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## **Oregon Legislature People of Color Caucus Highlight Resources for Small Business Owners**

SALEM – Small businesses and the Oregonians who work for them are grappling with the impacts of coronavirus-related closures. The State of Oregon, through the Employment Department and Business Oregon, have a range of tips and resources for small business owners and their employees to get through this challenging time.

“Small businesses are the backbone of Oregon’s economy, employing 55 percent of our private workforce,” said Rep. Akasha Lawrence Spence (D-Portland), a small business owner. “They are a powerful yet simultaneously fragile estuary in our economic landscape. We must act as rapid revenue loss is compounded for women and POC businesses who already have a hard time gaining access to much-needed funds when there is no global health crisis. We need our state agencies to allocate meaningful subsidies to these small businesses now.”

Small businesses that have had to reduce the amount of hours employees work by 20 to 40 percent may be eligible to participate in the Workshare program. This program enables employees to receive unemployment benefits while they are still working under reduced hours. This can serve as a lifeline, but employers must sign-up and initiate this process for employees to gain benefits.
