


Injury in Oregon

Injury Mortality

- Injury is the 3rd leading cause of death in Oregon—but the leading cause among people 1-44 years of age.
- In 2007, unintentional injuries caused more than 1,600 deaths among Oregonians; intentional injuries caused 689 deaths.
- The leading causes of injury death are suicide, motor vehicle traffic, unintentional poisoning, unintentional falls, and homicide.
- The rate of unintentional poisoning fatalitiesmainly due to drugs and medicines- has increased more in the past decade than any other injury in Oregon. More than half these deaths are associated with prescription drugs.

Injury Hospitalizations

- The leading causes of injury hospitalization are falls, suicide attempts, motor vehicle traffic, unintentional poisoning, and other transport (e.g., off road vehicles, watercraft).
- Each year, over 18,000 Oregonians are hospitalized for injuries.
- Fall injuries alone were associated with over \$550 million in hospitalization charges between 2003 and 2007.

Prevention

- Although injuries are often considered "accidents," most injuries are preventable.
- The most effective means of reducing the burden of injury focus on prevention at the community level.
