Included in the manual is a five (5) page chapter dedicated to Archaeological Sites and Objects that address the Oregon Revised Statutes, Oregon Administrative Rules, and the Federal Statutes. There is also a section on Indian Graves and Protected Objects. This section provides direction concerning the treatment of Native American human remains discovered inadvertently or through Criminal Investigations on private and public lands in Oregon, identification of human remains, and notifications to be made if remains are discovered. Tribal contacts for all nine (9) Tribes are also listed.

Investigations/Contacts:

Fish and Wildlife Division members investigated four (4) separate incidents during 2009 involving disturbance of Native American or archaeological sites. Details were provided in the Cultural Resources Cluster Group reports.

Office of State Fire Marshall:

Community Education Section:

January 8, 2009 - Community Education presented *First Nations Remembering When* (a fire and fall prevention program for older adults) to eight staff members of the Coquille

Indian Tribe - Community Health Center (CIT-CHC) and Housing Authority (CIHA). Staff member Connie Barton, who is the Oregon Fire District Director's Association President. They also spent time learning about smoke alarms and reviewed our new smoke alarm brochure and home fire escape plan.

The Office of State Fire Marshal recruited Karla Bagley-Tias, Assistant Fire Chief, from Warm Springs Fire & Safety to participate as a member of the Oregon Life Safety Team (OLST). The OLST is a multidisciplinary team coordinated by Community Education with fire service and fire service association partners, state, federal, county, city, private, and partner associations. Team members implement statewide fire prevention and fire safety education, and endorse, promote, and distribute educational materials. Members also relay educational information to fire departments and community partners in their regions.

Community Education provided the Coquille Indian Tribe Community Health Center and Warm Springs Fire and Safety with *Home Fire Safety is Up to You!* fire prevention and life safety materials for Fire Prevention Week (October 4-10, 2009).

Emergency Planning and Response Section:

March 19, 2009- Attended the Public Safety Cluster meeting at the Oregon Public Safety Academy.

May 8, 2009- Attended Tribal Government Day at the capitol.

June 19, 2009- Attended the Public Safety Cluster meeting at the Oregon Public Safety Academy.

September 8, 2009- Provided training to representatives of the Umatilla Confederated Tribe on Computer-Aided Management of Emergency Operations.

At various times throughout the year, staff has contacted representatives of the Umatilla Confederated Tribes regarding participation in the Local Emergency Planning Committee.

Fire and Life Safety Section:

Jan 2, 2009- A Deputy State Fire Marshal (DSFM) conducted a plan review of a fire station and Casino renovation for the Confederated Tribes of the Grande Ronde.

February 6, 2009- A DSFM participated in a fatal fire investigation meeting with representatives from the Warm Springs and Federal ATF agents.

March 3, 2009- A DSFM conducted a fire investigation residence for the Confederated Tribes of the Grande Ronde.

March 12, 2009- A DSFM contacted representatives of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde regarding a Community Wildfire Protection Plan.

Office of State Fire Marshal (cont):

March 16, 2009- A DSFM conducted a plan review for a nightclub at Spirit Mountain Casino.

March 18, 2009- A DSFM conducted a plan review for a church for the Confederated Tribes of the Grande Ronde and a nightclub at Spirit Mountain Casino. A DSFM conducted a code consultation for Spirit Mountain Casino.

March 27, 2009- A DSFM conducted a plan review for a nightclub at Spirit Mountain Casino.

April 1, 2009- A DSFM conducted an inspection of the Warm Springs Early Childhood Education Center. A DSFM conducted a construction inspection for a sports bar at Spirit Mountain Casino.

May 26, 2009- A DSFM conducted tests of a fire damper in a new wing at the Seven Feathers Casino.

May 27, 2009- A DSFM conducted a construction inspection of a ceremonial plankhouse for the Confederated Tribes of the Grande Ronde.

August 19, 2009- A DSFM conducted two inspections at the request of the Siletz Alcohol & Drug Treatment Program and the Siletz Transitional Living Center.

October 7-9, 2009 – The Seven Feathers Casino donated \$500 to the Douglas County Fire Prevention Carnival planned by a DSFM.

Command Areas:

Oregon State Police Divisions throughout the State of Oregon have regular contact with the Tribal Governments to assist in enforcement roles. The fishery protection efforts along the Columbia River are a constantly maintained relationship. In addition, the command areas offer patrol assistance to the tribes with crash investigation, traffic safety, and marijuana eradication. The members of these command areas offer assistance with major crimes, the service of warrants, and archeological-based crimes.

