




Elements of a cap & trade program

- Scope

- Emissions cap
- Allowance distribution
 - Revenue
- Cost containment
 - Offsets



Emissions covered by cap



Points of regulation

Transportation fuels

- Terminal racks
- Importers

Natural gas

- Utilities
- Pipelines
- Large industrial users

Electricity

- In-state generators
- Importers

High emitting facilities

- Industrial process
- Large natural gas users



Emissions cap

- Align with Oregon's GHG targets
- Cap declines over time
- Key consideration for linkage with other jurisdictions



Allowance distribution methods

- Auction
- Free
- Consignment (hybrid)




Revenue

- Revenue from transportation may be restricted
- Remaining auction revenue could:
 - Benefit disadvantaged & rural communities
 - Minimize impacts to utility rates
 - Further reduce emissions
 - Other state priorities

VERY rough estimate of potential revenue generated by auction of allowances
