#### **SUMMARY**

Modifies amounts and purposes authorized for issuance of general obligation bonds and revenue bonds for biennium.

Requires public universities to impose certain requirements relating to apprenticeship, benefits and outreach to women, minority individuals and veterans on contractors for certain projects.

  - (b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and re-

- tention of women, minority individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having at least 15 2 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more 3 of those groups; 4
- (c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; 5 and 6
- 7 (d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this 8 subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract has an 9 estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater. 10
- (2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that 11 is carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:
- (a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by appren-15 16 tices:
- (b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, 17 minority individuals and veterans; and 18
- (c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits 19 provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors. 20
- 21 (3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu of, the requirements imposed under ORS 350.379. 22
- (4) As used in this section: 23

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- (a) "Apprentice" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010. 24
- (b) "Apprenticeable occupation" has the meaning given that term 25 in ORS 660.010. 26
- (c) "Apprenticeship training program" means the total system of 27 apprenticeship that a particular local joint committee, as defined in 28 ORS 660.010, operates, including the local joint committee's registered 29 standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, 30 selecting, employing and training apprentices in an apprenticeable 31

1	occupation.

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- (d) "Minority individual" has the meaning given that term in ORS 2 200.005.
- (e) "Qualified project" means the following capital construction 4 projects:
  - (A) The Oregon Institute of Technology Boivin Hall Rehabilitation referenced in section 1 (1)(i), chapter 661, Oregon Laws 2019;
  - (B) The Oregon State University Arts and Education Complex project referenced in section 1 (1)(j), chapter 661, Oregon Laws 2019;
  - (C) The Portland State University SB1 Renovation and Expansion referenced in section 1 (1)(k), chapter 661, Oregon Laws 2019; and
  - (D) The University of Oregon Huestis Hall Renovation referenced in section 1 (1)(L), chapter 661, Oregon Laws 2019.
  - (f) "Veteran" has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.
- (g) "Woman" has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005. 15
  - SECTION 16. This 2020 second special session Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2020 second special session Act takes effect on its passage.

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