Bend Area Command:

The Oregon State Police Madras Worksite in cooperation with the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, Madras Police Department, Warm Springs Police Department, and Jefferson County District Attorney's Office have the availability to work together on a variety of calls for service and coordinate meetings when deemed appropriate. Sgt. Seber, OSP Madras Worksite, has personally met with members of the Warm Springs Police

Department on several occasions in 2009. They have discussed general patrol operations and have been assured that the Oregon State Police can be used as a resource for a variety of incidents.

Throughout the year, the Oregon State Police has assisted the Warm Springs Police Department with a variety of calls for service as well as general patrol services to ensure traffic safety. Members from the Madras Worksite were asked to spend part of their work week specifically patrolling Highway 26 on the Warm Springs Reservation. Members have also been tasked with making contact with members of the Warm Springs Police Department on a regular basis to ensure good relations.

The two departments are currently working together to coordinate two different trainings. The Warm Springs PD will be training Oregon State Police on gang-related problems associated with the reservation. We have been personally asked by the Federal Bureau of Investigations to provide training to all Warm Springs Police Department staff on crash reconstruction. OSP Patrol Services have specifically assisted Warm Springs PD with at least five crash reconstructions.

The Dalles Area Command:

Members assigned to The Dalles Area Command continue to serve as board members of The Pine Creek Ranch. The Pine Creek Ranch is a conservation area owned by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs. The Oregon State Police will continue to participate in the effort to restore and protect The Pine Creek Ranch.

Pendleton Area Command:

The Pendleton Area Command has several agreements with the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation (CTUIR) and continues to work on others.

- The Major Crime Team Agreement, which includes the Umatilla Tribal Police Department, Umatilla County Sheriff's Office, Oregon State Police, and other criminal justice agencies as required by Federal, State or Tribal law and deemed necessary. This agreement is separate from the Major Crime Team Agreement with all other law enforcement agencies in Umatilla and Morrow Counties. The development of this agreement was established due to the unique jurisdictional issues that occur involving felony crimes with both Tribal and non-Tribal members.
- A policy and procedures agreement with the CTUIR that defines the working relationships between the CTUIR and the Department with regards to Native American Ancestral Remains which are discovered either intentionally or accidentally. The policy and procedure, revised in 1994, offers a basic definition of the cooperative working relationship between the Department and the CTUIR when remains are located off the reservation. The resolution is established within the mandates of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act.

- The Department and CTUIR have developed a Deputization Agreement for sworn Department personnel to become deputized with Tribal authority.
- The Department, the CTUIR, the Governor's Office, DOJ, and UCDA have developed and signed an updated Fresh Pursuit Agreement. In this agreement, the Fresh Pursuit language was defined and the Extradition Agreement from 1981 was determined to remain in full force.
- The Department and the Umatilla Tribal PD continue to be part of the Umatilla/Morrow County Cooperative Policing Agreement.
- The Department and the Umatilla Tribal PD continue to be part of the Umatilla/Morrow County Law Enforcement Administrator's meeting, which meets on a monthly basis. This meeting is usually attended by Chief Ron Harnden and the tribes Public Safety Director, Ray Denny.
- The Department continues to provide Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) to the Umatilla Tribal PD, if needed.
- The Department continues to provide Crash Re-constructionists to assist the Umatilla Tribal PD, whenever needed.
- The Department and the Umatilla Tribal PD are members of the Blue Mountain Enforcement Narcotics Team (BENT) Board of Directors and usually meet on a monthly basis.
- The Department and the Umatilla Tribal PD are members of the Intergovernmental Agreement for Mutual Aid and Interagency Cooperation among Law Enforcement Agencies located in Umatilla County.
- Throughout the year, officers of the Tribal PD have assisted Troopers with crash investigations on Interstate 84.

Coos Bay Area Command:

There are two recognized Oregon Indian Tribes in the Coos Bay Area: the *Coos Lower Umpqua & Siuslaw Tribes*, and the *Coquille Tribe*. The majority of our contacts have been with the Coquille Tribe. Listed below are interactions that we have had during the past year.

- The Coos Bay Office and the Coquille Tribal Police provide reciprocal assistance during times when backup is needed. During an emergency, officers respond to the Tribal housing area until Tribal officers can arrive. The housing area is adjacent to a state highway.

- The Coquille Tribe has timber holdings on Hwy. 42, east of Myrtle Point. Fish and Game officers have responded to this location at the request of Tribal Police to investigate Fish and Wildlife crimes.

The Coquille Tribal Police Chief offered their office building (in Charleston) and equipment to OSP officers for use.

OSP training opportunities have been extended to the Coquille Tribal Police members when room is available.

Northern Command Center: This center receives calls from the Warm Springs Indian Tribe into the dispatch center for service for auto accident assistance, as well as other calls.

