

Environmental Caucus Session Update

March 24, 2025

April 9 is the upcoming deadline for most bills to have a work session and get voted out of their committees and onto the floor of the first chamber. You'll see a lot of activity in committees over the next few weeks in efforts to keep bills alive. Bills in Joint committees, in Rules, Revenue, and Conduct are exempt from this timeline.

Environmental Caucus Priority Bills We're Watching This Week

SJR 28 is a ballot referral for the 2026 general election that asks Oregonians to vote on whether or not to enshrine the right to a healthy environment in the Oregon constitution. You might be familiar with this concept from last year's ruling in Montana that sided in favor of Our Children's Trust, who were suing the state over their right to a clean and healthful environment. This week, a number of Environmental Caucus priority bills have committee works session. They are:

SB 688 - Performance-based regulations for utilities

HB 2941 - Positions at the Dept. of Ed. to leverage federal funding

HB 3336 - Requiring utilities to develop and file GETS plans with the PUC

HB 3546 - Allowing the PUC to create a new rate class for large power users

HB 3580 - Funding a task force for eelgrass recommendations

To testify on these or any bills, click on the bill link above or locate the bill in <u>OLIS</u> and sign up to provide oral testimony during the hearing. Written testimony is accepted once the hearing date is posted and up to 48 hours after the beginning of the hearing.

Other Conversations We're Watching This Week

<u>SB 301</u> makes changes to a <u>2022 Oregon law</u> that limits what types of boats can be used on a certain stretch of the Willamette River. The bill (with the -1 amendment) would allow for larger boats to use the river, although wake surfing would still be prohibited. <u>Pool</u>. The bill has a public hearing in Senate Energy and Environment on Wednesday and a possible work session scheduled for next week.

<u>SB 1153</u> would change considerations of water right transfers and prohibit a transfer that results in the loss of in-stream habitat for endangered, threatened, or sensitive species in certain places. For more information on the bill, check out the <u>bill</u> <u>summary</u> put together by Legislative policy staff. The bill has a public hearing Tuesday in Senate Natural Resources and Wildfire, with a possible work session on Thursday. <u>SB 427</u>, related to the same topic, is also scheduled for a possible work session in the same committee on Thursday.

<u>HB 3932</u> would create rules that prohibit the trapping of beavers on waterways or in watersheds that are <u>categorized as impaired waters</u>, as determined by DEQ's biennial assessment. The bill has a public hearing tomorrow in House Climate, Energy, and Environment with a possible work session scheduled on April 8.


