Emergency Operations Planning

- EOPs cover all hazards and are flexible enough for use in all emergencies.
- EOPs are plans that define the scope of preparedness and emergency management activities necessary for that jurisdiction
 - Assigns responsibility to organizations for carrying out specific actions during an emergency or disaster
 - Sets forth lines of authority and organizational relationships and shows how all actions will be coordinated
 - Identifies personnel, equipment, facilities, supplies, and other resources available within the jurisdiction or by agreement with other jurisdictions
 - Reconciles requirements with other jurisdictions.

Alert request process overview - Fire

- O Fire starts
- Law and Fire determine evacuation zones based on threat and potential spread
 - Request an emergency alert be sent
- Alert sender:
 - collects information to fill out alert message
 - draws evacuation area in mapping system
 - selects contacts
 - O sends alert

Evacuation and Emergency Shelters

Cities with Evacuation Zones:

- O <u>Ashland</u>
- O <u>Central Point</u>
- O <u>Jacksonville</u>
- O <u>Medford</u>
- O <u>Phoenix</u>
- O <u>Talent</u>

The rest of the Cities and County are currently developing zones

Emergency Shelters

- Red Cross list of shelters that meet minimum standards: building code, ADA, bathrooms, etc.
- Choose shelter based on Incident location and current and potential impact
- Temporary Evacuation Point
 - Established after evacuation, but before a shelter has is established



BE READY. BE SET. GO!

Know evacuation levels and follow advice of emergency officials. Make the best decision for your safety. Don't wait to evacuate if you feel unsafe!



LEVEL 1 BE READY

Prepare to evacuate.

- Stay informed.
- Have your plan and go-kit ready.
- Seniors and people with disabilities should take action.

LEVEL 2 BE SET

Be set to evacuate at a moment's notice.

- High danger in your area.
- Follow your evacuation plan.
- Relocate to a safe place.

LEVEL 3 GO NOW!

LEAVE IMMEDIATELY!

- Imminent danger in your area.
- Leave without delay.
- It is unsafe to stay.
