SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act makes ODFW, SFWC and DSL amend their marine reserve programs. (Flesch Readability Score: 74.8).

Requires the State Department of Fish and Wildlife, the State Fish and Wildlife Commission and the Department of State Lands to implement the Ocean Policy Advisory Council recommendations to develop an adaptive management and social monitoring program to support marine reserves.

Appropriates moneys to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife to implement programs.

Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Whereas the council has unanimously supported the recommendations from the decadal assessment of Oregon's marine reserves, both in policy direction and in full funding of the program; and

Whereas Oregon's marine reserve program is a necessary investment in Oregon's statewide planning goal relating to ocean resources and represents a critical fishery-independent, long term monitoring and applied research investment by the State of Oregon; now, therefore,

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 196.540 is amended to read:

196.540. The State Department of Fish and Wildlife, State Fish and Wildlife Commission, State Land Board and relevant state agencies shall, consistent with existing statutory authority, implement:

- (1) The November 29, 2008, recommendations from the Ocean Policy Advisory Council on marine reserves by adopting rules to establish, study, monitor, evaluate and enforce a pilot marine reserve at Otter Rock and a pilot marine reserve and a marine protected area at Redfish Rocks.
 - (2) The January 25, 2011, recommendations, limited to those related to boundaries and allow-

- [(2)] In implementing the activities described in ORS 196.540 pursuant to ORS 196.545, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall use local resources where feasible and practical.
- <u>SECTION 5.</u> This 2024 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2024 Act takes effect on its passage.

- 196.542. [(1) The State Fish and Wildlife Commission may not impose prohibitions on fishing by rule pursuant to ORS 196.540 until the baseline data specified in ORS 196.545 (2)(f) have been collected consistent with scientifically based monitoring plans.]
- [(2)] In implementing the activities described in ORS 196.540 pursuant to ORS 196.545, the State Department of Fish and Wildlife shall use local resources where feasible and practical.
- <u>SECTION 5.4</u> This 2024 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2024 Act takes effect on its passage.

Section 1: Bill Description

Section 1 of HB 4132 amends ORS 196.540 to add to statute the October 25, 2022, recommendations from the Ocean Policy Advisory Council (OPAC) to develop an adaptive management plan for marine reserves. This plan is to include the development and implementation of: (a) specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-oriented objectives for ecological and socioeconomic monitoring and research; (b) consistent measurable indicators of social impacts; (c) efficient long-term ecological sampling protocols that remain consistent and responsive to adaptive management; (d) assessment of the capacity for the marine reserves to enhance ecological resilience to environmental disturbances, including data collection and evaluation over long periods of time and on how the reserves operate as a network; and (e) defined goals for outreach and engagement, including engagement with federally recognized Indian tribes, and assessments to evaluate the effectiveness in achieving these goals. The adaptive management plan is also to include a collaborative process through which social monitoring data on the reserves can be interpreted to affect policy decisions, including steps for decision-making and conflict management.

Section 2 adds language to ORS 196.545 stating that the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) shall consult with relevant scientists, state agencies, ocean users, and coastal communities to implement the activities described in ORS 196.540 above by developing and amending a work plan and adaptive management plan. An additional task of continued engagement of communities and commercial and recreational fishing fleets is added to the work plan in this section. This engagement is intended to ensure that marine reserve science is useful to communities and that the department incorporates community and fishermen knowledge into ongoing research and monitoring efforts. Further amendments are made to ORS 196.545 in this section to remove the provision of baseline data on Oregon's territorial sea from the tasks to be addressed in this work plan. Section 2 also removes language from ORS 196.545 which previously stated that the data and recommendations produced from the work plan shall be used by ODFW to recommend the number, size, location, and restriction limits of potential sites for marine reserve designation.

Section 3 of HB 4132 appropriates \$800,000 of General Fund to ODFW for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, in addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, for the implementation of ORS 196.540.

Section 4 of HB 4132 removes language from ORS 196.542 which previously mandated that ODFW may not impose prohibitions on fishing by rule pursuant to ORS 196.540 until baseline data on Oregon's territorial sea had been collected.

Section 5 declares an emergency; this act would be effective on passage.

Section 2: Program Background

The OPAC recommendations which HB 4132-1 would implement are based on the Decadal Review (2022) of the Department's Marine Reserves Program per Legislative mandate (SB 1510, 2012). HB 4132-1 is very similar to HB 2903 which was proposed, but not passed, during the 2023 Legislative Session. HB 4132-1 would result in significant new workload for the Marine Reserves Program

which could not be incorporated into existing staff workloads and duties.

Section 3: Agency Written Analysis

Sections 1-4 of HB 4132-1 are expected to result in fiscal impacts to ODFW. These sections detail new workload for the agency.

Some of this work could be accomplished by existing staff, including work done to amend existing Oregon Administrative Rules and to create new contracts related to S&S for the development and implementation of new workplan elements. Implementation of the adaptive management plan detailed in HB 4132-1 is expected to require the amending of existing Oregon Administrative Rules. Estimated staff time costs for rulemaking is \$5,473; this would be done using existing staff and budgets.

