


HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Ithough the 2015 legislative session is beginning to wind down, I am excited to inform you that we are striving to ensure that Oregonians who work hard have a realistic chance to pursue the American Dream. Specifically, this session, I have been focused on creating opportunities, rewarding honest and hard work, and expanding fairness for all Oregonians.

One way we are expanding fairness is through the passage of **HB 3206**, which increases access to post-conviction DNA testing for felons—previously, it was only available for those convicted of murder or sex crimes. It also creates a more reasonable standard by which a judge determines whether or not a person should have access to testing. "This bill is about

one thing - innocence," said Rep. Jennifer Williamson. "It is about making sure that when our justice system is wrong, we have a way to make it right."

Another way we are creating opportunities is through the passage of **HB 2690-A**, which provides a property tax exemption for proven nonprofit housing developers that acquire land for the purpose of building low-income housing. "The seven-year exemption window, with an extra three years for special circumstances, gives

groups like Habitat for Humanity extra support whenever the economy is weak," said Rep. Whisnant. "Cities and counties will recover the taxes on the undeveloped land when the family moves into the home. This bill will provide affordable housing for urban and rural communities." This bill will have a substantial impact in our district as Habitat for Humanity

is a major player in furthering a healthy and affordable place to call home. More than building homes, Habitat for Humanity builds communities and create the opportunity for families to help themselves.

Additionally, **SB** 616-A was passed, which requires the Secretary of State to conduct investigations of Community Housing Trust Account within Developmental Disabilities Community Housing Fund to ensure the funds are used for the purpose for which they were designed.

Yet another way we expanding fairness is through the passage of **SJM 11**, which urges Congress to improve and support efforts to bring health care to veterans in rural communities. In addition to the many bills that have been passed, a number of notable events occurred throughout May:

First, May 8th was declared by Governor Kate Brown as military appreciation day. As Oregonians have a long-standing tradition of serving in the Armed Forces of the United States, with thousands giving their lives in defense of this country, it is critical we set time aside to honor the men, woman, and families who sacrifice greatly to ensure our safety. Moreover, the contributions of Oregon military personnel have been key to maintaining freedoms and a way of life that Americans alike cherish. Thus, it is important to raise awareness of the sacrifices that our brave men and women in uniform have made in the past and continue to make in order to defend the United States Constitution and to preserve the liberties that enrich our nation. Additionally, it is also vital to honor the sacrifices and dedication of the families who support our men and women who serve.

Second, On May 22nd, the Bikini Atoll Choir gave a beautiful performance on the House floor. For those of you who may be unfamiliar, there were 67 hydrogen and atomic bombs tested around the Bikini Islands during the 1950's which forced the Marshallese people from their home. Today, many of the exiled Marshallese people have made their home in Oregon and other states across the US. I would like to take time to honor their bravery and sacrifice and are proud to call you our friends.

Third, On May 21st, I had the privilege of participating at the groundbreaking ceremony of

the Peter Courtney Minto Brown Island Bridge at the Waterfront Park. I would also like to thank Peter Courtney, the city of Salem, and all of those involved in making this bridge a reality as this infrastructure is necessary to mold Oregon into a an efficient state that meets the needs of her citizens.

Fourth, On May 27th, I had the honor of joining Representative Shemia Fagan, Sheriff Craig Roberts, and the Clackamas County Sheriff Department for the Ceremonial signing of **HB 2763**. This bill ensures that public employees who leave position to perform military duty will receive the

amount of pay entitled to them.

Fifth, on May 30th, I had the honor of joining Governor Brown, Senator Wyden, Congressman Schrader, Major General Daniel Hokanson, as well as family and friends at the Demobilization Ceremony for the 234th Engineer Company at West Salem High School. The 234th was deployed for 394 days of active duty services in Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, and Afghanistan. Members of the 234th Engineer Company I welcome you home and thank you for your service to your community and your country.

Lastly, On May 30th, I had the privilege of introducing Linda and Bill Bushy at the Orchard Heights Small Dog Park opening day celebration in West Salem. Bill and Lynda Bush took the lead in making this park possible. Thank you to Counselor Lewis, the City of Salem, and everyone else who was there to celebrate with us.
