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## A Valentine for Oregon's Educators: Senate Bills Addressing Workforce Shortage to Be Heard on Tuesday

**SALEM, Ore** - On Tuesday, February 14th, the Senate Committee on Education will hold the first public hearing for Senate Bills 283 and 279, two bills that take direct aim at the root causes of the education workforce shortage in Oregon.

"Oregon has struggled to find and retain the educators we need to meet our kids' needs, and the pandemic only made it worse. Based on feedback we're receiving from our bipartisan, statewide educator workgroup tackling this issue, we believe these bills will build a thriving, competitive education workforce and deliver better outcomes for students and teachers alike," said Chair of the Education Committee Senator Michael Dembrow (D-Portland).

<u>SB 283</u> and <u>SB 279</u> address staff and substitute shortages, burnout, and barriers to entering public education professions. Designed for the medium-term, these bills build on last session's HB 4030 which attempted to address critical workforce issues in the short-term.

- SB 279 makes it easier for teachers from other states to move to Oregon. It authorizes Oregon to join the Interstate Compact on Teacher Mobility, which will remove barriers to licensure for teachers who are already licensed in other states.
- SB 283 will:
  - Create a robust statewide educator workforce data system and regular workforce surveys to improve collection, quality, and availability of data related to Oregon's education workforce.

- Create a carve-out in the Statewide Education Initiatives Account for apprenticeship and mentorship grants to continue diversifying our education workforce.
- Ensure collective bargaining agreements include a **20% pay differential for teachers and classified staff who work in special education.**
- Include pay for planning time and lunch periods in collective bargaining agreements when educators are assigned other responsibilities during those times.
- Address the issue of districts under-employing workers serving students with the highest needs by requiring a minimum of 25 hrs/week and just cause protections for classified jobs.
- Make substitutes district employees with paid training.
- Allow retired teachers to convert to substitute licenses at no charge.
- Allow retired teachers to work full-time until 2029.
- Direct the Oregon Department of Education to study and plan for statewide minimum salaries for our education workforce.
- Fund a **public relations campaign** promoting education as a profession.
