### **Oregon Senate Moves to Protect Personal Data from ICE**

*Senate Bill 1587 increases accountability around how the state handles Oregonians' data*

**SALEM, OR** – Oregon Senate Democrats today voted to put new restrictions on how digital footprints are traded. Senate Bill 1587 prohibits government agencies from disclosing personally identifiable information to data brokers unless the broker agrees in writing that the information will not be sold or transferred for immigration enforcement purposes.

Amid increased brutality and diminished accountability among federal immigration agents, the measure aligns government practices with Oregon values, protecting vulnerable communities during a challenging time.

“This bill is a common-sense safeguard,” said **Senator Winsvey Campos (D – Aloha)**. “It ensures that when Oregon public agencies share data, they do so with a clearer understanding and assurance about how that data will be used.”

Senate Bill 1587 builds on a 2023 Oregon law that requires data brokers to register prior to collecting or selling your personal information and on the Oregon Consumer Privacy Act, which gives you the right to opt out of the sale of your personal data.

“Oregonians deserve to have control over their personal data,” said **Senator Campos**. “This legislation is a critical step forward, and I look forward to working together on the issue of data privacy in 2027 and beyond.”

The measure passed in a vote of 18 to 9. It now moves to the Oregon House of Representatives. Oregon’s short legislative session must end by March 8, according to the state constitution.