However, to develop and implement the marine reserves adaptive management plan and collaborative process through which social monitoring data on the reserves can be interpreted as directed in HB 4132-1, ODFW would need the following new permanent positions with S&S costs funded with new General Fund for a total of \$479,324 in the current biennium and \$730,923 in the 2025-27 biennium (PS and S&S combined):

- 1 Economist 2
- 1 Natural Resource Specialist 3 (NRS 3)
- 1 Public Affairs Specialist 2

A new Economist 2 position would be necessary for both the development and ongoing implementation of the adaptive management plan according to the specifications listed in the bill, contributing expertise towards the socio-economic research and monitoring requirements. This position would be involved in the development of consistent measurable indicators of social impacts as described in Section 1 of HB 4132-1 in addition to the ongoing monitoring of these indicators. The position would also contribute towards developing a collaborative process through which social monitoring data can be interpreted to affect marine policy decisions.

A new NRS 3 position would be necessary to assist in developing and implementing efficient long-term ecological sampling protocols that remain consistent and responsive to adaptive management. This position would also carry out duties for the assessment of the capacity for the marine reserves to enhance ecological resilience to environmental disturbances as described in Section 1 of HB 4132-1. This position would additionally aid in developing a collaborative process through which social monitoring data can be interpreted to affect marine policy decisions. The NRS 3 position would be doing field work. The nature of this type of work requires additional travel, training, communications, equipment, and supplies costs.

A new Public Affairs Specialist 2 position would be necessary for the ongoing social outreach work detailed in the bill. This work includes the development and implementation of defined goals for outreach and engagement, including engagement with federally recognized Indian tribes, and assessments to evaluate the effectiveness in achieving these goals. This position would also be necessary for continued engagement with communities in addition to commercial and recreational fishing fleets. This outreach and engagement work is intended to ensure that marine reserve science is useful to communities and that the department incorporates community and fishermen knowledge into ongoing research and monitoring efforts, as detailed in Section 2 of HB 4132-1.

Additionally, ODFW would need \$415,000 General Fund added to the agency's marine reserves budget on an ongoing basis:

\$315,000 of this total General Fund would be used to support the development and implementation of the adaptive management plan. Funds would be used for the hiring of contractors and facilitators that would support new responsibilities for research, outreach, and community engagement. \$100,000 of this amount would be used for contracting a Sea Grant-based fellow position to support new research for the development and implementation of the adaptive management plan.

\$100,000 of this total General Fund would be used to support the development and implementation of a collaborative process for considering social impacts of marine policy decisions. Funds would be used to hire facilitators and contactors for the development of the collaborative process; to establish new research contracts related to social research on emerging marine policy decisions; to develop informational documents detailing social impacts and marine policy decisions at hand; and for reimbursement for travel and employee participation in the collaborative process to consider and address social impacts of policy decisions.

This measure requires the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and the Department of State Lands (DSL) to implement the Ocean Policy Advisory Council recommendations to develop an adaptive management and social monitoring program to support marine reserves. The plan must include specific and time-oriented objectives for ecological, socioeconomic, and social impact monitoring and research. Additionally, these agencies are required to adopt efficient long-term ecological sampling protocols. Agency assessments should focus on the capacity of marine reserves to enhance ecological resilience to environmental disturbances, including data collection and evaluation over extended periods and the operation of reserves as a network. The agencies are to develop goals for outreach and engagement, including engagement with federally recognized Indian tribes, along with assessments to evaluate the effectiveness of achieving these goals.

ODFW is to develop and amend a work plan and adaptive management plan. These plans should include provisions for ongoing engagement with communities, including commercial and recreational fishing fleets, to ensure that marine reserve science is beneficial to communities. Additionally, the department must integrate community and fishermen knowledge into ongoing research and monitoring efforts.

Fiscal Analysis

The fiscal impact is estimated to be \$894,324 General Fund in the 2023-25 biennium, and \$1,145,923 General Fund in the 2025-27 biennium.

Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife

ODFW can absorb the workload associated with amending Oregon Administrative Rules and contracting for elements of the workplan. Three permanent full-time positions (each 0.63 FTE in the 2023-25 biennium, and

1.00 FTE in the 2025-27 biennium) would develop and implement the marine reserves adaptive management plan and conduct social monitoring, including:

- One Natural Resource Specialist 3 position to develop and implement long-term ecological sampling protocols,
- One full-time Economist 2 position for socio-economic research and monitoring, and
- One Public Affairs Specialist 2 position for ongoing social outreach and engagement.

In addition to position authority and position-related services and supplies, ongoing General Fund costs for ODFW include:

- \$100,000 for a Sea Grant-based fellow position to support new research, and
- \$315,000 for contracts to conduct facilitation services, social research, and marine policy research.

Other entities

There is a minimal fiscal impact anticipated for DSL and DLCD.
