### **Environmental Caucus Priority Bills We're Watching This Week**

SB 688 (with the -2 amendment) appropriates \$500,000 to the Public Utility Commission to create a framework for possibly implementing a performance-based regulation model for Oregon's investor-owned electric utilities: PGE, PacifiCorp, and Idaho Power. Performance-based regulation (PBR) is a relatively new tool that requires electric utilities to meet certain goals in order to increase rates. The PBR model shifts the considerations for approved rate increases from cost recovery to specific metrics that benefit the public. Under SB 688, some metrics the PUC could consider to approve rate increases are a utility's reliability, resilience, and efficiency performance, its work towards greenhouse gas emissions reductions, and its development of distributed energy resources, to name a few. Many other states have adopted or considered this regulation and have used it as an incentive to decarbonize their electrical grid. The bill has a public hearing in Senate Energy and Environment on Wednesday at 3pm.

HB 3477 updates Oregon's greenhouse gas emissions goals to be consistent with the goals set forth by the Oregon Climate Action Commission and with the current science on climate change. The bill sets goals for every decade until 2050, by which Oregon should be at net zero emissions. Oregon was at the forefront of setting state emissions reductions targets when HB 3543 was passed in 2007. The bill has a public hearing in House Climate, Energy, and Environment Tuesday morning at 8am.

HB 3512 would phase out the use of PFAS in certain consumer products, like cookware, clothing, and cleaning products. PFAS are a class of chemicals used for their ability to resist water, heat, and grease, but are linked to detrimental impacts on human health and the environment. PFAS bioaccumulate and enter our soil, water, and air through many paths and are very difficult to clean up once they are present. Across the country, other states have already begun to require the phase out of PFAS in common consumer products. Oregon will be joining other states to reduce the use of this chemical and prevent its spread throughout the environment. The bill has a public hearing in House Climate, Energy, and Environment on Thursday at 8am.

<u>HB 3681</u> makes changes to the Energy Facility Siting Council's site certification process for energy projects in order to **streamline the construction of new energy infrastructure**. The Pacific Northwest is facing <u>a steep increase in demand for electricity</u> over the next decade and facilitating the deployment of clean energy and the required transmission is a top priority for the Environmental Caucus. The bill has a public hearing in House Climate, Energy, and Environment Tuesday morning at 8am.

**HB 3107** - Makes certain changes to DEQ's permitting process. The bill has a public hearing in <u>House Climate</u>, <u>Energy</u>, <u>and Environment on Thursday morning</u>.