State Medical Examiners Office:

The State Medical Examiner's Office worked with the Cultural Resources Cluster and Tribes of Oregon regarding the handling of the inadvertent discovery of ancient Indian remains. In cooperation with the Tribes, Cultural Resources Cluster and the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, an educational video was produced and sent to State DA's, Sheriffs offices, and Medical Examiners throughout the state.

Criminal Division Counter Terrorism Section:

Lieutenant Jim Rentz assisted the Umatilla Tribal Fire and Police with a fatal fire on the reservation. This was determined to be an accidental fire and the partnership went very well.

January 9, 2009- Detective Jones assisted with the investigation of a RV trailer fire in Grande Ronde. Electric service to the RV had been terminated that morning and the victim indicated she had been using candles. The victim stayed at the Grand Ronde Spirit Mountain Lodge courtesy of the Red Cross. The lodge, through Detective Eric Park, provided video and other assistance in the investigation.

Law Enforcement Data System Division:

The Law Enforcement Data System Division conducted Law Enforcement Data System audits in cooperation with the nine recognized tribes within the State of Oregon. This audit not only encourages compliance in the use of the Law Enforcement Data System, but also instructs the users of the Law Enforcement Data System on proper use and protocol of this system.

OREGON STATE POLICE PRIMARY CONTACTS:

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POLICY

There are nine federally recognized Indian tribal governments located in the State of Oregon. These Indian tribes have a unique legal status as sovereign governments. The importance of recognizing the relationship that exists between the tribes and State government agencies cannot be underestimated. As sovereigns, the tribes and the State must work together to develop mutual respect and trust for the sovereign interests of both parties.

The purpose of this policy is to formalize the government-to-government relationship that exists between Oregon Indian tribes and the State and to establish a process which can assist in resolving potential conflicts, maximize key inter-governmental relations and enhance an exchange of ideas and resources for the greater good of all of Oregon's citizens, whether tribal members or not.

The State recognizes the sovereign status of Oregon Indian tribes and in furtherance of this, the Department of State Police establishes the following policy statement which:

1. Recognizes Oregon Indian tribal governments are interested in development of State policy that affects tribal interests and recognizes the desirability of dialogue between tribal governments, the federal government as trustee, where appropriate, and the State, with regard to those State policies;
2. Identifies key personnel of the Department as "key contacts" responsible for coordination with tribal governments;
3. Establishes a process for the identification of those Department policies by designated tribal representatives and key contacts;
4. Promotes dialogue between the Department and tribal governments on those state policies; and
5. That advances the government-to-government relationship by notifying Department members of Executive Order #96-30.

The Department of State Police will work cooperatively with other State agencies to accomplish the goals of Executive Order #96-30.

This policy is not intended to create a forum for resolution of all issues between the tribes and the Department, nor is it meant to replace presently existing lines of communications.

2. The listed Department representatives, or a designee, shall communicate with Oregon tribal governments that are located in their individual service areas for the purpose of working together to achieve mutual goals, identify policy issues and to discuss issues of mutual concern or interest.
3. In the development of issues of mutual concern, the Department representatives shall make reasonable efforts to design solutions and develop programs to achieve mutual goals in relation to Department policy.
4. Department representatives shall consider the use of cooperative agreements with Indian tribal governments as provided for in ORS 190.110 or other tools to achieve mutual cooperation when it is appropriate to do so.
5. Department representatives and designated supervisors shall attend periodic training in tribal culture, relations, and legal status designed to create an awareness of the unique nature of the tribal governments and an understanding of, and sensitivity to, Native American Issues.
6. The Gaming Enforcement Division Director shall provide annually to the Superintendent a report on the Department's accomplishments and achievements derived from the advancement of Executive Order #96-30. A copy will be provided to each of the tribal public safety key contacts.
7. All members of the Department will consider impacts on Oregon tribal governments when developing policy and if appropriate shall consult with tribal representatives to discuss issues.
8. Station Commanders designated as Department representatives shall establish mutually agreeable meeting schedules with local tribal representatives.

PROCEDURE:

1. The Gaming Enforcement Division Director or a designee, shall assist the Superintendent to coordinate and accomplish the requirements of this policy and the goals of Executive Order #96-30.
 - A. The Gaming Enforcement Division Director will coordinate the periodic tribal cultural training for Department representatives and designated supervisors. Each Department representatives shall designate those supervisors under their command that should attend this training.
 - B. The annual report to the Superintendent required by this policy shall be an Executive Summary.
2. The statewide annual meeting will serve as a means for Department representatives to further establish contacts with designated tribal government representatives, schedule additional meetings and develop appropriate protocols of communication on issues of mutual concern.
