Dear Mr. Spangler:

Thank you for contacting the Oregon Government Ethics Commission (OGEC). This letter of advice is provided in response to your original inquiry received on June 14, 2016, and the updated information provided via phone and email on September 21, 2016. You are asking for reaffirmation as to whether invited public officials may accept payment of costs associated with travel to California to learn about climate policies and practices without violating Oregon Government Ethics law. The answer that follows is offered under the authority granted at ORS 244.284 as guidance on how the current provisions of Oregon Government Ethics law may apply to the specific circumstances presented in your inquiry.

At the time of your original (June) inquiry, Meridian Institute provided copies of the following documents to OGEC staff: Meridian Institute's 501(c)(3) IRS determination letter; the trip invitation provided to legislators; a memorandum summarizing the purpose, invited attendees, and agenda for the trip; and a spreadsheet accounting of anticipated budgetary expenses. In response to this inquiry, OGEC staff issued a letter of advice to you on June 17, 2016, stating in short that legislative officials' acceptance of this offer would not appear to violate Oregon Government Ethics laws per ORS 244.020(7)(b)(F) and (H).

I understand, however, that the trip, as originally planned to take place on July 5 – 6, 2016, was cancelled. As a result, you now request that OGEC reaffirm the answer we provided in your June 17th letter of advice in consideration of a few additional details: the trip is now scheduled to take place in January 2017, and Meridian Institute's payment of costs for invited legislators is made possible by grant funding from the David and Lucile Packard Foundation. There is no material difference in other trip details.

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According to the documentation provided in June, Meridian Institute, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, is leading a two-day trip to Los Angeles, California, for certain members of the Oregon Legislative Assembly to meet with California legislators, agency members, business leaders, and other advocates. The purpose of the trip is to develop relationships and to share best practices for developing and implementing climate policy. Attendees will receive educational briefings on a number of different climate policies California is implementing. Discussions will cover key issues that Oregon should evaluate while considering climate policy, how California's programs are working so far, how the politics worked, and how Oregon could integrate into their programs. Included as part of the trip, the cost of all airfare, travel to and from the airport, transit to and from all meetings, a one-night hotel stay, and meals will be covered for attending members of the Oregon Legislative Assembly.

Regarding the application of Oregon Government Ethics law, public officials (defined at ORS 244.020(15)) are generally prohibited from accepting, within a single calendar year, any gift(s) (defined at ORS 244.020(7)(a)) worth over \$50 from any source that might reasonably have an economic interest in the public official's official decision-making (ORS 244.025; see ORS 244.020(10)). However, notwithstanding this requirement, the legislature has added several exceptions to the definition of gift (ORS 244.020(7)(b)), which, if applicable, permit a public official to accept a gift without regard to the \$50 limit.

Based on the information provided, the most relevant of these exceptions appear to be ORS 244.020(7)(b)(F) and ORS 244.040(7)(b)(H), either one of which will allow the invited Oregon legislative officials to accept payment of the abovementioned expenses.

The (F) and (H) exceptions are similar in that both permit public officials to accept payment for "reasonable" food, lodging, and travel while "representing state government" on a "fact-finding mission or trip." "Representing government" is specified as referring to when a "public official attends an event on behalf of" his/her government entity (OAR 199-005-0001(7)). Also, "fact-finding mission or trip" is specified to include "any activity related to a[n]... educational purpose, or aimed at providing intergovernmental assistance, such as for the purpose of... sharing best practices...." (OAR 199-005-0001(2)). Additionally, the (F) exception requires that expenses be paid by certain types of entities, one of which can be a "not-for-profit corporation that is tax exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code." While application on the (H) exception is not contingent on who pays, it has its own additional requirement: the activity must be "officially sanctioned," meaning that a receiving public official needs prior written approval by his/her public body (or someone authorized to provide such approval on the public body's behalf) (OAR 199-005-0020(3)(b)). Where members of the Legislative Assembly are concerned, written authorization by the "President of the B. Spangler September 27, 2016 Page 3

Senate, Speaker of the House, the designated majority or minority leaders of either chamber or appointed committees" is sufficient to constitute an "officially sanctioned" activity (OAR 199-005-0020(3)(b)(C)).

As reflected above, the purpose of this trip is to educate Oregon Legislators on key issues and considerations in developing and implementing state climate policies as a function of their official positions. This includes the sharing of both challenges and best practices through intergovernmental assistance between participating Oregon officials and those representing the State of California. Thus, the two common elements of both the (F) and (H) exceptions ("representing government" and "fact-finding mission") appear to be met. The (F) exception's final requirement—specifying what type of entity must pay—is also met: according to Guidestar and the IRS website, Meridian Institute and the David and Lucile Packard Foundation are both tax-exempt 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations. Furthermore, although it is already clear that the (F) exception applies here, it is worth emphasizing that regardless of these organizations' 501(c)(3) status, if prior written authorization for participation is provided by the legislative assembly (i.e., officially sanctioned), the (H) exception will also apply as well.

Additionally, please note that each member of Oregon's Legislative Assembly is required to file an Annual Verified Statement of Economic Interest (SEI) with the Oregon Government Ethics Commission each year (ORS 244.050). With regard to participation in events permitted by ORS 244.020(7)(b)(F) or ORS 244.020(7)(b)(H), the SEI requires officials to identify the name and address of the payor, the nature of the event, the date of the event, and the cost of the expenses paid (ORS 244.060(5)-(6)). Pursuant to this reporting requirement, Meridian Institute shall provide written notification of such information to attending Oregon legislative officials within 10 days after the expenses are incurred (ORS 244.100).
